"Listen Closely To My Words" Proverbs 4:18-27

I am a very simple man. I am not saying that I am a simpleton, but I am a simple man. I am not very complex. I don't understand complex things. Complex things



confuse me. My tastes are also very simple. Some people like to change things up. They believe that variety is the spice of like. However, I am quite content with the things I know and that I am familiar with. For instance, for most of my life, I ate the same thing for breakfast every day – a glass of orange juice and a bowl of cold cereal. I only drank one brand of frozen orange juice – Old South – and quit when I could no longer get it. I would eat any kind of cold cereal as long as it was Shreddies. Then for five or six years I ate nothing but Morning Crisp.

My running shoes lasted me for years. I had one favourite pair that I no longer remember the name of but they were dark blue. I acquired them in 1980 and wore them regularly until the late '80's. Then I used them as water shoes. Susan

finally persuaded me to throw them out after we got married in 1997. My wardrobe is very simple. I find comfortable clothes and I wear them until they wear out. Even after they are worn out I continue to wear them as work clothes until they literally fall apart.


To show you how really simple I am, let me tell you about how I view the Bible. The Bible is the most important book in my library. When I read it, I believe what it says. That is not to say that I understand everything the Bible says. There are times when my mind and intellect have trouble with a passage. Then I know that the problem is with me and not with the Bible. If I have a disagreement with the Bible, I know that it is right and I am wrong. I know that eventually God will bring me to a true understanding of what it is saying, even if it is not in my lifetime. The Bible is the Word of God. It is God's Word to me and I want it to be what moulds my life. I want to bring all my thinking, all my ideas and everything I do into conformity with what it teaches. The Bible reveals to us the mind of God and because God made me, I want to know his mind and follow his directions for how I am to live.

Before we turn to out text, let me make two important points. The first is found in the words of an Old Testament Scripture that Jesus quoted to Satan when he was being tempted. <u>4</u> Jesus answered, "It is written: 'Man shall not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God.'" (Matthew 4 quoting Deuteronomy 8:3) Every word that God speaks is important. That means every word

in the Bible and we are to live, not just by those that strike our fancy, but by them all. There are some passages which are so fundamental and important that they seem to carry a special extra measure of God's truth. I had an elder in Niagara Falls who when he heard something profound would say: "That's a bell ringer!" I would put today's text in the "bell ringer" category.



The second thing I want to say is how we can get the most out of this passage. Of course, we can hear it read or we can read it for ourselves. Trouble is, we retain only a small portion of what we read or hear. If we study the passage, we will retain more. However, if we memorize or meditate on it, we will retain much more. To meditate literally means "to murmur" or "to mutter". When I first read this passage, I sensed that it was important. When I read it a second time I knew it was important. When I began to appreciate just how much this passage could mean to me in my Christian life. So I set the goal of memorizing it. I wanted it stored in the memory banks of my mind. When something is stored in our memory banks, the



Holy Spirit can bring it to our minds when it is needed. Just a word of warning. It is easier to memorize things when you are younger than when you are older. Don't say: "I have no time to memorize God's truth now. I'll leave it until I retire." You will find that you have a decreased capacity to memorize when you get to retirement age.

Our passage begins with what is known as the Doctrine or Teaching of the Two Ways. It lays out clearly that there are two ways in life, **the path of the righteous** and **the way of the wicked**. This teaching is found in many places in Scripture. For instance, it is found in Psalm 1. The **blessed** person is the one whose delight is in the $2 \dots$ whose delight is in the law of the Lord,

and who meditates on his law day and night. The Psalmist goes on to describe this individual: <u>3</u> That person is like a tree planted by streams of water, which yields its fruit in season and whose leaf does not wither— whatever they do prospers. On the other hand are the wicked, sinners and mockers. <u>4</u> ... They are like chaff that the wind blows away. <u>5</u> Therefore the wicked will not stand in the judgment, nor sinners in the assembly of the righteous.

Jesus also taught about the two ways. In Matthew 7 we read: <u>13</u> "Enter through the narrow gate. For wide is the gate and broad is the road that leads to destruction, and many enter through it. <u>14</u> But small is the gate and narrow the road that leads to life, and only a few find it.



These two ways are clearly laid out in the early chapters of the Bible. Do you remember the story of Cain and Abel? Cain was wicked. He had a rebellious nature toward God and harboured hate in his heart towards his brother. Abel was righteous. He brought to God a sacrifice that was pleasing in his sight. In the end Cain took the broad path and rejected God's Word to him and murdered Abel.

We may think that because we are attending worship or go to church that we will automatically put us in the ranks of the righteous. Unfortunately, I have known many



wicked people who were regular church goers. They are not wicked in the sense that they have murdered someone or robbed a bank or cheated on their taxes or given false testimony against their neighbour. No, they are not at all like that. They are classed with the wicked because their hearts are hard towards God. They have a rebellious nature when it comes to the things of God. They live in the dark. The light of Jesus Christ has never shone into their lives. Listen to how they are described in our text: <u>19</u> But the way of the wicked is like deep darkness;

they do not know what makes them stumble.

How different is the person in verse 18: **The path** of the righteous is like the morning sun, shining ever brighter till the full light of day. What a beautiful picture. Here we have a people with a growing awareness and a growing light. They do not stumble because they can see where they are going. As they make their way through life it gets brighter and their understanding grows all the time.

Historically, these words were written by King Solomon for his son. We have no idea of how old his son was when Solomon was writing this. This passage has a historical setting because everything in the Bible has a historical setting. All the same, these words do not just have meaning



for when they were written. It is God's Word for us today as well. Verse 20 begins with the words "**my son**" or "**my child**". God is speaking to his own believing children in all periods of history. If you want a very quick but powerful message on the importance of God's Word, then this is it. You see, God himself is in his Word and it is through his word that he comes into our lives.

We are given four directives about God's Word.

- 1. We are to pay attention to what God says;
- 2. We are to listen closely to his words;
- 3. We are not to let them out of our sight; and
- 4. We are to keep them within our hearts.

First, God instructs us to pay attention to his words.

When we read God's Word, we are to give it our close and undivided attention. We hear a lot about distracted driving. What about distracted Bible reading? How many times have I sat there with the Bible in my hands but I couldn't tell you what I have read in the last five minutes. We need to focus our minds on the Word of God and give it our undivided attention. If our minds are divided, we will get little benefit from the Word of God. We need to come to the Word of God with singleness of purpose.

Second, God instructs us to listen closely to my words.

Do you listen, and I mean really listen when God's Word is read on Sunday morning? Or do your thoughts wander? Do you think about other more pressing things? Susan and I were talking to some old friends recently who now live in Alberta. I guess their online services must be really boring because the woman said that she played Sudoku during the service! Well, at least she was being honest. Do we play a game of Sudoku in our minds when Scripture is being read?

God's Word or words are something that we are to listen closely too. But there is a deeper understanding that clarifies how we are to listen. The King James Version puts it this way: **Incline your ear to my sayings.** An inclined ear indicates humility. It is the opposite of being proud and stiff-necked. To be humble is to be



teachable. It is to be willing to let God teach us.


In the story of the Israelites crossing the Sinai desert we have the exact opposite of people who are humble and teachable. In Psalm 78 we read: <u>40</u> **How often they rebelled against him in the wilderness and grieved him in the wasteland!** <u>41</u> Again and again they put God to the test; they vexed the Holy One of Israel. I can easily dismiss the Israelites but am I really any different? How many times in my stubbornness and unbelief have I set limits to what I believed that God would be able to do for me? When I come to Scripture, I come with all my prejudices and preconceptions. Like most people, I put limits on what God can do because it runs counter to my experience and contrary to my belief system. If I want to receive the full benefits of God's Word, I must learn to come to it with a humble and teachable spirit.

Third, do not let them out of your sight.

Again, this is a reference to God's words. God's Word is like having small children around water: - never let them out of your sight! In order to receive the benefits of God's words, we



must keep our eyes fixed unwaveringly on the Lord's promises. If we go down to verse 25 we find that these words are expanded on. <u>25</u> Let your eyes look straight ahead; fix your gaze directly before you. I believe that what is being referred to here is single – mindedness. Too many Christians have double vision. We get double vision by trying to look at two different things at the same time. We try to look at what is going on around us with one eye and with the other eye we try to look at God. James says that this type of person is double-minded. <u>7</u> That person should not expect to receive anything from the Lord. <u>8</u> Such a person is double-minded and unstable in all they do.

Jesus put it this way: 22 "The eye is the lamp of the body. If your eyes are healthy, your whole body will be full of light. 23 But if your eyes are unhealthy, your whole body will be full of darkness. If then the light within you is darkness, how great is that darkness! (Matthew 6) Remember, it is only the way of the wicked that is like deep darkness and they do not even

Years ago a farmer friend had me plow for him. He told me to strike one straight furrow down the centre of the field and then to work my way out on both sides from there. It was a huge field and I said to him: "How am I ever

going to make it from one end of the field to the other in a straight line?" He replied: "Can you see that huge tree that is just about smack dab in the middle of the field at the far fence row? Aim the tractor at that tree and don't take your eyes off of it. Do that and you will cut a fairly straight furrow." He was right. I wouldn't have won any prizes at a plowing match, but my first furrow was fairly straight.



Finally, keep them within your heart.



This instruction has to do with our hearts which is the core of our being and personality. Your heart is going to have a decisive influence on your Christian experience. 23 Above all else, guard your heart, for everything you do flows from it. In other words, what is in our hearts controls the course of our lives and what we experience. A person with only half-a- heart for God will have a very different life experience than the person who has a wholeheart for God.

If we receive God's words with careful attention – if we admit them regularly through our eyes and ears so that they occupy and control our hearts, then we will find them to be what God promises in verse 22: for they are life to those who find them and health to one's whole body. That is what God

promises and I am simple enough to believe that.

God promises **life to those who find them**. Most people are searching for meaning in life. They desperately want to know what it is all about but as they stumble about in the darkness they have no clue about where to find it. Even Christians spend most of their lives searching secular sources for what will make them happy. All this time, it is right here in God's Word. **These words** – the words of the Bible – are **life to those who find them**. I don't know about you but I want to experience all of what God has promised! I don't want to miss anything! To do that we need to search God's Word. We need to humble ourselves before him and say "Teach me all that you have for me." What we really want is for the life of God to flow through us. Only his words are **life to those**.

God also promises that his words are **health to one's whole body**. Years ago I read a book called "None of These Diseases". The title was based on two verses from Deuteronomy 7: <u>12</u> If you pay attention to these laws and are careful to follow them, then the LORD your God will keep his covenant of love with you, as he swore to your ancestors.... <u>15</u> The LORD will keep you free from every disease. He will not inflict on you the horrible diseases you knew in Egypt. My personal experience in this area is limited but I will not allow the truth of God's Word to be limited by my experience. Again, I am simple enough to believe what God's

Word says. If we live our lives according to God's Word, then I believe it will have an impact on our bodies. It will be **health to** (our) **whole bodies**.

I trust that later today or sometime this week you will take the time to re-read these verses of Scripture. Meditate on them and if you feel so led, memorize them. It is more than just taking these verses seriously. We need to allow them to mould our lives and form the people that we are. As I have suggested to you before: 8 Taste and see that the LORD is good; blessed is the one who takes refuge in him. (Psalm 34)
