"Unless The Lord Builds The House"

Daniel 4:28-37 Luke 12:13-21



Almost every city or region has within it a large, colossal mansion built by a person of wealth who was trying to show the world just how important he/she was. It is not uncommon for these huge structures to be referred to as "so-and-so's folly", because it is not uncommon for the builder to go bankrupt in the building process or fail in their life venture.

Toronto has Casa Loma. Sir Henry

Pellatt was the dreamer behind this famous heritage site, built in 1914. Sir Henry

with his wife Lady Mary enjoyed *Casa Loma* for less than ten years before financial misfortune forced him to abandon his 98 room mansion. Hamilton has Dundurn Castle, the stately 37 room mansion built by early Canadian soldier, lawyer, land speculator and politician Sir Allan Napier McNab in 1835. Now McNab didn't go bankrupt, but he purchased the property from Richard Beasley, one of Hamilton's early settlers, when financial difficulties forced Beasley to sell lands at Burlington Heights. MacNab built Dundurn Castle on the foundations of Beasley's brick home. McNab lived in the home until his death in 1862.

Most of us are familiar with Boldt Castle on Hart Island in The Thousand Islands built by George Boldt who was the general manager of the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel in New York City. In 1900, Boldt launched an ambitious construction campaign to build a huge masonry structure, one of the largest private



homes in the United States. The six story castle was to be a gift for his wife. The construction of Boldt Castle ceased abruptly in early 1904 after the death of Boldt's wife, Louise. Boldt never returned to Hart Island, leaving this structure as a monument of his love. For 73 years, the castle lay abandoned.

Now, you don't have to be famous or a multi-millionaire to build a "folly" or "a white elephant", and it doesn't have to be a castle. Contractors are notorious for building



homes beyond their means and getting into trouble in the process. I even rented one such home on the St. Lawrence River. Between graduating from Queen's University and going to Knox College for seminary, I sold real estate for a year. At one point we had two homes listed in what was known as Brookland Estates. It was located between Amherstview and Bath on Highway 33 (Bath Road) outside of Kingston. One of the homes the contractor had built for himself. This is

the best picture I can find of it taken off Google Maps. It looked a bit like a castle. There were two-2 car garages at the front of the house and a billiard room in between them. It was finished on the outside. Inside the wiring and plumbing were roughed in and the insulation and vapour barrier were on the outside walls. Unfortunately, that was as far as Mr. Brook got before he ran out of money and left the country to escape his financial difficulties.

Every time I see one of these "follies", I am struck by two things.

- 1. The colossal waste of money involved in these projects; and
- 2. The selfish arrogance of a person who can squander so much money on themselves.

Both things bother me, but the second bothers me the most. It is because I believe arrogance is one of the worst traits that can be found in a person.

The point I want to make is this. **No one** ever built a mansion or a castle to proclaim to the world their humility and self-sacrificing nature. No, a mansion says to whoever wishes to listen:

- See, I've arrived! I'm at the top of the heap!
- I got here because I'm smarter than everyone else.
- I am a self-made person.
- I'm self-sufficient. I don't need God or anyone else for that matter.

Our Scripture lessons paint pictures of two individuals who fit this category perfectly.

The first is Nebuchadnezzar, King of Babylon who was one of the most powerful rulers to emerge in the Ancient Near East. I have always liked the name Nebuchadnezzar. I had cousins who lived in Hamilton very near to Dundurn Castle and they had a dog named Nebuchadnezzar. They also called him Neb or Nebbie. He was the first dog I ever knew who liked to drink out of a toilet bowl.



Now, Nebuchadnezzar was a builder and like all such builders, he made a personal statement through what he built. He was not an ordinary builder, who built a few buildings and a palace for himself. No, Nebuchadnezzar was a master builder and a city planner who built on a grand scale. Babylon was the capital city of what today is known as

Iraq. Under Nebuchadnezzar's direction, Babylon became a magnificent capital covering almost 200 square miles. He built new quarters onto the old city and a palace for himself. Temples were erected and special roads were built and lined with lions. The huge city was surrounded by a series of double defence walls. An artificial lake was created, canals dug and bridges built. For his wife, Nebuchadnezzar built the Hanging Gardens of Babylon which are considered one of the seven wonders of the ancient world. However, archeologists have searched in vain for any evidence of the hanging gardens.


Now if anyone had good reason to be arrogant, proud and boastful of his accomplishments, it was Nebuchadnezzar. The Bible tells us that he was not above doing just that. One night, as he was walking on the roof of his royal palace in Babylon, he gazed around at the city and said to himself: 30 "Is not this the great Babylon I have built as the royal residence, by my mighty power and for the glory of my majesty?" (Daniel 4) You might notice that there is just a hint of ego in this statement. Nebuchadnezzar's words did not go unnoticed. It is not that the LORD (Yahweh) was eavesdropping on this particular occasion. After all, the LORD hears everything we say. He sees everything we do. He knows everything we think. No, God was not eavesdropping just this once. He was aware of every arrogant egotistical thought Nebuchadnezzar had ever had. Now the Almighty sets out to knock old Nebuchadnezzar down – not just a rung or two – but to the bottom of the ladder!

31 Even as the words were on his lips, a voice came from heaven, "This is what is decreed for you, King Nebuchadnezzar: Your royal authority has been taken from you. 32 You will be driven away from people and will live with the wild animals; you will eat grass like the ox." And so His Royal Highness found himself quite literally out of his mind and out in the pasture with the daises. He was reduced from being the



most powerful man in the world to being just another beast in the field. He dropped further and faster than anyone in recorded history.

Nebuchadnezzar was what the Bible calls a "fool". Notice that I said he was a fool, not that he became a fool. According to Scripture, a fool is not a stupid or crazy person, for a fool can be a very well educated and accomplished person. Rather, **1**The fool says in his heart, "There is no God." (Psalm 14) The fool may build temples or churches. The fool may be on the Board or serve as an elder. The fool may have built a financial empire. But in his/her heart – in their innermost being – the fool does not acknowledge God as God! This person believes that they are where they are because of their own "smarts". They have lived life their own way. Their



theme song is: "I did it my way!" They believe that everything they have they have gotten themselves.

When my son Matthew was at Gananoque Secondary School in the early 1990's, there was a new scholarship established called the Arthur Childs Scholarship. Mr. Childs was there as the guest speaker when the scholarship was awarded for the first time, and speak he did! Five minutes stretched into twenty as Mr. Childs, a multi-millionaire and CEO (Chief Executive Officer) of Burns Foods Limited proceeded to tell us how wonderful he was and how he was a self-made man. He was one of the most conceited men I have ever heard speak. He used the personal pronoun "I" in every sentence.

Nebuchadnezzar was cut from the same cloth. Listen to his boast:

- Is not this the great Babylon I have built
- by my mighty power...
- for the glory of my majesty?

He was obviously big on using personal pronouns when speaking of his accomplishments. Immediately a voice from heaven said that he would be stripped of his authority:

32 "... until you acknowledge that the Most High is sovereign over all kingdoms on earth and gives them to anyone he wishes."

Take note of two things that are said here because we are going to come back to them later.

- 1. The Most High is Sovereign over the kingdoms and the affairs of men.
- 2. He gives them that is kingdoms to anyone he wishes!!!

Nebuchadnezzar isn't the only fool to be found in the Bible. Jesus tells us about another one in Luke 12. This fool was also a builder but not on as grand a scale. Basically he was farmer, but being a builder is not limited to potentates in antiquity. This man was a very successful farmer. It wasn't that he just had one good crop that

made him well-to-do. Jesus tells us in this parable that he was already a rich man. This rich farmer, whose barns were already bloated with produce, has just had a bumper crop. His problem was that he had nowhere to store the new crop. 18 Then he said, 'This is what I'll do. I will tear down my barns and build bigger ones, and there I will store my surplus grain. Is there anything wrong with the plan of action the farmer has decided on? No, it is not sin to make a business decision such as he is making. If you are a business person,



whether your business is farming or manufacturing widgets, then you are going to have to make decisions about what level of inventory to carry and where to store it. The problem arises in that this farmer didn't stop at making a purely business decision. No, his thinking process goes one step further. 19 And I'll say to myself, "You have plenty of grain laid up for many years. Take life easy; eat, drink and be merry."

Again, God hears what the man says just as he always hears what we say. His response was swift. 20 "But God said to him, 'You fool! This very night your life will be demanded from you. Then who will get what you have prepared for yourself?' 21 "This is how it will be with whoever stores up things for themselves but is not rich toward God."

Let's ask the question, "What is this man's sin? What has he done that is so wrong? First of all, he was <u>greedy</u>. If we go back to verse 15, we read: <u>15</u> Then he (Jesus) said to them, "Watch out! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; life does not consist in an abundance of possessions." It is after making this statement that Jesus tells the parable of the greedy fool. In my mind I have this image of the farmer being a little fat fellow. He is sitting on a pile of his grain, throwing it up over his head and crying out in glee, "I love it! I love it!"

We dare not minimize greed in any of our lives. It is sin and it is wrong. Clarence Jordan was both a farmer and a New Testament Greek scholar. He founded a small but influential Christian community called Koinonia Farm in southwest Georgia. In his Cotton Patch Version of Luke he speaks of greed as putting "the screws on our souls".

Our foolish farmer indulged in one other sin beyond that of greed and it was selfish arrogance. Where did this man's wealth come from? Was he the one who produced a good crop? The answer is an emphatic **NO**! Jesus said, 16 "The ground of a certain rich man yielded an abundant harvest." The good crop came from the "ground" and thus from the Lord, but nowhere does the rich farmer acknowledge this. From the way he talks you would think that he produced the bumper crop all on his own. This man feels no need for God. He lives solely for himself. He has forgotten that the Lord is the Giver of all that he has. He places his confidence, not in the Giver but in the gift.

Western society is all about consuming and accumulating. For all that we have and enjoy, we take credit. We have gotten all this ourselves. But when what we have is taken away, then to whom do we give credit? By that I mean whom do we blame? Of course, we blame God. It is his fault that we have suffered this loss. If you are going to deny God and feel no need for him in the good times, then is it reasonable to be able to blame him in the bad times? If people feel no need of God in their everyday choices and decisions, then why do they feel the need to disrespect God in the bad times?



The big lesson that we can take from these passages is that **God is Sovereign**. I said earlier that we would return to this. The Sovereignty of God is one of the great doctrines of Scripture and one of the cornerstones of the Reformed Faith. Let's break it down to see what it means. A sovereign is a king who exercises supreme authority over his subjects and his domain.

When we speak of the Sovereignty of God we are saying that God is King and he exercises supreme authority over his dominion which is the universe, our world and over his subjects who trust in Jesus for their salvation.

What is more, he wants us to acknowledge his Sovereignty by living our lives in dependence on him. Remember what he said to Nebuchadnezzar? 32 "...the Most High is sovereign over all kingdoms on earth and gives them to anyone he wishes." When Nebuchadnezzar failed to acknowledge this, God stripped him of everything.

I remember listening to a Christian radio broadcast on which a businessman gave his testimony. He described a deep clinical depression that he had gone through when he was convinced that his business was on the verge of bankruptcy. His voice broke as he described his consideration of suicide and the months he spent in hospital recovering. When he was asked by the radio host what he had learned from his experience, he replied it was that God is Sovereign. He didn't learn to relax and not take life so seriously. It wasn't learning to delegate or use better fiscal controls that pulled him through. No, he learned that God was Sovereign and in absolute control. He learned that God could be depended on to see him through the darkest times. What he needed to learn was to look to God, to trust him and see what God was doing in the midst of his bleak situation.

Most of us have a tendency to trust in our own judgment – to lean on our own understanding. This usually gets us into trouble. God asks us to be aware of the work that he is doing in our lives. He tells us that he is Wisdom and that all his ways are just. He wants to impress on us that he is behind all that is right and good in our lives. As I look back over my life, I am forced to acknowledge that there have been many things that have happened to me that were beyond my ability to bring about. I can only conclude that it was the Lord's hand on my life and that he is Sovereign.

Let me close with these words of King Nebuchadnezzar.

34 At the end of that time, I, Nebuchadnezzar, raised my eyes toward heaven, and my sanity was restored. Then I praised the Most High; I honored and glorified him who lives forever.

His dominion is an eternal dominion; his kingdom endures from generation to generation.

35 All the peoples of the earth are regarded as nothing.

He does as he pleases with the powers of heaven and the peoples of the earth.

No one can hold back his hand or say to him: "What have you done?"

.... 37 Now I, Nebuchadnezzar, praise and exalt and glorify the King of heaven, because everything he does is right and all his ways are just. And those who walk in pride he is able to humble.
