The Resurrection of Christ

Now I would remind you, brothers, of the gospel I preached to you, which you received, in which you stand, 2 and by which you are being saved, if you hold fast to the word I preached to you—unless you believed in vain.

3 For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, 4 that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures, 5 and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. 6 Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have fallen asleep. 7 Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. 8 Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me. 9 For I am the least of the apostles, unworthy to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. 10 But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me was not in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them, though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. 11 Whether then it was I or they, so we preach and so you believed.

"The Quarrel Taken Up and Won" Rev. John McIntyre

As we approach Remembrance Day many of us will recall memorizing the poem "In Flanders Fields" by Lieut. Col. John McCrae

In Flanders Fields the poppies blow
Between the crosses row on row,
That mark our place; and in the sky
The larks, still bravely singing, fly
Scarce heard amid the guns below.
We are the Dead. Short days ago
We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow,
Loved and were loved, and now we lie
In Flanders fields

Take up our quarrel with the foe:
To you from failing hands we throw
The torch; be yours to hold it high.
If ye break faith with us who die
We shall not sleep, though poppies grow
In Flanders fields.

John McCrae's "In Flanders Fields" remains to this day one of the most memorable war poems ever written. It is a lasting legacy of the terrible battle at Ypres in the spring of 1915. As a surgeon, Major McCrae, had spent seventeen days treating injured men – Canadians, British, Indians, French, and Germans. Listen to the lines he writes about it:

"I wish I could embody on paper some of the varied sensations of that seventeen days... Seventeen days of Hades! At the end of the first day if anyone had told us we had to spend seventeen days there, we would have folded our hands and said it could not have been done."

"Seventeen days of Hades!" inspired "In Flanders Fields." It is a poem written amid despair & death.

"We are the dead," goes the poem. It is written as it were by a dead man. Listen to his plaintiff cry emerging from his grave below the poppies; "Take up our quarrel with the foe."

Who is the enemy – Who is this quarrelsome foe? It is that which brings us death. And what is it that brings death? The Bible tells us that the sting of death is <u>sin</u>. Our sin amounts to falling short of God's holy law. It is the blight that causes death. And so, our quarrel is with sin & its consequence; Death. This quarrel is a fight that none of us can win. Why? Because all people sin. Therefore, all die.

Yet the dead cry out "Take up our quarrel with the foe."

But the good news of the gospel is that, the quarrel has been taken up and won! We read about it in I Cor 15:1-10 which was read earlier in our service. In this passage we are presented with several comforting insights the first insight being The Source of the Gospel – Christ died for our sins. In verse 3 Paul writes the following: What I received I passed on to you as of first importance: that Christ died for our sins. Of all the things in life that are deemed important, this is of first importance! Why? Because what profit is there in gaining the whole world, and then lose your own soul?

Nothing is more important than the gospel message that, Christ died for our sins. It is important because (Rom 1:16) tells us that the gospel *is the power of God for the salvation of everyone who believes* it. In the gospel we have the good news that the penalty for sin has been paid. Remember (V. 3) of our text. It says *Christ died for our sins*. In other words, Christ has taken up our quarrel with the foe and in his death

on the cross he has paid the penalty for our sins. Because of Christ's death on the cross, God has pardoned our sins since Jesus has suffered the penalty due us. The Bible says, *The wages of sin is death – But the gift of God is eternal life in Jesus Christ our Lord.* (Rom 6:23).

But now only has the penalty for our sin been paid off, the pollution of our sin has been purged for (I Cor 15:4) tells us that *He was buried, and He was raised on the third day*. Jesus died, & was officially pronounced dead. He was rendered subject to corruption by being placed in the grave where his – destined for decay by the perpetrators who plotted his death. But the pollution of sin that brings death & decay to sinners failed to destroy Jesus! He was raised from the dead in an incorruptible condition! Thus, his death purges away, the pollution of sin. The penalty for sin has been paid, the pollution of sin has been purged and also, the power of sin has been defeated. (V. 4) says "He was raised on the third day."

Christ's physical resurrection from the dead has defeated the power of sin. Sin, death & the grave proved powerless to hold Him. In (Acts 2:24) St Peter tells us that, God raised him from the dead, freeing him from the agony of death, *because it was impossible for death to keep its hold on him*. Jesus, the Son of God, has taken the torch from failing hands. He has taken up the quarrel with the foe and he has gained the victory. He has won the battle the most important battle. He has demolished the power, pollution & penalty of sin, death & hell.

But was His victory just His own personal victory? No! The text informs us about the force of the Gospel in Christ dying for our sins. (V. 2.) says that "By this gospel you are saved if you hold firmly to the word." And so, we can say that the Gospel is a saving force. It is the power of God for the salvation of everyone who believes for in the gospel a righteousness from God is revealed, (Rom 1:17). How does this saving righteousness from God come to us? We are saved by God's grace through faith! It's a faith that rests in Christ alone. It's a faith that believes (II Co 5:19, 21), where it tells us that God was in Christ reconciling the world to himself, not counting men's sins against them. It further states that God made him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

The gospel is a saving force. Jesus is able to save completely those who come to God through him. But not only is it a saving force, the Gospel is a sanctifying force for our text tells us that "By this gospel you are saved" (NIV) or as another translation says, "being saved" (ESV). (Heb 7:25) tells us that, "He (Jesus) is able to save completely those who come to God through him, because he always lives to intercede for them. The apostle Paul writes that believers can be, "Confident of this, that he who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion." (Php 1:6) With faith resting in Christ we are assured that, 'He is able to keep you from falling and to present you before God's glorious presence without fault and with great joy." (Jude 1:24)

Then too, The Gospel is a stabilizing force. Paul writes in (V. 1) "I want to remind you of the gospel . . . on which you have taken your stand." The gospel of Jesus Christ isn't a crutch to prop you up. It is a rock for a man or woman to stand on! It's the foundation that gives you standing with God.

Listen to what the Bible says about it. Therefore, there is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus, (Ro 8:1) Neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord. (Ro 8:39) For no matter how many promises God has made, they are "Yes" in Christ. It is God who makes you stand firm in Christ. (II Cor 1:20-21).

The gospel is a saving force, a sanctifying force and a stabilizing force. If your faith rests in Christ, you are secured to the Rock which cannot move. You are positioned on the high ground and kept under His unconquerable cover. You are rendered impregnable to the foe of sin & death. And all this because the power of Christ revealed in the Gospel has conquered all that stands against us. In Christ's birth, life, death, resurrection & ascension, "Death has been swallowed up in victory." In other words, the quarrel has been taken up and won!

Listen to the taunt of the one who trusts in Christ. (I Cor 15:55-57) "Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?" The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God! He gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ." Christ's victory over our foe of sin & death was not for Himself. It was for us! He gives **us** the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

Who is the "Us?" referred to in this passage? It is the "Us" who believe in Him.

And so, there is the source of the Gospel, Jesus Christ. And there is also in him, the force of the gospel. And finally, there is the course of the Gospel. Paul writes (Vss. 8-10) "And last of all he appeared to me . . . the least of the apostles not deserving to be called an apostle because I persecuted the church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am, and His grace to me was not without effect."

In speaking of the course of the gospel I am referring to the fact that the gospel is extended to every person. It extends to the least of persons, the most undeserving person and even to Christ's enemies. The apostle Paul writes: "I persecuted the church of God," and he extended His grace even to the likes of me for he says, His grace to me was not without effect. In other words, the gospel of the saving power of Jesus Christ was effective in Paul's case and in this he rejoiced. And so, as Paul testifies, Jesus as presented in the gospel is able to save to the uttermost those who come to God through him. The gospel extends to every person.

Further to this, the gospel extends to every place. Paul met Christ along the highway to Damascus,

and Christ's grace was effective.

A thief met Christ as he hung on the cross beside him, and Christ's grace was effective for that thief though he was only moments away from death. A Roman

centurion heard the gospel in his home, and Christ's grace was effective for the one considered a foreigner outside the place of god's blessing and reach. The gospel extends to this place & to the person sitting where you are. Christ's grace is and will be effective for you, if and when you place your faith in Him. There is no place that you can go and be out of the reach of Christ and his power to save.

And finally, the gospel extends to every problem. At one time prior to this, Paul had a problem. His problem had been self-righteous rejection of Jesus. Yet his rejection of Christ was not equal to the gospel's power. When Jesus confronted him on the Damascus road, Paul cried out to Him in faith and was gloriously saved. Christ's grace showed its effect in Paul's faith and the change it brought to his character and life. The fact of the matter is that all our problems flow from sin. Sorrow and death and all the other adversities of life are offshoots of sin. But Christ has overcome them all and now resides and is in session on our behalf at the right hand of God the Father almighty awaiting the moment when he returns in great power and glory to make all things new.

And so, we can say with certainty that Christ has taken up our quarrel with the foe, and he has won.

He has won the victory for us. It is ours for the taking. We make His victory ours by trusting in Him for the Bible declares that "Whoever calls on the name of the Lord – shall be saved."

Christ died for our sins – This is of first importance. He is the power/revelation of God for salvation to all who believe. May this salvation be yours today.
