"The Wheat And The Weeds"

Matthew 13: 24-30, 36-43 Rev. Beryl Orok



Every year Rob and I plant a vegetable garden, 2 in fact--with great hopes and visions for the harvest of fresh vegetable over the summer and into the fall. Just like many of you here we buy the seeds ahead. It's always fun to peruse the seed catalogues as they start arriving in January.

In past years, when we all participated in the variety of contests at Perth Fair, my husband and my brother would start about January, truthfully it was more like as soon as the fair ended, ordering pumpkin seeds. But not just any pumpkin seeds.---Giant pumpkin seeds; and so the Giant Pumpkin growing rivalry would begin; to be settled only by the decision of the fair board adjudicators or some beetle who ate the blossoms and ended the competition early.



Now when it comes to the vegetable garden each year, I remember planting the variety of vegetable seeds and seedlings but find myself inevitably wondering --- where on earth are all these weeds coming from??

Our flower gardens are another story---is it just me or are some plants that we called weeds --like mulleins, which we were sent out as kids to pull out-- now considered perennials that are sold for a good dollar in nurseries? Now I happen to like Mulleins so I let them grow where they wish. I like to see how tall they will grow and in bloom they are enticing the bees and their soft wooly leaves just add to their appeal. My Mom always points out to me that I have mulleins growing beside the house or elsewhere and just shakes her head when I say –I like them!

It is always a wait and see game with the perennial gardens ---is it a weed that is coming up or is it a perennial. I remember one year fervently weeding out bachelor's buttons and perennial asters!!! And more than once Rob's zeal for digging up the garden in the spring has resulted in the loss of anticipated plants before they even had a chance to survive.

Talking about weeds reminds me of: Murphy's First Law of gardening: When weeding, the best way to make sure you are removing a weed and not a valuable plant is to pull on it. If it comes out of the ground easily--it is a valuable plant.

The best definition of a weed I have found is: A weed is a plant that has mastered every survival skill except learning to grow in rows!!

Did you know there are over 30 references to weeds in the Bible? Now there is a project for you to search out.

Today we are going to reflect upon the parable about wheat and weeds from our scripture reading in Matthew 13. The parables of Jesus are intriguing because there was always a central theme. He told 7 parables to explain the mystery of the Kingdom of God to his listeners. The people of that day were awaiting the rule of a

visible, sovereign God to set up his kingdom on earth, but Jesus was there to tell them that the kingdom of God was within them and was already present.

The Old Testament Prophets Isaiah and Jeremiah, to name just a couple, lamented their awareness that the people of their time were so lost in sin that they resented hearing God's word and deliberately turned away from His teachings.

Well Jesus had the same experience! In fact there were those who wanted to kill him because of his teachings and so, being the master teacher that he was, he often spoke in parables (an earthly story that reflected a spiritual truth) in order to get people's attention and draw them into new ways of thinking about the truths of the Kingdom of God.

His words" Let those who have ears to hear, hear— Matthew 13: 9 reflects the wistful, longing, warning words of love, from He who had a tremendous gift to offer yet sometimes even His own followers, were too spiritually blind to see or too stubborn to accept.

Welsh Theologian C.H. Dodd stated "At its simplest the parable is a metaphor or a simile drawn from nature or common life, arresting the hearer by its vividness or strangeness and leaving the mind in sufficient doubt as to its precise application to tease the mind into active thought."

This parable of the wheat and the weeds is one that does this for me.

The agrarian based parable of the wheat and the weeds has always interested, challenged and somewhat puzzled me. Weeds among the wheat---like mustard in the farmer's grain field or pig weed amongst the radish or Lamb's Quarters among the kale. We are all familiar with these common weeds.

Now if you have a King James translation the title of this parable would read tares among the wheat. A tare was a weed; most likely referencing a very noxious weed called Darnell.

Darnell and wheat were almost indistinguishable. It was commonly known as false wheat! But at harvest time it could be readily identified from the wheat because the real heads of wheat would droop over; heavily laden with grain while the Darnel remained upright; light weight and useless.

Jesus explained the meaning of this parable to his disciples, upon their inquiry,



while they were alone, He turned the parable into an allegory; each element of the story having a spiritual element. It is noteworthy that this parable was told while Jesus was under the duress of a death threat; concocted by the authorities in response to a Sabbath act of civil disobedience by Jesus and his disciples.

Matthew 12: 1-2

At that time Jesus went through the grain fields on the Sabbath. And His disciples were hungry, and began to pluck heads of grain and to eat. And the Pharisees saw it, they said to Him, "Look, your disciples are doing what is not lawful to do on the Sabbath."

Jesus then went into a lengthy response reminding them of David when he was hungry, entering into the temple and eating the showbread from the altar which was forbidden except for the priests.

He ended the discourse with the statement, "The Son of Man is Lord, even of the Sabbath!"

The Pharisees of course were livid by such a claim!

This parable of the wheat and the weeds may leave us with some questions and I hope it does, because it is in that questioning, that we open ourselves to the Spirit to lead our study and inform our conscience.

At first glance the explanation of this parable's meaning seems pretty simple--it is about the church as the field where God plants in the hope of gaining a rich harvest of blessing and souls. God is represented as the landowner and the weeds are those who are led by the evil one.

We, the Church, are the field of God--we are the ground God works, the plants God nurtures and the people God rests hope in. Wow ---have you ever given that much thought? What a privilege to be called children of God ---those whom God's hope rests in!! Our hope rests in Jesus Christ our Savior but God's hope rests in us individually and as the church of Jesus Christ here on earth.

Just as the wheat is a precious commodity to the farmer, we are precious to God as a body of believers and as individuals within that body!

The parable relates that the laborers are quick to identify the weeds and the solution in their mind is --- pull them out. Get rid of them!

But take note here that they first went to ask the master for direction before they took action.

This noteworthy action reminds us as the old song says ---take it to the Lord in prayer. When we are tempted to rush to action or judgement; ask the landowner!!



But when the dutiful servants report the growth of the weeds; the farmer / landowner refuses to risk losing any wheat in order to be rid of the weeds.

We are often much like those servants. We sometimes look out upon the world and we see and experience evil.

We see weeds of violence, starvation, betrayal, hatred, suffering of all kinds, evil deeds and words, and we ask WHY??? Why can't all those perpetrators be dealt with –severely and stopped.

There is a familiar theme in the gospels: the shepherd leaves the 99 to find the 1 lost sheep, the woman searches and searches for the lost coin. You see in God's economy nothing; no one, is wasted or expendable. Everyone matters to God! So, it is not surprising in this parable that the landowner gave instructions to let the weeds grow along with the wheat, in case the wheat be damaged or destroyed in trying to uproot the weeds. The servants in the parable became upset, concerned that there were weeds among the wheat, concerned that the harvest might not turn out well, concerned that the good purposes of their master might fail! But the wheat survived and was not poisoned by the weeds.

We can make sense of this when we think about farmer's crops, but when we try to make application to the community of believers or our own lives it's a little more difficult. The ideal church is filled with loving, kind, nonjudgmental people who serve shoulder to shoulder in the work of God in their community and around the world. Yes that's the Ideal!!

Fact is not everyone is good or godly! These are the weeds Jesus was referring to and not everything is as it should be in the Church at times, yet I risk to say how ungodly we can become, i.e. damaged we become, when we take on the task of judging others or become invested in harshly condemning ourselves without recognizing the work of the Spirit in our lives to redeem and renew.

Reality is that sometimes we do grow impatient with what we see around us, becoming judgmental of the actions of those we might consider to be "weeds" Please be aware though that when we start thinking and feeling like this our own "weed nature" is sprouting and growing and if not contained will come into full bloom spreading seeds of destruction in our midst, in our personal lives and often in the lives of others.

It is so easy to become focused on weeds and lose sight of the beauty and the fragrance of the bouquet of flowers that make up the rest of the Church! We tend to like labelling weeds in the church—trouble makers, liars, manipulators, ungodly persons. But we can't forget that there is transformative power in God's Word and in the presence of the Holy Spirit and treated with patience and love, what we thought were weeds may just turn out to be wheat. We can not know!

We serve a mysterious God who will exhibit great patience and love towards those we might be quick to deem unworthy!

The landowner in the parable did not abandon his field because it had some weeds. God does not abandon us or His church! He is fully aware and remains committed to us, to the thriving of His people in the church.

This Jewish fable makes an important point about the character of God. When the ministering angels saw the Egyptians floundering in the sea after the Israelites passed over, they burst into song. But God rebuked them saying: My children are drowning in the sea and you would rejoice!!

This is our God, a God of love, who is yet the righteous judge, who sees the heart and meads out justice righteously.

He is God, the landowner who says ----do not disturb it! Do not try to pluck it out--because if you do you are going to wreck the whole place: you're going to end up
pulling up wheat, as well as, weeds no matter how careful you are and you are going
to develop an eye of judgement. While you might be right in that judgement, you may
end up doing wrong. Leave it to me---wait for the time I have set!
In the natural we think "get rid of the weed", but the dim insight of human wisdom or
the closed eyes of human pride and fear leads us astray and into the weed patch.

Some of those plants deemed weeds and of no value, when I was young, I still see blooming and beautiful; like the delicate Queen Ann's Lace along the roadway! Some weeds can serve important functions like preventing soil erosion or can be used in herbal medications. Back to my Mulleins! Mullein can effectively clear excessive amounts of mucous in the lungs, cleanses the bronchial tubes, and soothes inflammation of the respiratory tract. Its leaves and flowers are used in the preparation of a potent herbal extract.

SO---- what can weeds teach us, what good are weeds, what good can come of a weed?

Weeds amongst us serve to make us humble and force us, if we are open to the Spirit, to seek God for direction and to see with God's eyes.

Weeds in our midst convict us of our need to love as God loves, to be patient, to hope and pray for the best. Maturity in the life of a weed can bring amazing changes. Remembering always that God does not wish that any should perish!

Throughout life good and evil, wheat and weeds are intertwined in unpredictable, unavoidable, perplexing ways.

Paul in his honesty spoke in Romans 7: 15 about his personal weed nature; about the constant turmoil of doing the very thing he didn't want to do! That's living with weeds personally!!

What good can come of having to deal with the weeds in our individual lives? Well for one thing --recognizing our personal weeds and tendencies to act like a noxious weed will humble us.

A humble and contrite heart God will not despise. Psalm 51:17

We need to rely on God, not our own sense of self-sufficiency or self-importance. It also makes us more forgiving and understanding of others in their struggles. Joy and sorrow, laughter and tears, success and failure, surprise and disappointment, triumph and tragedy, love and loss intertwine like the wheat and the weeds in the soil of our lives as people of God.

Remember God loved the Egyptians too. He loves those we might consider weeds and he loves us even though we have our own garden of weeds within to contend with.

The final harvest belongs to God alone! Praise be to God!

Personally I am so grateful that God does not root out a weed at first sprouting!

Always it is our best service to God to be the wheat faithful and obedient, bearing good fruit and walking in God's ways; rather than spending our energy thrashing the weeds around us and thrashing ourselves for our human struggles.

Wm. Barkley in writings from The Gospel of Matthew said, "The only person with the right to judge is God. It is God alone who can discern good and bad: it is God alone who sees the entire person and all that's person's life. It is God alone who can judge!"

I would like to close with Paul's advice to the Romans found in Chapter 12 of the book of Romans from the Message translation.

Live in harmony with one another; do not be harsh, but associate with the lowly: do not claim to be wiser than you are: do not repay anyone evil for evil but take thought for what is noble in the sight of all.

Do not be overcome by evil but overcome evil with good! Let those who have ears to hear do so!
