The Saga of Redemption (Gal 3:13a)

If the Christmas season speaks to us a message of "Christ with us," then surely the Easter season speaks a message of "Christ for us." And so as we make our way toward Easter it is particularly fitting that we give heightened attention to Jesus Christ, the Head of the Church, the Creator of all things, the One in whom the fullness of the deity dwells in bodily form.

There is always a need to concentrate on Him, first, <u>because of the pull of</u> <u>culture against & away from him</u>...The *all roads lead to God* idea – Along with the erosion of truth, the intensified role of relativism, subjectivism, wokeism, critical-theory and other anti-Christ philosophies.

I am not sure if you are aware of it but there is a new religion that is surging like a tsunami through every facet of western culture. It is shaping and redefining society as it goes. Although it has not been organized into any formal religious structure, it functions along the lines of religious doctrine. It masquerades under the guise of compassion and justice, but underneath is an malevolent ideology that is incompatible with western values and incongruent with the Christian worldview.

This movement is characterized by terms like; political correctness, and cancel culture. Identity politics and critical theory are broader descriptors. But the religiosity of this sweeping tide of shifting values is best captured under the term, "Wokeism."

Again, though not organized into any formal religious structure it functions as a religion with its doctrine as it evaluates the human condition and creates its redemption narrative. It has been on the ascent for many years and has as its goal, the liberation of human beings from the circumstances that enslave them.

It sounds noble, but it is all of man's connivance and not grounded in any way, shape, or form, on the one who came from heaven, to proclaim good news to the poor... to proclaim liberty to the captives and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor. (Lk 4:18-19)

Then we need to intensify our attention on Christ because of, <u>the persecution</u> of Christians becoming so rampant in the world. For example, State repression of Christians and other religious groups in China is well known. It is systematic, harsh and authorized at senior government levels, although they would try and persuade the West that there is no religious persecution in their country.

Persecution isn't limited to China. There are other regions of the world where Christians are killed, kidnapped, their church buildings burned and other kinds of harm brought their way. It happens in our own country. A number of years ago I heard the testimony of a man from one congregation that chose to stay true to the truths of the gospel in opposition to their denomination's laxity. The congregation had to leave their revered church building and gather for worship in another building. This may become more common in the days ahead, as the godly stand for Christ and his word.

Finally, and most importantly, we need to fix our gaze on Christ because <u>of</u> the preeminence given him in Scripture.

Jesus is pre-figured in the Old Testament. In (Jn. 5:46) he says, "For if you believed Moses, you would believe Me, for he wrote about Me." In (Jn 5:39) he says, "You search the Scriptures because you think that in them you have eternal life; it is these that testify about Me"

Of course he is presented to us throughout the New Testament. (Col. 1:17) tells us, *"He is before all things and in Him all things hold together."* John the Baptist points to him in (Jn 1:29) saying, *"Behold the Lamb of God who takes*

away the sin of the world." Again Jesus says of himself (Jn 12:32), "And I, if I be lifted up from the earth, will draw all men to myself."

And of course a favourite hymn, Man of Sorrows, contains these words: Lifted up was He to die, It is finished was His cry;

Now in heav'n exalted high: Hallelujah, what a Saviour.

It is therefore crucial that, as Paul wrote, you and I, *"know nothing ... except Jesus Christ and Him crucified"* It is imperative to believe that Christ came into the world to save His people from their sin – In other words, to redeem them.

Some do not hold this key truth as being central to the gospel. The idea of sin, and redemption from sin, death and hell is repulsive. They find it more favourable to say he came to provide an example, or he came to show us the way, or he came to demonstrate God's love. All these contain a measure of truth, to be sure. But the Scriptures boldly declare (Rom. 4:25), *"He was delivered over to death for our sins and was raised to life for our justification." (NIV)* (II Cor. 5:21), *He made Him who knew no sin to be sin on our behalf, so that we might become the righteousness of God in Him.* James Denny rightly says, *"The work of Christ in relation to sin is the great thing in the gospel."* Bible commentator Leon Morris writes: "*At the heart of Christianity there is a cross, and on that cross the Son of God wrought man's salvation."*

On the Sundays I am with you in next few months I plan to consider our Lord's work under the heading: **The Saga of Redemption**. We will be focusing on the historical reality of His death as presented in the Scriptures, and the doctrinal meaning of that death.

As we consider the Saga of Redemption it will be what you might call a focus on the basics. And the first aspect of "The Basics" is found in this text from Galatians. (Gal 3:13a), "Christ redeemed us from the curse of the Law, by becoming a curse for us"

This inspired statement provides us with key elements for us to consider as we begin. It speaks of the Law, of the curse, of Christ, of redemption and of us. Why is redemption required? It is required because we are all under a curse. Why is there a curse involved? There is a curse because there is a Law in place – and it has been broken. What is this Law that's been broken? The law referred to here, signifies the laws given by God through Moses to the Children of Israel – and also to us in terms of its moral and judicial aspects. God's Law was given so that people might fulfill and adhere to His will and reflect His persona.

What was it that God wanted them and us to reflect of Himself? It was God's will that his people should reflect his Holiness. (Lev. 19:2), "You shall be holy, for I the LORD your God am holy."

What are the implications of "I the LORD you God and holy?" It refers to much more than we can go into here today but, it speaks of the infinite purity of God's

essential being. It refers to the love and delight He takes in his own purity. It has to do with its likeness in any of His creatures. It speaks of His perfect freedom from all impurity & His hatred of it wherever He sees it.

The very essence of His nature is holiness. (Rev. 4:8), "*The four living creatures . . . do not rest day or night, saying: 'Holy, holy, holy, Lord God Almighty' . . .*" God the Father is Holy, God the Son is Holy, and God the Spirit is Holy. All the works of God are holy. In the Creation account – All was pronounced good – very good at that. This was especially mankind – created in the image of God – thus possessing evidence of God & His holiness through his dominion over the earth as God's representative. The Bible tells us that God's word, his law, our worship, his dwelling place and people are holy. In every aspect of His being and of everything you can think about Him – He is holy! He is holy, he loves holiness, and he delights in it. And he requires it in every element of His created order. Holiness is due Him! And anything less is sin.

For God to be God, He must be honored as God, by His creatures. At Creation He blessed Adam by making His will known to him, particularly in relation to how he was to honour God. As a creature, he was to honour God through obedience.

God's will was that he eat from every tree but one. And should he eat from that tree, God would be dishonoured and His image besmirched.

God made His will known to Adam by giving him one rule. But Adam chose to disobey God and robbed Him of His due. And in refusing to obey God he sinned. Sin is basically failure to render God His due. By failing to give God His due, we take from God what is rightfully His & dishonor Him. That's what Adam did when he denied God the holy obedience that was due Him.

Well, what does God think of sin? God hates sin and sinners with an infinite hatred. (Psa. 5:5), "You hate all who do iniquity." As a result (Heb. 12:14.), "Without holiness, no one shall see God."

This leads to a further aspect of God's holiness – His justice. God is infinitely righteous, in Himself and in His dealings with all His creatures. For Adam, the promise of eternal life was the reward of obedience. For disobedience/sin, the reward was death. This is where the curse comes in. Obedience to God's laws brings eternal life. Disobedience brings about death. (Rom 5:12), "... through one man sin entered the world and death through sin, and so death spread to all men because all sinned." Adam's fall into sin had serious implications not only for himself, but for all who come after. What are they?

There are the implications of what man lost. He lost communion with God. He lost the gracious presence and favour of God. He was left, *"without hope, and without God in the world"* (Eph 2:12).

There are the implications of what man gained. Because of that fall into sin, mankind has been brought under God's wrath and curse. (Eph 2:3) describes the natural man in his sinful condition as being *"by nature, children of wrath"* By nature we are born wretched and miserable. By nature we are liable to miseries in this life, to death & to the pains of hell forever. How is His wrath and curse displayed? They are displayed in the miseries of life, external, internal, and spiritual.

Externally they are displayed in general calamities – Famines, Wars, Epidemics, and Terrorism etc. They are evidenced in personal tragedies – Sickness, Bankruptcies, Scandals, Family breakups, Deaths.

Internally & spiritually they are seen and experienced by enslavement to the devil, his will and his leading. They are displayed by spiritual blindness and a rebellious nature, hardness of heart, and numbness of conscience. Other evidences include vile actions, strong delusions, distress and perplexities of mind, dread and horror of the spirit and agonies of soul brought on by the apprehension of certain future wrath. These are just the miseries associated with us during this life. There is *also "the wrath to come"* (I Thess 1:10).

The Scriptures teach us (Rom 6:23) *"The wages of sin is death."* Death is the due reward for all those under the curse. It is sent by God to arrest the wicked, and convey them to future misery – to the punishment of hell forever. What will punishment in hell consist of? It will consist of banishment from the comforting presence of God, exclusion from life in the new heavens and the new earth. It will amount to exposure of the senses to, the horror and anguish of God's vengeance.

(Vincent pictures it as), "The stinging accusations of the, the never-dying worm of conscience. The aches and pains of every part of our bodies and all for eternity. All them that do iniquity shall be cast into a furnace of fire and 'There shall be wailing and gnashing of teeth."

God's vengeance will be swift, sure, just and terrible. God is holy and just. His law has been given. We are all guilty of breaking it. Mankind is thus under God's righteous and holy judgment and condemnation. That's the law and the curse.

But thanks be to God, (Gal 3:13a), <u>"Christ redeemed us from the curse of the Law, having become a curse for us</u>." God has given us a Redeemer – The Lord Jesus Christ! He had provided redemption from the Law and the curse.

He is called Lord, because He has been given universal sovereignty and dominion. (Acts 10:36) declares that, *"He is Lord of all."* All power in heaven and on earth has been given to Him.

He is called Jesus, because He is the Saviour of His people. (Matt. 1:21), "You shall call His name Jesus; for He shall save His people from their sins." He is called Christ, because He was anointed with the Holy Spirit by God the Father to do the Father's will in all that was necessary for the redemption of those under the curse. (Acts 10:38), "God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power," God has given redemption in the person of His only begotten Son, the Lord Jesus Christ. (II Cor. 6:19), "God was in Christ reconciling the world to Himself, not counting their trespasses against them." And how has the Lord Jesus Christ redeemed His people?

He has redeemed His people, by purchase, – The currency being his own holy sinless blood. Redemption speaks of buying a slave at the market. By nature people are slaves to sin and sold to death and hell. Jesus purchased redemption by offering Himself as a sacrifice in our place. He exchanged places with us and it cost Him His own sinless life. (I Pet 1:18-19), "You were not redeemed with perishable things like silver or gold from your futile way of life inherited from your forefathers, but with precious blood, as of a lamb unblemished and spotless, the blood of Christ."

He has redeemed His people by conquest – Rescuing them by His almighty power out of the clutches of the devil. Jesus the redeemer has taken the devil's captives captive. (Col 2: 13-15), "When you were dead in your transgressions . . . He made you alive together with Him, having forgiven us all our transgressions, having canceled out the certificate of debt consisting of decrees against us, which was hostile to us; and He has taken it out of the way, having nailed it to the cross. When He had disarmed the rulers and authorities, He made a public display of them, having triumphed over them through Him."

Jesus came to redeem His people from their sins – "to give His life a ransom for many." Are you one of the "many?" (Gal 3:13a), "Christ redeemed us from the curse of the Law, having become a curse for us." Are you one of the "us?" The Bible assures us that there will be no escape from the wrath of God apart from faith in His Son, Jesus Christ. Jesus said, (Jn. 3:14-15), "As Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the Son of Man be lifted up; so that whoever believes will in Him have eternal life."

Salvation/Redemption is to be had nowhere else than in Jesus Christ. Salvation/Redemption is to be had in no one else than in Jesus Christ. He alone is Lord! Every knee shall bow and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord to the glory of God the Father.

This is our Redeemer and Saviour. Let us hold to Him and concentrate on Him this season and throughout all the days of our lives.
