"Fostering An Attitude Of Thanksgiving" Rev. John McIntyre

The Parable of the rich fool read from Luke's Gospel, presented us with a man who among other things, neglected giving thanks to God. It was as if his prosperity arose solely from his skill and smarts, and so he approaches his abundance with an air of entitlement.

Among the things the Bible teaches and insists upon, giving thanks to God is writ large. In fact, recognizing Him as God is inseparably linked to giving Him thanks. (Rom 1:21) teaches us that, God's displeasure with people & judgment of them emerges from their refusal to acknowledge Him as God or give thanks to Him.

As Christians, we need to beware of being ungrateful and unthankful. And so, we will consider, "Fostering a Thanksgiving Attitude."

Text: (I These 5:18), "... Give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you."

I. Fostering a thankful attitude is founded in God.

In his pamphlet "The will of God," the late Dr. Henry Budd comments: "In all circumstances God's will for you is to think, react, and live like a Christian! He wants you to approach life with a Christ-like spirit, and that means in an attitude of trust and thankfulness. Trust and thankfulness are inseparables; thankfulness is the outgrowth of trust He who trusts God can give thanks in everything."

Scripture reiterates that faith/trust in God is the foundation for thankfulness and growth in it. The command to give thanks to the Lord is a repeated refrain. (Psa 107:1) "Oh give thanks to the LORD, for he is good, for his steadfast love [mercy] endures for ever."

Thankfulness is founded in God and his Goodness

O give thanks to the Lord - **Why?** "For He is good." It is God's nature to be kind & generous. (Ps 84:11) tells us that "... The LORD bestows favor and honor. No good thing does he withhold from those who walk uprightly." And in (I Cor 3:21-22) we read these words: "For all things are yours...and you are Christ's, and Christ is God's"

C. H. Spurgeon had this to say about God's goodness to his people. Grace makes us walk uprightly and this secures every covenant blessing to us. What a wide promise! Some apparent good may be withheld, but no real good, no, not one. "All things are yours, and ye are Christ's, and Christ is God's." God has all good, there is no good apart from him, and there is no good which he either needs to keep back or will on any account refuse us, if we are but ready to receive it.

God is good - Every good gift & every perfect gift is from Him. (Jas 1:17) Listen to these testimonies of His goodness from the following Bible passages.

God protects His people:

(Psa 27:1) The LORD is my light and my salvation, whom shall I fear? The LORD is the stronghold of my life, of whom shall I be afraid?

He rewards His people:

(Gen 15:1) (to Abraham) "... I am your shield, your very great reward." (Jn 1:16) From the fullness of his grace we have <u>all</u> received one blessing after another.

(Rom 8:16) The Spirit himself testifies... that we are God's children.

The Lord exalts His people:

(Isa 60:19) *the LORD will be your everlasting light, and your God will be your glory.* **He comforts His people:**

(Isa 60:20) The LORD will be your everlasting light, & your days of sorrow will end. (2 Cor 4:17) For our light and momentary troubles are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all.

(Php 1:6) ... Being confident of this, that he who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus.

Well might the Psalmist call on us, to give thanks to the Lord for He is good! And also, in (Psa 34:9-10) to ...fear the LORD, you his saints, for those who fear him have no lack...those who seek the LORD lack no good thing.

But not only is thankfulness founded in God & His goodness.

Thankfulness is founded in God and His steadfast love/mercy.

The Psalmist writes, "O give thanks unto the LORD, for he is good: for his steadfast love [mercy] endures forever." When tempted to grumble in our circumstances instead of being thankful, here's a truth to keep in mind. "Do not grumble because you do not get what you want; be thankful you do not get what you deserve!"

The term "mercy" means "compassion for the miserable" we observe this when we read in romans 5 that, "While we were yet sinners, Christ died for us." That's mercy! "His mercy endures forever." That's steadfast love! And amid any/all circumstances – That's a reason/cause for thanksgiving!

God shows mercy - In His saving works. Moses bears testimony in (Ex 15:13) that, "You have led in your steadfast love the people whom you have redeemed; you have guided them by your strength to your holy abode."

The Lord shows mercy – In his personal dealings with repentant sinners. David prays in (Psa. 51:1) *Have mercy on me, O God, according to your steadfast love; according to your abundant mercy blot out my transgressions.*

He shows his great mercy - In the salvation he freely gives in Christ. (Titus 3:5) reminds us that, *He saved us, not because of righteous things we had done, but because of his mercy.* Again in (Eph. 2:4-5) we read, *"But God, who is <u>rich in mercy, because of His great love with which He loved us, even when we were dead in trespasses, made us alive together with Christ ..."*</u>

He shows mercy in a salvation that carries us into eternity (Psa 23:6) where we read, *"Surely goodness & mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, and I shall dwell in the house of the Lord forever."* Spurgeon reminds us that in all our days we have two constant companions following us named, "Goodness" and "Mercy."

And so, founded in God we can foster an attitude of thankfulness and, "... Give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you."

II. Emulating godly examples bolsters a thanksgiving attitude First, there is Jesus as our example.

In (Mt 15:36) He thanks God for the loaves & fishes prior to feeding 5,000. Note his humility in thanksgiving. He thanks God though his provision seems so small! He gave thanks in spite of the meagerness of the situation. Our Saviour's God founded trust was demonstrated in thankfulness

He gives thanks to God - On the eve of His crucifixion (Lk. 22:17-19) where we read that he took the bread and gave thanks to God. Then he took the cup and gave thanks again. He gave thanks to God in the eve of the most horrific circumstance. There he was, the innocent One, suffering/dying for the sins of the world, the holy One – The one who knew no sin being made sin for us. And he makes bold to give thanks to his heavenly father, because his life & his faith was founded in God.

He trusted God's promise – That he would raise Him from the dead. He looked beyond His circumstances to that which was beyond. He anticipated the joy set before Him beyond this world and endured the cross and despised its shame. And as He faced it all – He thanked God!

Then there is the Apostle Paul for an example

What an encouragement he is to us, in fostering a thanksgiving attitude. Writing to the church in Philippi, from the dark, damp Roman prison cell and suffering as a prisoner, he portrays an attitude of thanksgiving as he writes in (Php. 1:3), *"I thank my God every time I remember you."* It seems every day was "Thanksgiving Day" for the Apostle.

Again, he writes, (Php. 4:6-7) Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts & your minds in Christ Jesus. His life was founded in & hidden with Christ in God, and because it was, he exuded a thankful attitude. He could write from experience and with authenticity (I Thess 5:18), "Give thanks in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus."

You and I are called to do no less. Our Lord who calls us to a thanksgiving attitude also enables us. He enables us and indeed compels us by Christ's love poured into us. As believers in Jesus Christ, You and I can follow the lead of our Saviour and the Apostle Paul. They were thankful, because they not only trusted in God, they trusted his promises. In other words, they trusted what God says. The same can be true of us – And by God's grace will be true of us.

Consider this verse of testimony as we close. (Psa. 75:1) We give thanks to you, O God; we give thanks, for your name is near. We recount your wondrous deeds. In all circumstances, we can give thanks – For your name is near. God himself is near his people. He is our Father – Present by his Spirit through Christ. And because he is - We can declare His wondrous works.

Have there been times when you were tempted and you turned away from it. That's his wondrous work! Have there been times you were rescued after yielding to temptation, and the Lord turned it for your good. That is his wondrous work! Have there been times when you were spared from (You name it). That too is his wondrous work! What about the times when you were blessed. It's his wondrous work at work again! It is all because God is good and His mercy endures forever

Charles E. Jefferson writes: "Gratitude is born in hearts that take time to count up past mercies."

In view of all this - Surely you and I can foster a thanksgiving attitude. But you may still not be convinced you <u>should</u> be thankful in all circumstances, or that you <u>can</u> be thankful in all circumstances? Here is a little poem that may be of help.

How to Observe Thanksgiving

Count your blessings instead of your crosses; Count your gains instead of your losses. Count your joys instead of your woes; Count your friends instead of your foes.

Count your smiles instead of your tears; Count your courage instead of your fears. Count your full years instead of your lean; Count your kind deeds instead of your mean. Count your health instead of your wealth; Count on God instead of yourself.

In closing, let us continue to foster a thanksgiving attitude. And indeed, let us be among those who overflow with thankfulness to God in keeping with Paul's instructions to the church of his day in Colossi when he writes (Col. 2:7)"So then, just as you received Christ Jesus as Lord, continue to live in him, rooted and built up in him, strengthened in the faith as you were taught, and overflowing with thankfulness."

Let us therefore, "Give thanks in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus"
