But God had mercy on him, and not only on him but on me also, lest I should have sorrow upon sorrow. 28 I am the more eager to send him, therefore, that you may rejoice at seeing him again, and that I may be less anxious. 29 So receive him in the Lord with all joy, and honor such men, 30 for he nearly died for the work of Christ, risking his life to complete what was lacking in your service to me.

"Honourable and Courageous Man" Philippians 2:25-30

The United States, despite tending to be an isolationist nation for much of its early history, has been involved in many wars. The most unpopular one, hands down, was the Vietnam War. We have never faced anything like it in Canada. Because this war was so unpopular and fought a long way from North America, when service men and women returned home they were not welcomed. There was no public recognition or outpouring of



appreciation for their service and there were certainly no parades. The American people just wanted to forget the Vietnam War. There was little help for returning vets who were wounded physically or emotionally. It was like the country had corporate amnesia. It took years for a proper monument to be erected for those who gave their lives. I am going to call this the "Vietnam syndrome" and we will be referring back to

it shortly.



Last week we met Timothy, a well known Biblical figure. Paul, in sending him to the Philippians said, **20 For I have no one like him, who will be genuinely concerned for your welfare.** Today we are introduced to a young man that you may never have heard of before. His name was Epaphroditus and he came from the city of Philippi. Epaphroditus was young, strong, healthy and godly. He was chosen, probably along with a number of other young men, to carry a considerable gift of money to Rome to

give to the Apostle Paul. Paul was the one who had laid the initial foundation for the church in Philippi and the Philippians held a strong place in their hearts for their pioneer founder. They decided to demonstrate their solidarity with Paul by taking up an offering for him and sending an envoy – a group of messengers – to make the 800 mile journey to Rome. This was no one or two day excursion. This was a serious mission. The purpose of this trip was two-fold. First, they wanted to minister to Paul's needs. Second, they wanted to pay his prison expenses. This was crucial because the Roman prison system did not provide food, clothing or medical care. In our minds this was an abhorrent way to run a prison system – but that was Rome.

Paul had established the precedent of sending, not an individual, but a group when large amounts of funds were moved from one church to another. (2 Corinthians 8:16-22) While they were travelling, Epaphroditus fell ill, so it was fortunate that he was not travelling alone. We are not given the details, but it is most likely that one of his travelling companions returned to Philippi with the news. The others most likely stayed with Epaphroditus, nursing him until he was finally able to make it to Rome. Eventually he was able to fulfill his mission, even though he was a little worse for wear.

Epaphroditus was sent to carry funds to Paul, but he was also sent to minister to Paul's needs – to care for him. However, it wasn't long before Paul sent him back to Philippi. Paul explains some of his reasons for sending Epaphroditus back to them and he gives specific instructions as to how they were to receive them. He wants them to give him a proper welcome. The Philippians would have been surprised at his early return and that he didn't stay with Paul as long as expected. They may not be entirely happy with Epaphroditus for his early return and would possibly give him little more than a perfunctory acknowledgement of his return without expressing any appreciation for what he had done and the risks he had taken. Without Paul's words, this would have been an excellent opportunity for the "Vietnam Syndrome" to kick in.

A church that does not recognize the sacrifice of its members for the sake of the Gospel is making a big mistake. I personally do not ever want the contribution of anyone in our church family to be unappreciated, overlooked or taken for granted. Paul wants to make sure this doesn't happen in Philippi. The selfless conduct of Epaphroditus is a living example of Philippians 2: 4 Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others. 5 Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus...

I expect that Epaphroditus was a humble young man with a quiet demeanor. No way when he got home would he have proclaimed his arrival like the Genie in the 1948 Bugs Bunny cartoon "A Lad-In His Lamp":

"I'm here! I'm here! Let the bells ring out and the banners fly!

Feast your eyes on me! It's too good to be true, But I'm here!! I'm here!!!"



To which Bugs Bunny replies: "Ahhhhh, what's up, Doc?"

Paul provides no drum roll introduction but he does go out of his way to re-introduce their messenger. 25 I have thought it necessary to send to you Epaphroditus my brother and fellow worker and fellow soldier, and your messenger and minister to my need.



Paul calls him "my brother". This young man is not a just a money carrying messenger, the ancient equivalent of an e-Transfer of funds. There is a note of affection here. Some may use words like "brother" or "sister" off-handedly, but not Paul. This young man is a true believer, a true brother in the faith.

Next Paul refers to him as "my fellow worker". This elevated Epaphroditus. He was a Christian worker, but he was more than that. He was Paul's fellow worker or co-worker. Paul was the front man while Epaphroditus worked behind the scenes, yet they were equally co-workers.

Next, Paul elevates this young man even higher by referring to him as "my fellow soldier". Here is how Paul viewed the



work of the Gospel. In Ephesians 6 he writes, 12 For we do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers over this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places. In this great cosmic battle, the two men were fellow soldiers. In that Roman prison, they fought shoulder to soldier. In battle, Roman soldiers stood side by side – shoulder to shoulder. Their shields were locked together, their swords were drawn or their spears held ready. Epaphroditus was a warrior, injured in battle, who was being sent home to rest and recuperate. He was worthy of a hero's welcome.

He meant all this to Paul, and more. He had served the Philippians with distinction, as their messenger and servant to Paul's needs. Epaphroditus was a simple layman. We would never know he even existed if it were not for Paul's reference to him. He was not a pastor who shepherded a flock. He was not an evangelist taking the gospel message to an unreached group of people. He never wrote a single word that we know of. No, he faithfully discharged his duty by delivering a bag of money to Paul and then looking after him. For this he was called **my brother and fellow worker and fellow soldier, and your messenger and minister to my need.** To serve in an unnoticed, humble and unrecognized place in Christ's Church is as much the work of Christ as public ministry.

Make no mistake, though, Epaphroditus was not a super hero. For instance, this young man suffered from homesickness. Paul writes, **26** for he has been longing for you all and has been distressed because you heard that he was ill. That



would probably not be very well accepted back home, but homesickness was a reality of life. In the days before the internet and cell phones, and when even telephone service was not available in remote areas, missionaries would be out of contact with the outside world for months. When you are in a strange country, not able to

speak the language, at least not very well, then it is not unusual for even the most committed Christian workers to experience homesickness. We are given a feeling for how intensely this young man experienced mental suffering when the word "distressed" is used to describe his anguish. Do you know that the only other time that the word here translated **distressed** is used in the Greek New Testament is to

describe the agony of Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane. In Mark 14 we read: 33
And he took with him Peter and James and John, and began to be greatly distressed and troubled. Epaphroditus really struggled with deep homesickness. A big part of his problem was that the folks back in Philippi probably had no idea whether he had gotten better or died. So Paul is basically saying: "Don't let the Vietnam Syndrome kick in here. Receive him properly."

What is most surprising to me is Paul's attitude to his homesickness. It was not what I would have expected of Paul. In the past, Paul had considered someone's returning home as a result of homesickness as tantamount to a soldier deserting his post. When a young man named John Mark – the same one who would later write the Gospel of Mark – returned home as a result of homesickness, Paul was furious. Later when Barnabus suggested that they give John Mark another chance and take him with them on another missionary journey, Paul lost it. He was so adamant against taking this young man that he and Barnabas had a falling out and parted company, going on separate journeys. Barnabas took John Mark while Paul set off with a man named Silas. Years later, Paul changed his attitude to John Mark. In 2 Timothy 4 Paul writes to Timothy and says: 11 ... Get Mark and bring him with you, for he is very useful to me for ministry. I believe that the years mellowed Paul and so he took a completely different approach to dealing with the homesickness of Epaphroditus.

Let's turn and look at his illness. **27 Indeed he was ill, near to death. But God had mercy on him, and not only on him but on me also, lest I should have sorrow upon sorrow.** Epaphroditus did not just have a bad dose of stomach flu. He was seriously ill. He was close to death. The fellows he was travelling with had given up hope that he would survive. This young man came close to death in the service of Christ. So we could label Epaphroditus as being a courageous man.

Paul says of Epaphroditus that he was **near to death**. Then he adds a phrase that when you read the passage will probably slip right by you. **But God had mercy on him**. We live in a period of history when we are surrounded by the wonders of modern medicine. We look to the medical community when we are sick, but there wasn't much of a medical community back in the first century when Epaphroditus got deathly ill and what medical help there existed was based mostly on old wives tales. When someone was as seriously ill as he was – when an individual stood at death's door – few returned from the brink. How did Epaphroditus get better? This was a case of God's direct healing. God had mercy on him. Apart from God's intervention, he would have died – and Paul's sorrows would have been multiplied.

But God had mercy on him. Paul was not afraid to death personally, but to have one of his team members die before him would have been much harder to bear. We do not know how we will react to bad news, but there are things that are worse than our own personal death. When our friends, family and young people precede us it can be a great source of grief and sorrow. This passage reveals to us Paul's humanity. Physical is a terrible stressor but the good news is found in verse 27. **God had mercy**, because he is a Merciful God.

The Invitation to Communion

We now set them aside from all common uses to this one holy use. Draw near to us in a special way as we share together in this time of Communion. Through Christ our Lord we pray. **Amen.**

Take the Bread, and say after me:

The Lord Jesus, on the night before he died, took bread, and after giving thanks to God, he broke it and said: "This is my body that is broken for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

The body of Christ broken for me.

You may partake of the bread.

Take the cup and say after me:

In the same way, he took the cup after supper, saying: "This cup is the new covenant sealed in my blood. Whenever you do it, do it in remembrance of me."

The blood of Christ shed for me.

You may drink of the cup.

Say your own prayer of thanksgiving for this special time of Communion.
