"The Way of the Wilderness"

Ex 15:22-27

- 22 ¶ Then Moses made Israel set out from the Red Sea, and they went into the wilderness of Shur. They went three days in the wilderness and found no water.
- 23 When they came to Marah, they could not drink the water of Marah because it was bitter; therefore it was named Marah.
- 24 And the people grumbled against Moses, saying, "What shall we drink?"

25 And he cried to the LORD, and the LORD showed him a log, and he threw it into the water, and the water became sweet. There the LORD made for them a statute and a rule, and there he tested them,

26 saying, "If you will diligently listen to the voice of the LORD your God, and do that which is right in his eyes, and give ear to his commandments and keep all his statutes, I will put none of the diseases on you that I put on the Egyptians, for I am the LORD, your healer."

27 Then they came to Elim, where there were twelve springs of water and seventy palm trees, and they encamped there by the water.

The passage just read takes place within a context of a recent great triumph and celebration. For the children of Israel, Egyptian bondage and slavery are now well behind them. They have been miraculously delivered unscathed through the parted waters of the Red Sea, while the pursuing Pharaoh with all the military power of Egypt, are inundated by the collapsing waters and are reduced to floating corpses washing up on the shores of the same Red Sea.

Upon the realization of their great deliverance to safety and the demise of their enemies, they break out into jubilant song and dance to celebrate liberation in the defeat of the Egyptian army.

Now they are about to set out for the land of promise. But notice the "way" that they went. V. 22 *Then Moses made Israel set out from the Red Sea, and they went into the wilderness of Shur.* You would think that following their victory and celebration, Moses would have led them straight to the Promised Land by the most direct route. But no, we find Israel marching out into the wilderness of Shur, a long march that moved through an empty wasteland. They probably wouldn't have chosen to go that way. But it was the way chosen for them by God. You see, God had marked out a path for them.

Ex. 13:17-18, we read that, When Pharaoh let the people go, God did not lead them by way of the land of the Philistines, although that was near... But God led the people around by the way of the wilderness toward the Red Sea.

The way they were led wasn't the only way. They could have gone north-east from Egypt toward Canaan. It wasn't the shortest way. (From Egypt to Canaan was a 4-5 day journey by foot). It wasn't the easy way. But it was God's way. He led the people away from the most direct path and into the wilderness.

Moses and the people never would have chosen it. But at the very outset of the exodus, God chose to lead the people around by the way of the wilderness. And in this morning's text we again find them being led further into the wilderness.

He did this for very good reasons. God knew their weakness. He knew that hardship would make Egypt look good and tempt them to turn back. He knew they needed to have their faith in Him strengthened. God knew that His people needed to learn to trust Him for everything.

God still operates the same way. Why? Because we still need to learn to trust Him. Often our Lord restructures our plans, & leads us "by the way of the

wilderness." You and I would never have chosen the same way. But God does. Pr. 16:9 *The mind of man plans his way, But the LORD directs his steps.* The Lord directs our steps, even into the wilderness.

And so, God led Israel into the wilderness. A wilderness where Moses was refined in the crucible of leadership. A wilderness where all the people were confronted by their own insufficiencies. But a wilderness where God showed His super sufficiency for them again and again. Although God moves us in directions that seem, illogical, less than desirable, difficult and even impossible from our own vantage point, he knows what is best!

We needn't despair when God closes off easier routes and leads us into the wilderness. Even though His ways seem impossible, unrealistic, and contrary to our ways, Scripture teaches that we can trust Him even when He takes us into the wilderness. And so we find Israel being led from the song and celebration of the Red Sea, out into the wilderness of Shur.

As they set out, singing soon turned to sighing. As they traveled along, the water began to run low. They probably began to drink sparingly from their cracking, leather water bottles. No doubt, parents started to worry. Children became cranky, asking again and again, "Are we near there yet." The second day out brought no relief. As the hot sun beat down, cracked lips & thirsty throats pined to gorge on water. "Go easy." "Don't drink too much." On into day three anxiety and grumbling sets in, and hopes are fast fading, for the text tells us they "found no water." What a sudden turnaround of events! From exuberance to exasperation. In only three days the wonders of the Red Sea faded into the wastes of the wilderness.

But all of a sudden word of water sweeps through the parched crowd: "There's water up ahead!" Despair turns to hope! Anxiety turns to faith! Despondency is transformed into optimism! As the joy of anticipation fills their hearts their strength is renewed. And so they hasten their steps to the promising pool of water. There's almost a race to get there. All in one motion it seems, jars are dipped into the water then tipped toward thirsty lips to be gulped down. And then to the shock of eager onlookers, the water is spewed from gagging mouths. "This water's no good! It's bitter!"

In one gulp, their faith, hope and optimism turned to the bile of bitterness. For (Vs. 23-25) tell us, When they came to Marah, they could not drink the water of Marah because it was bitter; therefore it was named Marah. And the people grumbled against Moses, saying, "What shall we drink?" And he cried to the LORD, and the LORD showed him a log, and he threw it into the water, and the water became sweet. There the LORD made for them a statute and a rule, and there he tested them,

Think of their disappointment. God's leading of His people around by the way of the wilderness brought them to a pool of bitter water. A bitterness of water that dismayed and angered the people into a bitterness of soul. They had followed the Lord, and they found bitterness in the way of His leading. And we find them in a state where they are fit to be tied.

Like us, they were quick to forget that an almighty sovereign God was in charge of their journey. As we so often do, they saw things backwards and upside down. They thought they were testing the Lord as they murmured against His leading. But the fact was, the Lord was testing them!

God led them by the way of the wilderness, not as a way of rapid and comfortable transportation, but as a way of a slow and challenging education. He would have them learn to trust Him and know Him. Israel had followed the path of salvation, victory and joy, through the sea. But now the Lord shows them the path of faith through the wilderness, a place of disappointment, disillusionment. And there (the text tells us), God tested them.

Maybe the person sitting where you are is presently going through a similar experience. You have known something of God's deliverance and the joy of redemption. You were anticipating green pastures and still waters. Yet you find yourself in some kind of wilderness wondering, "Where is God?" Your faith is perhaps being stretched. At times you may even think He has deserted you. How is a person to respond?

Well, let's look at the children of Israel. What would they do? What were their choices? They couldn't go on ahead. The canteens were dry! To go back to where they had come from would mean defeat and death. They certainly couldn't stay where they were. They were in and impossible predicament.

Following so great a deliverance and victory at the Red Sea, would they not respond with faith believing that he who had would began a good work in them would be faithful and keep them? Would you and I have responded that way? Do we respond that way in our wildernesses? Or do we respond as they did, in bitterness against God. For it was in bitterness that they cried out to Moses: "What shall we drink?" But Moses was in the same predicament and as helpless as they were.

So as the people cried out in bitterness, Moses cried out to the Lord. And in spite of their complaining and distrust, the Lord met their need. Their bitter complaint in the furnace of testing evidenced the weakness of their faith in God. And though they proved faithless, God proved himself utterly faithful. He caused the bitter water to be sweetened by means of a log (some translations call it a tree) thrown into it, thereby sustaining His people, confirming his faithfulness promise and producing faith within them.

In the wilderness of the bitter waters of Marah the Lord showed his people their helplessness as well as their dependence on Him. He showed them that He alone is their God, their source and supplier of life. The wilderness of Marah was the place God showed them that he was willing and able to maintain his people and provide for their needs. He further revealed himself as their "Healer" and in return he expected them to trust and obey him in return (v. 26).

They needed reminding that the Egyptian Pharaoh was no longer their master. The Lord had supernaturally delivered them from bondage and death. Now they are now under God's jurisdiction. They are to trust Him for everything instead of looking solely to earthly resources for remedy. They are now under the ownership and authority of a redeeming, healing God. They are to obey Him and trust Him. They are not masters of their own destiny. They are to listen to the voice of the Lord: Not their own distorted voice. They are to do what is right in His sight: Not their own sight. They are to pay attention to what He commands and do it: Not do as they wish.

And to engender trust and obedience in them, God graciously confirms His word and transforms bitter water into sweet water, manifesting Himself as divine Healer of all mortal ills.

There is significance in this episode that we must not miss. In Scripture, trees are often seen as the symbols of God's blessing. In this text, the log/tree and its effect prefigure another tree. The New Testament tells us Christ was crucified upon a tree. It was on the bitterly cruel tree that Christ provided healing for sin & became a blessing. (Gal 3:13) says, *Christ redeemed us from the curse of the law by becoming a curse for us* — *for it is written, "Cursed is everyone who is hanged on a tree"*

The bitter water made sweet also prefigures "Water" of another nature. In Jn. 4, Jesus offered the Samaritan woman "Living Water." In Jn. 7, Jesus said, "If any man is thirsty, let him come to Me and drink." In Jn. 19, we read that on the cross and already dead, the body of Jesus was pierced with the spear of a Roman soldier, and that there poured out from His side, blood and water. It is by his life's blood that we are provided atonement for and remission of our sins. The water he provides is life giving and purifies us for life here and on into eternity.

And to go on, water is the outward sign and seal of our Christian faith. We are baptized into Christ; His death, His resurrection, and the newness of His resurrected life. Baptism demonstrates our inseparable union with Him. It demonstrates to us and to the world that, at the cross, God settled things. At the cross, God met our need. The cross was bitter for our dear Lord as he took the sins of the world upon himself. There the bitterness of our sin was absolved and by his death our lives are made sweet and we receive life eternal.

But receiving Christ and being united with Him carries obligations with it. We need to realize that we are not our own, that we have been bought with a price and that we are now bound to trust and obey Him – even in the wilderness!

You may find yourself in the wilderness of affliction this morning. If you are a Christian, take courage, the one who saved you is faithful. Your Lord still goes before you. As your Saviour & Lord, he is the Good Shepherd, leading you in paths of righteousness that ultimately lead you to himself in deeper faith and on to eternal life.

As we think on these things, did you ever stop to consider that God might have led you around this way for a purpose? It could be that He has brought you into

this wilderness in order, to test your faith or to bring you further along in your trust and commitment to Him. He is taking you down this path, and you have a choice to make. You can grumble and become bitter by judging God and blaming him. Or you can turn to Him in faith by crying out to Him for healing in this situation.

Are you prepared to render the obedience of that faith to Him? He is worthy of your trust amid the present difficulties you may be experiencing. Will you and I turn to the One who is our healer; casting all our cares upon Him for he cares for us? Will we listen for His voice and obey His command? (Heb 3:7-8) instructs us with these words: "Today, if you hear his voice, do not harden your hearts as in the rebellion, on the day of testing in the wilderness..." It could be that God is speaking through the dilemma to which he has brought you. Don't become bitter. Take all that the cross means and throw it into the pool of bitterness? God can transform bitterness into a sweet tasting experience. God can and will meet your need, for your good and his glory.

The great thing about it is that once those bitter waters have been transformed and you experience the Lord's healing, He leads you on to better things. Marah afforded Israel the opportunity to discover God's resources. And having tasted that the Lord is good, they were ready to proceed. You see Israel didn't remain in camp at the place of bitterness, they moved on. (V.27) tells us, "Then they came to Elim, where there were twelve springs of water and seventy palm trees, and they encamped there by the water."

Compared to the bitterness of Marah, Elim was Heaven. Elim was a place of abundance and fruitfulness. It was a place of God's bounty and provision. It was a place of encouragement to the heart, and refreshment to the spirit after the trials of Marah.

This is the way God leads us. For those who are faithful, there is an eternal Elim on up ahead. Beyond every Marah there is an Elim. Beyond trial there is triumph. In (Rev. 22), We read of the river of the water of life coming from the throne of God and from the Lamb and on either side of the river is the tree of life, whose leaves are for the healing of the nations.

As we enter this New Year, the Bible tells us, "The Lord is your Healer." Will you follow his leading in his way though it be one of great challenge? Will you trust His word, obey His voice and move on to Elim? It's just up ahead. And to show us it is, God has transformed the bitterness of death into the sweet anticipation of the promise of eternal life to come. Jesus the "Righteous Branch," (Jer 23:5) has become "Our Healer." Jesus has tasted the bitter waters of death for each of us. He has risen from the grave to sustain us now and throughout eternity. God has given us the victory over all that stands against us through our Lord Jesus Christ.

The coming of Jesus Christ into the world is God's gift to all who trust in him. We are, in a sense, always in the wilderness of this world, its sins, and our own. Yet amid the adversities that come our way, we who rest in Christ for salvation from all that stands against us, are called to remember the healing and

sweetening power that our Lord is to us. And we are called to remember with anticipation that there's an Elim up ahead.

So whatever this coming year, indeed the rest of our lives hold for us, let us resolve by God's enabling grace, not to be or become bitter when adversity stares us in the face. But let us be at peace knowing this:

Though Satan should buffet, though trials should come Let this blest assurance control That Christ has regarded my helpless estate And has shed His own blood for my soul It is well with my soul
