12 Now if Christ is proclaimed as raised from the dead, how can some of you say that there is no resurrection of the dead? 13 But if there is no resurrection of the dead, then not even Christ has been raised. 14 And if Christ has not been raised, then our preaching is in vain and your faith is in vain. 15 We are even found to be misrepresenting God, because we testified about God that he raised Christ, whom he did not raise if it is true that the dead are not raised. 16 For if the dead are not raised, not even Christ has been raised. 17 And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. 18 Then those also who have fallen asleep in Christ have perished. 19 If in Christ we have hope in this life only, we are of all people most to be pitied.

20 But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep. 21 For as by a man came death, by a man has come also the resurrection of the dead. 22 For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive.



"How Important Is Easter?"
1 Corinthians 15:12-22

Susan has a niece who lives with her husband and daughter Georgia, in Sugar Grove, North Carolina. They were up to visit us during the summer of 2017. I think they even came to church with us. Here is a picture of Georgia swimming at our place. We haven't seen them since, but we keep in touch. Mind you, Georgia is a much bigger girl now and is 8 years old. During the pandemic she has been going to school online. Here is a more recent





picture of Georgia and I think she is doing some crafty kind of stuff.

Recently, Georgia had an assignment to complete for school. She was asked to answer the following three questions:


- 1. What do you want to learn?
- 2. Who do you want to meet?
- 3. Where do you want to visit?

Here is what Georgia wrote down. In some of her answers she asks some very deep theological questions and that is why I want to share them with you this morning. Georgia wrote:

- I want to learn how God made Jesus resurrect.
- 2. I want to meet Zoey again, because I haven't talked to her in a while.
- 3. I want to visit Washington, D.C. to see red panda.
- 4. I also want to know why God resurrected Jesus in the first place.

That is what I want to learn, meet and visit. By; Georgia

These are some very good things. I don't know who Zoey is, but she must be a good friend. It is hard to keep track of all your friends during a pandemic. If you Google "red panda" you will see a picture and it won't be hard to understand why Georgia wants to



visit Washington, D.C.

However, it is the two things that Georgia wants to learn that I want to focus on this Easter Sunday morning.

- 1. I want to learn how God made Jesus resurrect.
- 2. I also want to know why God resurrected Jesus in the first place.

Now, rather than call it Easter Sunday, we could call today "Resurrection Day". This is what Easter is all about. It's about resurrection – the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. People have been asking these questions for two thousand years. I don't know if my answers will satisfy you, Georgia, but I will give it my best shot.

I want to learn how God made Jesus resurrect.

Well, the first and earliest answer to this question is that God didn't make Jesus resurrect. People had other explanations. Now, all four of the Gospel's (Matthew, Mark, Luke and John) make it very clear that Jesus died on the cross. All four gospels pretty much say the same thing. 46 Then Jesus, calling out with a loud voice, said, "Father, into your hands I commit my spirit!" And having said this he breathed his last. (Luke 23) That is the Bible's way of saying that Jesus died there on the cross. However, the Jewish leaders wanted to make sure that Jesus was dead, so they asked the Romans to break the legs of all three men that had been crucified. In John's Gospel (chapter 19) we read, 32 So the soldiers came and broke the legs of the first, and of the other who had been crucified with him. Interestingly they didn't break the legs of Jesus. 33 But when they came to Jesus and saw that he was already dead, they did not break his legs.



We don't know if it was just a random act, 34 But one of the soldiers pierced his side with a spear, and at once there came out blood and water. Notice that it doesn't say that just blood came out. No, there came out blood and water. This signifies that Jesus was really and truly dead. Only after death does the blood separate into the heavy red corpuscles and the serum, which is made up of the yellowish-white watery part. So there

was no doubt in the minds of the Roman soldiers that Jesus was dead. Then Jesus was taken down off the cross and he was buried in a new tomb.

On the third day – the day we call Sunday – it was discovered that Jesus was not in that tomb. How do you explain that? Well, the Christians – that is, Mary Magdalene,

the disciples Peter and John – they went to that tomb and found it empty. Here is what Mary said. 2 ... "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him." (John 20) At first they thought someone had stolen the body of Jesus. Then a strange thing happened. Jesus appeared to Mary, he appeared to Peter and John and some of the other disciples. He appeared to two men who were walking on the road from Jerusalem to Emmaus.

Finally he appeared to Thomas. 25 So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see in his hands the mark of the nails, and place my finger into the mark of the nails, and place my hand into his side, I will never believe." What did all these people see when they saw Jesus? Was it just a ghost? Was it a "Casper the Ghost" kind of figure that looked like he was wearing a white bed sheet? I don't think so. Here is what Jesus said to Thomas. 27 Then he



said to Thomas, "Put your finger here, and see my hands; and put out your hand, and place it in my side. Do not disbelieve, but believe." Thomas was a skeptic. He didn't want to believe that Jesus was alive. He wanted proof – solid proof. What did Jesus want Thomas to believe? He wanted him to believe that God had raised him from the dead; that he was resurrected and alive.

Let's go back to your question. *I want to learn how God made Jesus resurrect.*Remember how I said that the first and earliest answer to this question was that there was no resurrection. The Chief Priests and the Pharisees – the Jewish leaders – went and stood before Pilate and here is what they said. 63 "Sir, we remember how that impostor said, while he was still alive, 'After three days I will rise.' 64 Therefore order the tomb to be made secure until the third day, lest his disciples go and steal him away and tell the people, 'He has risen from the dead,' and the last fraud will be worse than the first." 66 So they went and made the tomb secure by sealing the stone and setting a guard.. (Matthew 27)



Well, what happened? In their minds, exactly what they feared! On that first Easter Sunday morning the Bible tells us that there was an earthquake and an angel of the Lord came and rolled back the stone that covered the front of the tomb. We read in Matthew 28:4 And for fear of him the guards trembled and became like dead men. Later, the men guarding the tomb came and told the Chief Priests what had happened. 12 And when they had assembled with the elders and taken counsel,

they gave a sufficient sum of money to the soldiers 13 and said, "Tell people, 'His disciples came by night and stole him away while we were asleep.' 14 And if this comes to the governor's ears, we will satisfy him and keep you out of trouble." 15 So they took the money and did as they were directed. And this story has been spread among the Jews to this day. So the answer, Georgia, is that some people believed that Jesus didn't resurrect. They believed that the disciples stole his body only to make it look like he had risen from the dead. Tell me, what happens to soldiers who fall asleep when they are on duty? Do they get paid extra money and do they not get into any trouble at all?

People in our day have no more desire to believe the story of the resurrection of Jesus than the Jewish authorities did. They reject anything that even hints at the supernatural. So it is not surprising that one of the more modern ideas is that Jesus did not die on the cross. He only appeared to be dead so when they took him down from the cross and put him in the tomb, he was really still alive. This is known as the "swoon theory". Jesus was in such agony on the cross that he fainted but as he lay in that cool tomb for several days, he revived. So there was no need for Jesus to rise from the dead. He never died!

This creates an even bigger problem for us as Christians. If Jesus never died, then what did he accomplish on the cross? The answer is nothing. Jesus went to the cross for one specific purpose and that was to bear the sins of guilty mankind in his own body. We celebrate Communion to remind us that on the cross Jesus' body was broken and his blood was shed to cleanse us of our sins.

Even people within the church don't want to believe in the supernatural resurrection of Jesus. They do believe that Jesus died. It is pretty hard for any thinking person

not to believe that. But then these people talk about the "Easter faith". What is the Easter faith? Well, these unbelieving people would say that Jesus didn't really physically, bodily rise from the dead, but in time the disciples came to believe that he had. That is the "Easter faith". That's like saying, "I knew there was no Easter Bunny!" but then going on to say, "In time I came to believe that there is an Easter Bunny!" That doesn't make any sense.



Georgia, I can't tell you the "how" of Jesus being resurrected, because the Bible doesn't tell us how. It only tells us that it was God's mighty power. Listen to these verses from Ephesians 1 which speak of 19 ... the immeasurable greatness of his power toward us who believe, according to the working of his great might 20 that he worked in Christ when he raised him from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly places. We can see the mighty power of God all around us. Look around Sugar Grove and see the mountains and the valleys, the



rivers and the fields, the animals and the livestock. Look up into the night sky and see the moon and all the stars that make up our galaxy and know that there are many more beyond what we can see. Who put all that in place? It was God. And how did he do it? All the Bible tells us is that it was God's mighty power. Now, if God can do all that, how difficult can it be for him to raise a man from the dead?

I also want to know why God resurrected Jesus in the first place.

This was the second thing you wanted to learn, Georgia. It is a very important question to ask. Let's think about this for a moment. Jesus was born in a manger in Bethlehem. He lived with his family until he grew up to be a man. Then he spent three years going about doing good and teaching people about God. Later he was arrested and died on a cross. Now let's suppose that after he died, Jesus remained

dead and that God didn't resurrect him. How would he be different from any other person? What would make him so special that millions of people believe in and follow him? After all, there are many people who go about doing good and teaching about God. Some of them are the founders of religions other than Christianity. They all eventually die. Why is the resurrection of Jesus so important?

Did you know that there is one whole chapter in the Bible that talks about nothing else but the resurrection of Jesus? It is 1 Corinthians 15 and it was written by the Apostle Paul. In the first part of this important chapter, Paul talks



about the *fact* of the resurrection. By that I mean, he talks about how it really happened and was not just a fairy tale like the Easter Bunny or Cinderella.

<u>3</u> For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, <u>4</u> that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures, <u>5</u> and that he appeared to Cephas (Peter), then to the twelve. <u>6</u> Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers at one time, most of whom are still alive.

Let me explain what this means. First Paul is saying, "This is very important! What I am going to tell you is the most important thing!!"

- 1. Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures. We have already talked about how important the death of Jesus is. He really did die on the cross. He didn't just faint. He died on the cross for our sins. He died for all the things we have done wrong and for all the ways that we can be rebels against God's laws. "In accordance with the Scriptures" means that it was written down in the Old Testament part of the Bible <u>long</u> before Jesus was born.
- 2. That he was buried. After Jesus died, they took him down off the cross and put him in a tomb. There was no doubt in the minds of the Roman soldiers that Jesus was dead. There was no doubt in the minds of Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus that he was dead when they bound him up in grave clothes and laid him in the tomb.
- 3. That he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures. That is, God resurrected Jesus three days after he died. This didn't just

- happen. It too was written about in the Old Testament part of the Bible <u>long</u> before Jesus was born. You see Georgia, all this was part of God's plan. It was not just how things happened to turn out.
- 4. **That he appeared** ... Paul wanted to make sure that the report that Jesus had risen from the dead didn't just come from one person's feverish imagination. No, Jesus had been seen alive by many people. Five hundred witnesses to someone's being alive is a lot of witnesses. The resurrection of Jesus by God was an event that many people were eye witnesses to. Like the Civil War and 9/11 it was an historical event, not a myth or fairy tale.

In the next paragraph, Paul finally gets around to answering your question. You see, even in Bible times, there were people who argued that there was no such thing as the resurrection of the dead. If that was true, then there were certain other things that were also true:

- 1. 13 But if there is no resurrection of the dead, then not even Christ has been raised. The Bible teaches that there is a pattern. First, God resurrected Jesus, but it doesn't stop there. Next the Bible says that the same is true of all Christians when they die. When a Christian dies, that person doesn't just get buried and there is nothing after that. No, when we die, we will get resurrected one day just like Jesus. That is what heaven is all about. It is about getting resurrected and going to be with Jesus.
- 2. 14 And if Christ has not been raised, then our preaching is in vain and your faith is in vain. That means that if God didn't resurrect Jesus, then your minister and your Sunday School teacher are just wasting their time. It means that what we believe as Christians is worthless, because it is all based on the resurrection of Jesus. If God did resurrect Jesus, then what the Bible teaches is true. If God did not resurrect Jesus, then the Bible is just a bunch of lies and tall tales.
- 3. 17 And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. If God did not resurrect Jesus, then what we believe about God, the Bible and Jesus is useless. We are still in our sins. We are still lost sinners and that is a terrible place to be in.
- 4. 18 Then those also who have fallen asleep in Christ have perished. "Fallen asleep" means people who have died. All the Christians we love who have died are simply gone. We are never going to see them again.
- 5. 19 If in Christ we have hope in this life only, we are of all people most to be pitied. If our Christian life only gives us hope and makes this life better rather than meaning we have real hope for a real future with God, then how sad is that? I think it is very sad. We sing hymns at church and songs in

Sunday School and it is just stupid – a complete waste of time. We are deluded. We have been deceived. We have been mislead.

There is one more thing that Paul says in 1 Corinthians 15 that I want to share with you Georgia. 32 ... If the dead are not raised, "Let us eat and drink, for tomorrow we die." If God did not resurrect Jesus, then we can live our lives any way we want. We can lie, cheat, steal, get drunk and do whatever we want. We don't have to follow any of God's rules, because tomorrow we die and that will be the end of everything. There is no heaven or hell. When we die, there is just nothing! We have no hope and we have no future.

Georgia, if I were to end at this point, then it would be very, very sad. So let me finish by saying this. **20 But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead!** This is not just something I believe. This is something I know! I know that Jesus is alive because he lives in me. Jesus didn't just change what I believed. Jesus changed me. And so on this Easter Sunday I am able to sing all those wonderful hymns about his resurrection.

You are a very special and smart girl Georgia. Thank you for asking these important questions. I am very proud of you.

Pastoral Prayer

O Holy God, beyond our imagining and yet near to us as flesh to fingernails, we come before you this Easter day in gratitude. We confess, O God, that we like to think of Easter as a sunny and warm day, full of light and sweetness, redolent of all that is fragrant in springtime. Yet no matter what the weather outside, on this day your world remains in so many corners a dark and stormy place, sunk deep into the cold winter of sin and evil. Those who first witnessed your Son's resurrection found it to be a fearful and fearsome event. For you, O great God of surprises, crashed into our reality with something new and unexpected. But on this morning, we do not want to forget the darkness of last Friday afternoon and the way by which the Easter victory, about which we so happily sing this day, came about. We cannot forget the sacrifice, the bloody death, the God-forsaken pain of it all. This clash between your kingdom and this world was fierce.

Today we do praise you for all the might, power, and creativity by which you won the victory, Father. We praise you for raising from the dead our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, the great shepherd now of all of us sheep who follow him. But because we cannot and must not forget also the darkness of sin that even still is around us, we make petition this morning for all people anywhere and everywhere who continue to feel crucified by a cruel world and yet do not perceive any Easter. We pray for refugees, for tortured prisoners, for the innocent victims of war. We pray for abused children and battered women, for stricken families from whom a loved one has disappeared without a trace. We pray for the homeless poor and those victimized and diminished by racism, discrimination, and oppression of all kinds.

We pray for all those who can see no Easter light because all that is good and lovely has been eclipsed by a depression that will not lift, by chronic pain that will not abate, by a stretch of unemployment with no end in sight, or by a job that is slaying the spirit day by day because the work seems so meaningless. O Lord, the things that led Jesus to the cross have not yet disappeared from the face of the earth. The need for resurrection remains stubbornly present in the lives of millions. Make us, O Spirit of the living God, life-giving spirits to minister to those in need this Easter Sunday and always.

Right here in this congregation there are also needs aplenty. So, we make petition for the widow or widower who marks this Easter for the first time without a beloved spouse who died since last we observed this holy day. Be with anyone who feels that he or she needs to believe in the resurrection more than ever but is finding it more and more difficult because the absence of that dear person is too real to deny,

too total to grasp. We pray for those who are sick this day or who are worried about a loved one who is very ill.

And be with each of us gathered for this service. Thank you for all who have given of their time to make this service possible. Thank you for the glorious Easter hymns, old and new, which speak to us in a meaningful way of the Resurrection of Jesus. Above all we thank you for the presence of the Spirit of the living Lord, Christ Jesus. As we encounter nothing short of your very self here this morning, may we know for sure that we have indeed been in your sacred presence, and may this encounter in turn embolden us to live an Easter life not only now but also in the days to come and forevermore.
