Don't Dwell on the Past

This is the second day of spring.

We look forward to the promise of the new life in spring and all that brings to mind; leaving the cold, grey, dark of winter evenings behind us and looking forward to seeing buds opening on trees and crocus sprouting. Sure signs of nature awakening and the season moving on. Rather appropriate thoughts in light of our text today.

The words of Isaiah; "Do not dwell on the past but look to the future—see I am doing a new thing."

When we moved here 11 years ago this June the first month or so just felt like I was on a vacation; but then I felt like I hit a wall. Bouncing back to reflect on the past became both a habitual and melancholy pastime. I had left behind a very busy ministry in Chaplaincy and many colleagues and friends.

I remember being out shopping one day and coming upon a little wooden sign with the word "Believe" written in bold letters on it. I purchased that little sign and set it up on my kitchen windowsill, because I needed the reminder to keep on believing that God had a plan and a purpose for my life and where I was at that moment in time; even though I couldn't see it. I hadn't lost my faith; but I so needed to believe that God was not finished with me yet.

I have learned that looking back can bring nostalgic memories and these memories may sometimes spur us to action in the present, however; striving to recapture what was, when God is interested in what is, and what will be in our lives is a grievous error.

"See I am doing a new thing," Isaiah says; and is followed up with the words, "In fact I have already started. Forget the former things; do not dwell on the past!"

But I loved the places and people I ministered to in the past; so, this was a difficult message for me. However; it was what I needed to hear and abide by. I needed to stop focusing on the life and ministry I had and look instead to what God was directing me to in the present. Truthfully, it took me some time to be able to do this, but overtime and in God's time when I was able to come to terms with this, it became crystal clear what God's leading was to do at that time.

I had been doing some home visiting and palliative care support in client's homes for Community Home Support Lanark County and now I felt clearly led to present an offer to the Supervisor of Lanark County Home Support to provide services for a Spiritual Care Program; related to the clients of the Day Hospice, volunteers and the staff as well. It was an exciting prospect and was approved by the Board. This led to many fulfilling and meaningful opportunities to be a part of the lives of others and to provide spiritual and pastoral care. Weddings and funerals, seasonal and special services within the Day Hospice setting; counselling and individual support and pastoral care became opportunities for various types of ministry. I was deeply humbled by the courage and tenacity of people who had lost so much and were facing an uncertain and challenging future physically, materially, relationally; all undergirded by the pain they were suffering. Being here now, at St. Andrew's with you folks, to lead worship is a blessing for me and I am thankful for the privilege of doing so.

So, since I know full well that it is tempting for most of us to dwell on the past, and that God's Word admonishes us not to be caught up in this practice, I think a deeper look into the words of Isaiah is merited.

At the time of the writing of these words of Isaiah, the faith and hope of God's chosen people was at a very low point.

The nation of Israel had been taken captive by the Babylonians. This exile lasted 50 years during the 6th Century BC. It had been a mere 700 years previous to this that the nation had been freed from Egyptian slavery. Unfortunately, it was due to their all too familiar sin of disobedience and idolatry that they found themselves under the rule of the Babylonian captors.

Psalm 137 depicts the mood and state of mind of these captives.

- **<u>1</u>** By the rivers of Babylon we sat and wept when we remembered Zion.
- **2** There on the poplars
- we hung our harps,
- <u>3</u> for there our captors asked us for songs, our tormentors demanded songs of joy; they said, "Sing us one of the songs of Zion!"
- 4 How can we sing the songs of the LORD while in a foreign land?
- 5 If I forget you, Jerusalem, may my right hand forget its skill.
- 6 May my tongue cling to the roof of my mouth if I do not remember you,
 - if I do not consider Jerusalem my highest joy.
- 7 Remember, LORD, what the Edomites did on the day Jerusalem fell, Tear it down," they cried, "tear it down to its foundations!"
- <u>8</u> Daughter Babylon, doomed to destruction, happy is the one who repays you according to what you have done to us.
- 9 Happy is the one who seizes your infants and dashes them against the rocks.



"By the rivers of Babylon, there we sat down, yea, we upon the willows in the midst thereof. How shall we sum wept, when we remembered Zion. We hanged our harps the Lord's song in a strange land? Psalm 137:1,24

These people were in deep despair and in need of words of comfort and assurance.

Throughout the book of Isaiah there are recorded the words of that much needed reassurance God gave to these captives through the Prophet Isaiah. It was often repeated using various images of God's love for them.

Isaiah 43:1-2 "But now, this is what the LORD says- he who created you, Jacob, he who formed you, Israel: "Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have summoned you by name; you are mine. 2 When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and when you pass through the rivers, they will not sweep over you. When you walk through the fire, you will not be burned; the flames will not set you ablaze."

Here we find that God is referencing the good things He had done for them and their forefathers; a rich history of God's personal involvement, mercy and leading in their lives. These are some of their stories:

At Mt. Sinai God had given the Ten Commandments to their leader Moses. Remember this nation, in captivity now, had been delivered from the bondage of the Egyptians just 700 years earlier. Their forefathers had walked thru the Red Sea to safety, as their pursuers coming behind them, drowned.

Then they had wandered in the desert for 40 years, because of their unbelief; but God had provided for their need with manna and quails daily. Finally; God then led them into the Promised Land, as He had promised He would.

Though the Israelites were unfaithful to God, God would still deliver them from captivity.

As for His chosen people, whatever shame and humiliation they endured, God also endured! He loved His people and as angry as He was with them, He felt their pain. A single, elegant sentence from Isaiah 63: <u>9</u> summarizes God's point of view, "**in all their distresses He too was distressed**." God may have hidden His face, but that face was streaked with tears. God, although angered and disappointed by their disobedience and sin, loved them. The Israelites had watched in horror as the Babylonian axe men had hacked apart the cedar beams of the temple---but it was God's own house that they were destroying and a personal desecration He felt as well.

There are the times it is good for us to look at our past and remember how God made a way for us or healed us; forgave us or led us to a resolution of our problems. This "looking back" helps us to remember that He is our God; a relational God, who keeps His promises and through the death and resurrection of Jesus provides a way of redemption for us. The captive Israelites had a strong history to remember; but not unlike us sometimes, they had trouble believing that God could do some things, but for some reason He might not choose to do other things in their life! Perhaps it was acknowledging their longstanding issue of sin; idolatry and disobedience to the commandments of God that made them see deliverance as hopeless and led them to enter into lament. When we repeatedly struggle with a particular issue or sin, we can also become so defeated by our failures that we begin to believe that God will not forgive us or restore us. It's the devil's choice lie.

Sometimes we just like to hold onto the past too long or choose to live in the past, no matter what presents as opportunity in the present or future. The "good old days" can be very vivid in our minds sometimes. Some even romanticize the events of the past; so that the clear picture of the way it really was is softened, distorted or lost. There may be a fear of what is new, when the known of the past is so comfortable and familiar. Or the issue might be just plain reluctance to change.

This story comes to mind:

Back when electricity was first being introduced in a little Scottish village almost everyone in a particular church switched from propane lanterns to electricity as soon as it could be hooked up. However; the oldest couple in the church couldn't get their electricity because they were waiting for the poles to go up and the wires to be strung. They continued to use their propane lanterns.

Finally, the day came when electricity was delivered to their house. Everyone came to celebrate the festive event with them. The man waited for it to get extra dark and then instructed his wife to turn on the switch. When she did the light filled the room and everyone gave cheer.

The man grinned from ear to ear. Picking up the propane lamp and said: 'It sure makes lighting my lamps easier." And with that his wife turned off the electricity!

The Bible records numerous stories concerning our tendency to dwell on the past and or our reluctance to move ahead in the present or future. Some of these stories led to dire consequences. But let's look at a story that reminds us of God's faithfulness.

Let's look to the beginning Genesis 41: <u>51</u> Joseph named his firstborn Manasseh and said, "It is because God has made me forget all my trouble and my entire father's household."

If you recall: Joseph's life had many heartaches and troubles. He had suffered much in his father's house at the hands of his jealous brothers, who finally sold him into captivity. He ended up serving as a slave under an Egyptian official Potiphar who was captain of the guard for Pharaoh. He was made master of Potiphar's household, but was wrongfully placed in prison because of the lies of Potiphar's wife; who had tried to seduce him and was vengeful when he refused her advances. There he was put in charge of all the other prisoners. He helped one of his cell mates to get released by giving to him the interpretation of Pharaoh's dream and asked to be remembered by him if this man was restored to his role as cupbearer; but the other forgot all about poor Joseph. Finally, God made a way for Joseph and he was released from prison after he himself had opportunity to



interpret one of Pharaoh's dreams to him. God blessed Joseph as he became the advisor to Pharaoh and ruler of the affairs of the land under Pharaoh. He was placed by God in this strategic position in order that he could save his family when they arrived as beggars seeking assistance in a time of famine. Joseph could have been bitter, hateful, vengeful, but; Joseph recognized God's hand in his life, refused to dwell on the past and followed God's purposes for him. As he said "God has made me forget all my trouble and all my father's family." Genesis 41: <u>51</u>.

Why was this so important? Because Joseph could not have fulfilled the leading of God and his ultimate destiny if he was focused on his past troubles; if he became bogged down in ruminating about what his brother's had done to him.

Proverbs 4: <u>25</u> says, "Let your eyes look straight ahead; fix your gaze directly before you." That is exactly what Joseph did to the glory of God and the fulfillment of His will.

This is what Joseph had to do! It's what we need to do! And it's not easy sometimes; but God has plan and a purpose for our lives. We can trust in that.

In Luke 9: <u>62</u> we read the words of Jesus: "No one who puts a hand to the plow and looks back is fit for service in the kingdom of God."

There are a number of implications regarding these words, but today we will focus on the need to not dwell on the past.

Philippians 3: <u>14</u>, Paul gives the advice we all need to take in. Forgetting the past; I press on toward the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus.

But history tells us that looking back; dwelling on the past, has always been a problem for God's people.

The story of Lot's wife begins in <u>Genesis 19</u> after two angels arrived in <u>Sodom</u> at eventide and were invited to spend the night at Lot's home. The men of Sodom were exceedingly wicked and gathering outside his house they demanded Lot send the guests out to them so that they might have their way with them. Instead, Lot offered up his two daughters; but they refused. As dawn was breaking, Lot's visiting angels urged him to get his family and flee, so as to avoid being caught in the impending disaster for the iniquity of the city. The command was given, verse <u>17</u>: **"Flee for your life! Do not look behind you, or stop anywhere in the plain; flee to the hills, lest you be swept away."** While fleeing, Lot's wife turned to look back, and was turned into a pillar of salt.

The message had been clear and specific—leave and don't look back! Don't stop anywhere on the plain! This was given, not so much to protect them from seeing what was about to happen to their city; but to encourage them to forget the ties to this sinful place and go ahead, trusting in God's leading.

But Lot's wife could not let go of what she had been accustomed to, familiar with. She paid a price for her disobedience and was transformed into a

pillar of salt! John Gill in writing his "Exposition of the Bible" noted that Josephus wrote that the pillar continued to his times and that he saw it. Additionally, Irenaeus and Tertullian speak of it in their times. It was a longstanding, sober reminder that we all pay a price when we continuously look back at what was; or do so in direct disobedience to God's will.



So why then would we be caught up in looking back? Like Lot's wife the past may be a familiar, comforting place. We may be romanticizing the past. Perhaps we have enshrined certain things, people or events from the past. We may have a fear of the unknown or what lies ahead which becomes crippling to us. The good old "olden days", a friend of mine calls them, as she wistfully thinks about how things were so much better back then. Of

course, this is with no knowledge of what her grandparents had to endure throughout the wars and Great Depression. It is her plea for a simpler way of life. We can all understand that!

Forgiveness may be an issue that is keeping us trapped in the past. Sometimes there are people we need to forgive and we can't move on because we can't forgive. Sometimes we need to forgive ourselves for our past sins and failures which can seem forever before our face in memories and living consequences.

Ethan was my office clerk when I worked at Warkworth Institution. He was a brilliant young man who had suffered unbearable emotional and sexual abuse from his mother, who literally kept him trapped as a prisoner in their home; denying him friends and outside activities. One day he had made a date to meet a girl he had met at school and his Mother tried to bully him with a baseball bat into his room. He just lost it and the result was deadly for her. The one thing Ethan could not do was forgive himself. He could forgive and rationalize her actions; but never could he forgive himself. Mother's Day services left him in shambles. I spent many hours counselling and praying with him. The following scriptures started to make sense to him. Hebrews 10: <u>16-17</u> "This is the covenant I will make with them after that time, says the Lord.

I will put my laws in their hearts,

and I will write them on their minds." <u>17</u> Then he adds: "Their sins and lawless acts

I will remember no more."

Isaiah 43: <u>25</u>, "I, even I, am he that blots out your transgressions for my own sake, and will not remember your sins."

Isaiah 1: <u>18</u> "Come now, and let us reason together, saith the LORD: though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they be red like crimson, they shall be as wool."

Romans 8: <u>1</u> "There is therefore now no condemnation to those who are in Christ Jesus, who do not walk according to the flesh, but according to the Spirit."

Ethan knew these and many other Scriptures in his intellect but; transferring that knowledge into a heartfelt awareness and experience of God's forgiveness was another matter. Seeing himself as loved by God was so unthinkable to him after what he had done.

One of the greatest risks of recidivism is often found in a person who does not enter into forgiveness. Therefore, Ethan was at greater risk to reoffend because he viewed himself as one who could never be forgiven for what he had done. Having that mental picture of himself left him more apt to act out again. Sort of like: "this is who I am" or this is what I and everyone else expects of me. It's complicated; but it can be like a self-fulfilling prophecy.

Ethan needed to accept God's forgiveness and forgive himself.

This is true for all of us. Nothing can change the past; but it can be a premise from which we proceed with God's forgiveness and help. Not unlike The Israelites, we need to hear these words of the Prophet: Isaiah 55:7 Let the wicked forsake their ways and the unrighteous their thoughts. Let them turn to the LORD, and he will have mercy on them, and to our God, for he will freely pardon. Our Worship Service each Sunday provides a very important opportunity in the Call to Confession wherein; we are called to recall our personal sins and failings.

The Prayer of Confession provides an opportunity for us personally; yet communally, to request and acknowledge forgiveness from the only one who can forgive us; our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

But it doesn't end there because we need to hear the Words of Assurance that follow and be reminded of God's unfailing love, grace and mercy.

The Christian story is about a God who, forgives, restores, liberates, and heals. The story tells us who God is and who we are as God's people. Whatever became of the poor exiles in Babylon? They got to go home. God made a way. The Persians arose and conquered Babylon; and Cyrus, the King of Persia freed the exiles and allowed then to return to Zion. Joseph was restored to the very family who had betrayed him. After Jesus died on the cross; to many of his followers and others, it seemed there was no way for the story to go on. But the stone was rolled away and Jesus arose from the dead!

I am reminded of a song that I love. A friend and I, before the vocal nodes caused me grief, used to sing it at Chapel service every Good Friday. For those of you worshipping with us from home; if you would like to listen to this song just click on the link.

Today, based on our faith in Christ; we are called to believe and to watch for the new thing God is about to do; in our world, in our country, in our community, our congregation and our lives. And the beauty of God's word is that it has the power to speak to us; wherever we are, as if speaking to us personally, directly!

Isaiah 42: 9, "Behold the former things have come to pass, And a new thing I declare:

Before they spring forth I tell you of them."

Let us pray.

Father God you have brought us out of the mire of sin and shame. You have created in us a clean heart and given our lives a new start in Christ Jesus.

We are your people, called to Your service and purposes and although we often cannot see what Your plan is, we can trust in Your abiding love, mercy and forgiveness,

Help us to remember all that You have done for us in the past with thanksgiving; but to keep our eyes on the goal You have set before us; so that our lives will bring your pleasure and glory. In Jesus name we pray. **Amen.**

At this point in our service, we remember the words of Jesus who said" It is more blessed to give than to receive." Acts 20: 35

The very first words of the Bible record God's own generosity. God gave us gifts of a beautiful creation, an earth full of promise and abundance.
