“Mandate for Mothers”

Exodus 2:9

“And Pharaoh’s daughter said to her, “Take this child away and nurse him for me, and I will give you your wages.” So the woman took the child and nursed him.”

In our recent times together we have been considering aspects of the great redemption we have in Christ. But this morning we will take a break from that series because of the particular Sunday that has fallen on this date.

You see, scores of children have awakened earlier than usual today and have taken on the project of serving mother, “Breakfast in Bed” (The ultimate luxury no doubt!) Why? Because it’s Mother’s Day. Mother’s Day came into existence in 1914 when President Woodrow Wilson directed the Congress of the United States to designate the second Sunday of May as a special day for public expression of love and reverence for the mothers of America. It has obviously caught on here in Canada as it has been celebrated here from perhaps the same time

“Mothers” hold a special place in our hearts, and no matter how *mature* or *old* we grow. Who can forget their sage advice & profitable admonitions? In areas like:

- LOGIC: "If everyone else jumped off a cliff would you do it too?"
- MEDICINE: "If you don't stop crossing your eyes, they're going to freeze that way."
- HUMOR: "When that lawn mower cuts off your toes, don't come running to me."
- ANTICIPATION: "Just wait until your father gets home."
- RECEIVING: "You are going to get it when I get you home."
- RELIGION: "You better pray that will come out of the carpet."
- FORESIGHT: "Make sure you wear clean underwear, in case you're in an accident."
- WEATHER: "It looks as if a tornado swept through your room."
- HYPOCRISY: "If I've told you once, I've told you a million times: Don't Exaggerate!"

It is good and fitting that we, as families, and as a church, honour our mothers & the institution of motherhood. It is particularly needful to maintain an awareness of the unique role of motherhood because of the Post Christian/Post Modern times & culture in which we live. With the redefinition of marriage, the synthesizing of parental roles and the more recent push to obliterate the two God created genders and institute multiple genders, there is a greater need to uphold

the reality of motherhood. If the church of Jesus Christ doesn't do it, you can hardly expect academia and governing authorities to do it. Just recently one of the Covid 19 vaccination announcements stated that pregnant persons (Not mothers) could register for vaccinations. It is readily apparent that the value of true motherhood is being diminished in our culture. The "God-ordained" principles of family and motherhood have been largely replaced by "man-made" concepts that originate in the darkened minds of people who do not know God or acknowledge His ways. If these trends continue, "Motherhood" and the family as it has been down through the ages may well find itself on the "Endangered Species" list.

The "Family" is in need of support like never before! In fact, God places great emphasis on the ministry of a mother. Mothers are included in the 5th commandment where we are commanded to "Honour your father **and mother**. (Pro1:8), says "Do not forsake **your mother's teaching**." And (Pro 15:20) tells us that anyone who despises or underestimates the significance of their mother is a fool. Mothers are worthy of honour & respect because God has assigned mother her role. We see this role set forth in a familiar OT story. (Ex. 2:9),
"And Pharaoh's daughter said to her, "Take this child away and nurse him for me, and I will give you your wages." So the woman took the child and nursed him.

The words of the Egyptian Princess *"Take this child away and nurse him for me, and I will give you your wages"* convey the essence of, "God's Mandate for Mothers." What is it? – It is a mandate of nurturing.

There are components worth considering within this mandate of nurturing.

First of all, **A Child is a Gift from the Lord.**

Psa. 127:3, says, *Behold, children are a heritage* (gift other translations) *from the LORD*, the fruit of the womb a reward. The children a mother bears are a reward and a heritage from the LORD! "Heritage" is defined as: *"That which is received in order to pass on to a later generation."* Children are the embodiment of the God-given life that is sustained from one generation to the next. The birth of a child is God saying to the mother, "Take this child – he/she is my gift to you." "You're a participant with me in the renewal of life."

Now, a mother may say, I conceived this child, I brought it to term, I laboured to deliver it. It is my child by right of birth. It ought to be *my* gift to God. In a sense this is true. But in this account from Exodus, Pharaoh's daughter represented the power of life and death to the child. She could have had him tossed into the Nile

River to be drowned. But instead, the Princess gave the child to his natural mother. Thus to Jochebed, (Moses' mother), the Egyptian princess represented the means of life for her son. And she gladly accepted her own child back as a gift from a sovereign power.

It is a wise mother, who accepts her children as a gift from the Lord. For when she does, she is upheld by the realization that not only does she possess the gift; she has God's resources for the rearing of the child at her disposal as well. When you view your children as gifts from God, it will stand you in good stead in both rough and smooth seasons. *"Take this child away and nurse him for me, and I will give you your wages."* **A Child is a "Gift from the Lord"**

Then too, **a Mothers Mandate is to Nurture Her Child**. Implicit in the gift of the child is the command to care for it. The princess said, *"Take this child away and nurse him for me."* The child is a gift *from the Lord*. The labour involved in its care is *for the Lord*. And what a labour it is! Giving birth to the child is severe labour. But the labour doesn't cease at the moment of delivery. That child must be maintained, and the maintenance of the child is a labour. God has mandated mothers to faithfully nurture sustain & uphold their children. These things are inherent in the meaning of the term, "nurse".

In Scripture, the imagery associated with the word "Nurse," is one of abundance, satisfaction & comfort. These comforts come at the expense of a mother's energy, for a nursing mother gives of her own life's energies. But she does so in a host of other ways as well. There are diapers to change, trips to cribs in the night. Noses to wipe, schedules to rearrange, clothes to wash, dry, fold & put away. There are prescriptions to fill, medicine to administer, hurts and sorrows to rock and kiss away. There is the preparing means – Then pleading for the kids to eat. There are lunches to make, cookies to bake, recitals to go to, ball games, hockey games, and safe arrivals to lay awake for. Day after day, she is giving constantly of her life's energy.

God's mandate to mothers is one of nurturing. And a mother nurtures by giving of herself, transferring her energy, infusing her life into the lives of her children who depend upon her for their welfare and who can never really repay her. A mother's labour doesn't end with delivery. Her labour continues. To nurture is to labour. It is a labour of blood, sweat, toil & tears, day and night, day in & day out!

But it is a labour full of purpose because the text says, *"Take this child and*

nurse him for ***me!***” Maybe there is a mother or a grandmother here who is discouraged. Your giving never seems to let up. You are at your wits end. You feel drained and run down. Listen and take heart. If you are a Christian, you need to understand that you are nurturing the Lord’s heritage. You are watching over His gift. You are nursing your children for Him. It is a labour that has eternal purpose.

Listen to the words of (I Cor 15:58); *“Be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that your labour is not in vain in the Lord.”* Do you consider your children as our Lord’s gift to you? Do you see yourself as a nurturer of the Lord’s gift? **A Mothers Mandate is to Nurture Her Child.**

There also is a **Reward for Faithful Nurturing**. Pharaoh’s daughter said: *“Take this child away and nurse him for me, and **I will give you your wages**”*

There is a reward for faithful nurturing. What are the wages? It’s pretty safe to say that one of the rewards of faithful nurturing is that the grace of God will be experienced. John Calvin wrote that;

“Children are not the fruit of chance, but God, as it seems good to Him distributes to every man/woman his/her share of them . . . those who thus reflect on the goodness of God in His giving of their children, will readily and with a settled mind, look for the continuance of God’s grace.”

When you view your children as gifts from God and yourself as the caretaker of His gifts, a deeper understanding of God’s grace is acquired. It is acquired through His call to partner with Him in developing the young lives He entrusts to you.

As you love, forgive, correct and guide them, all the while giving of yourself & your life’s energy, amazing insight into the meaning of grace are gained. And as you live out that grace toward your children God’s love and grace will be magnified for you.

Another reward will be that **your faith in God will be increased**. No sooner do you bear the child than you begin to realize that you have an independent thinker on your hands. You realize that the molding of your child’s character will require more resources than you may have. You’ll want that child to develop and live wisely. You will want to train him according to the wisdom of God. And you’ll want to nurture that young life with firm and consistent love.

But you will find that you need more help. So you place him under the teaching of the church, and also pray for that child. You may well pray along the

lines of the parents in the Robert Burns poem: (A Cotter's Saturday Night)

*"That He who stills the raven's clamorous nest,
And decks the lily fair in flow'ry pride,
Would, in the way His wisdom sees the best,
For them and for their little ones provide;
But chiefly in their hearts, with grace divine preside."*

Isn't that what every Christian mother wants for her child? That Christ would "*chiefly in their hearts with grace divine preside!*" Doesn't that call for great faith? The children God gives you enlarges your trust and dependence upon Him. They are a means of increasing your faith as you entrust your children to his sovereign, loving care.

Finally, **a Mother's faithful nurturing is rewarded by growth.** Ex 2:9, "*So the woman took the child and nursed him. (V 10) And the child grew...*"

In (Psa 144:12, 14), David prayed that, *our sons in their youth be like plants full grown, our daughters like corner pillars cut for the structure of a palace... may there be no cry of distress in our streets!* As stewards of the Lord's heritage, mothers, play an indispensable role in bringing prayers like this to fulfillment. As stewards of the Lord's heritage, their children, mothers provide godly men and women as salt & light in a corrupt and darkened world. Mothers give to a nation, godly leaders, productive citizens, and generate by God's grace a positive effect on society.

In addition, mothers give to Christ's Church, adorning fixtures as described in (Isa. 61:3) where his people are *called oaks of righteousness, the planting of the LORD, that he may be glorified.* Mothers are in the business of rearing sons who become full grown plants, oaks of righteousness and daughters who are like corner pillars of beauty cut for the structure of a palace that glorify Christ's spotless bride the church.

If ever we needed the upcoming generation of men to be oaks of righteousness and women to be corner pillars of the Church and of society, surely it is now! O how we need men and women of God who stand for Christ and his kingdom! Men and women who are not *taken captive by philosophy and empty deceit, according to human tradition, according to the elemental spirits of the world, and not according to Christ* (Col 2:8). Men and women who are not *tossed to and fro by the waves and carried about by every wind of doctrine, by human cunning, by craftiness in deceitful schemes* (Eph 4:14). If we're to have

such men and women, then it will take godly mothers (and fathers) who nurture their children according to the vows they made at the baptism of those children, when they promised to raise them in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. Moses had such a mother.

When Moses became a man (Heb 11:24-28), “[He] *refused to be called the son of Pharaoh’s daughter, choosing rather to be mistreated with the people of God than to enjoy the fleeting pleasures of sin. He considered the reproach of Christ greater wealth than the treasures of Egypt, for he was looking to the reward. By faith he left Egypt, not being afraid of the anger of the king, for he endured as seeing him who is invisible. By faith he kept the Passover and sprinkled the blood, so that the Destroyer of the firstborn might not touch them.*”

What a man Moses was! He turned his back on the culture of Pharaoh’s daughter with its fleeting pleasures of sin and instead clung to the principles and precepts of the godly mother that nurtured him in the things of the Lord her God! Moses had a mother that nurtured him, and his influence under God’s hand is still felt today.

God’s mandate to mothers is this: *“Take this child away and nurse him for me, and I will give you your wages.”* The role of “Mother” deserves honour, respect, love and support. She has a mandate no other can fulfill. Her children are a gift from God. Her role is to nurture His child. Her reward will be eternal.

May each of us rise up and call her blessed.
