Children's Lesson

Today's story is about fishing. Fishing is something I think just about anyone here can understand.

How many of you go fishing in the summer? Do you go fishing with bait and hook? In a river, on a lakeshore or in a boat? How many of you have been flyfishing?

You see fishing is a simple concept to understand, we catch fish so we can eat them, unless you have a fish allergy like me that is. Yet, when it comes to the actual act of fishing it can get extraordinarily complex. There are baits and lures you pick and use for specific fish in specific water conditions.

Many fly fishermen tie their own flies because they believe that the flies that are for sale in the store are not the best for catching fish.

Simon-Peter and his crew are on the shore after fishing all night with no luck and Jesus tells them to get back into the boat and try again. They are professional fishermen, they know all the gear, the places and times and here comes this carpenter telling them how to catch fish. Could you imagine having your art teacher or music come in and tell your math teacher how to teach math? Or how about the other way around, who would like to see their math teacher come and try to teach music?

Yet, when they listen to Jesus something amazing happens. Even with all of their skill and knowledge they caught nothing. Then they listen to Jesus and their boats are so full that they almost sink.

Do you think there might be a simple lesson here for all of us, young and old in the scripture? I think there is, 'Listen to Jesus, you never know what will happen!' Even when we think we are the experts, we should be listening to Jesus and doing what he tells us to do, because he knows everything better than we do. That means we need to study our bibles, pay attention in Sunday school and worship, and pray to him regularly.

Let us all pray that we could learn to listen and obey Jesus a little better each day,

<u>Sermon</u>

The calling of the first disciples is one of the most memorable pieces of scripture in the New Testament. call for the disciples to give up their lives as normal everyday fishermen and become the fishers of men. We even have it immortalized here in this church on the stained-glass window. The

What does this dramatic event have to do with the modern church, with you and I? What does this shift in the lives of these first disciples have to do with the lives we all live each and every day? We know that it calls for us to evangelize, to be active participants in the great commission, but how do we do that? This piece of scripture we are looking at today has something to say to each of us about the great commission and how we should be fishers of men in our lives.

Luke 5:1-3

5 On one occasion, while the crowd was pressing in on him to hear the word of God, he was standing by the lake of Gennesaret, ² and he saw two boats by the lake, but the fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. ³ Getting into one of the boats, which was Simon's, he asked him to put out a little from the land. And he sat down and taught the people from the boat.

The crowds of people are pressing in upon Jesus, so he steps onto the boat. An ordinary boat, an ordinary placed of work. Somewhere where people went to work, to make a living. Jesus stepped into this normal everyday place and changed it instantly. When Christ stepped onto the boat it changed because it went from a place of labor and frustration to a place of intimacy and fellowship with Christ, not just for those on the boat but for everyone in the area surrounding the boat that could hear the voice of Christ.

This is what the church is called to be in this world. I have been here in the church when it is completely empty, it is just a building. A beautiful old building, one that has a wondrous history, yet when it is empty it is just that, it has no greater meaning. What adds the greater meaning, what makes it a special place is when the people of God gather together in this building. When God's people gather in this building it changes, it becomes a place of closeness with Jesus, a place of fellowship with other believers, a place full of warmth and love. The church by definition is not just the building it is the people.

Why is it that the church building changes so radically in character when the children of God gather together in it each week?

Well first off it is the people who gather here each week.

1 John 3:1-3

3 See what kind of love the Father has given to us, that we should be called children of God; and so we are. The reason why the world does not know us is that it did not know him.

² Beloved, we are God's children now, and what we will be has not yet appeared; but we know that when he appears we shall be like him, because we shall see him as he is. ³ And everyone who thus hopes in him purifies himself as he is pure.

The church is where the children of God gather, where those who are true believers gather together in fellowship and in Praise and worship of our God. That makes this building a special place, which makes anywhere the children of God gather a special place.

The church building, a school gymnasium a park, a house, they all become special places when the Children of God gather in them. They become a church regardless of what real world purpose they serve. When Jesus set foot into the boat, he changed it from being an ordinary fishing boat into a Church of Christ. Yet again taking the ordinary and making it into something extraordinary.

When we gather together here in this building each week, we change it from a building into a church. A place where we praise our sovereign God, a place where we preach the word of God and where we week to learn and obey the teachings of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. That is what makes this a special place.

It becomes special, not because of the stained glass, the wooden pews, or the history, but because of the food we get for our souls when we engage in the word of God. It becomes a special place because it helps us overcome our sinful nature as we are encouraged in the scripture and because it is a place where we can find the fellowship and support of our fellow believers, our brothers, and sisters in Christ.

This is what the church becomes when the children of God gather within a space. It becomes the light in the darkness, the beacon on the hill that draws others to its light. It becomes the oasis in the desert of this world, a place where the weary can find refuge and revival. A place where those who are being beat down by the realities of this world can find help and hope in the kingdom of heaven which is still to come. It becomes a place where we can find acceptance and love regardless of how the world views us, because of our shared love of Jesus Christ.

The church is a special place and I pray that we never take it for granted. There are places in the world where people need to meet in secret, in hiding to praise and worship God because of the persecution in their countries. I pray we will never know that reality, that we will always value our church, whether it is a simple building or a beautiful old historical building like this. May we always love our church, pray for our church support our church and defend our church in this world, because this is that beacon of light for God's children.

The second way that Jesu changed that ordinary little boat into something extraordinary is the same way we transform any building into a church. When Jesus stepped upon the boat, he sat down, and he taught. He turned a fishing boat into a church by using it as his pulpit. Many churches are invested heavily in tradition. The preacher needs to be up front behind the pulpit, etc. etc. Yet the truth is that Jesus preached from a dirty, smelling, normal everyday fishing boat and it became a church. It became a place where everyone within hearing range was taught the word of God.

When Jesus sat and taught it showed us all a picture of what the church is meant to be. Jesus did not just come to Earth and heal, everywhere he went, in everything he did he taught the word of God.

This is what the church is called to be, a place of instruction. Did you know that the actual title of a pastor in the reformed tradition is not pastor or father or reverend? It is Teaching Elder, which is a pastor's primary job, teaching the word of God, the same way it is a churches primary job to teach the word of God. It is a place for the instruction of the soul. From the moment we enter a church, to the Sunday school, to the preaching time, and in all the praise and worship, the instruction of the Word of God should be the primary focus. It should be a place of instruction in righteousness and our goal should be in enabling people to become more knowledgeable and better followers of the scriptures. Biblical instruction should be the cornerstone of every church regardless of the building or place in which it is located.

Our Sunday Schools, our bible studies, our youth groups are not meant to be times where we play games and have fun first, they are places where we are meant to study and glean knowledge and truths from the scripture. The irony of this lies in the past, at the time of the creation of the United Church of Canada, the presbyterian church went through a great divide. One of the men who helped establish The Presbyterian Church in Canada was Walter Bryden. He authored a book on why he stayed presbyterian and in he noted the trend of the day to focus of entertainment rather than the teaching of the Christian doctrine. He spoke to how while having some merit in attracting people, did very little to teach them of what Christianity was and meant in their lives. The Presbyterian church in 1924 returned to teaching doctrine while the United Church of Canada focused on entertaining the youth. Here we are just 100 years later facing a divide in our churches over a doctrinal manner, because we failed to teach and instead fell into the trap of entertainment.

Our time in church is not a time for a preacher to get up in front of you and try to get you emotionally worked up. It is not a time meant to make you feel better about yourself, or to condemn yourself. It is not about yelling or whispering, it is not about preaching for 10 minutes or 100 minutes, although this is what many churches are making it about these days. Instead, it is about preaching the whole counsel of the Word of God. The whole counsel, the stuff you want to hear and the stuff you do not want to hear, for as long as it takes, whether that is 5 minutes or 5 hours, because the focus is God and His Word.

This is how scripture charges a preacher of the word:

2 Timothy 4:1-2

4 I charge you in the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and by his appearing and his kingdom: ² preach the word; be ready in season and out of season; reprove, rebuke, and exhort, with complete patience and teaching.

The church is a place of instruction. A place where you come ready to learn. A place where you come eager to study God's word, with your bible, and a pen, and maybe even a notebook. Where you come with a heart that is ready to absorb in the truths that God is giving to you in His scriptures and willing to take them forth into the world you live and share them with others. Yet the reality of many churches and many people is that the church has instead become a social gathering, a place you go to once a week, or less, and endure the sermon because of habit or ritual rather than love of God. A place where you seek your own satisfaction and entertainment rather than seek the Truth of God's will.

Luke 5:4-5

⁴ And when he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into the deep and let down your nets for a catch." ⁵ And Simon answered, "Master, we toiled all night and took nothing! But at your word I will let down the nets."

Which is why for many of us the church can sometimes be a place of irritation. Simon was frustrated when Jesus told him to go out and let down the nets. In the second verse we saw that the men were not even in the boats when Jesus arrived, they were ashore washing their nets.

Simon and his crew were fishermen, they had been up all-night toiling at their day-to-day work of catching fish, trying to earn a living for themselves and their families. They had not caught a thing, they were likely tired and frustrated, cleaning their nets by removing all of the debris that they had caught instead of fish.

Imagine how irritating that must have been. Peter was a professional fisherman. He knew what to do, he knew where to go, he knew what tools to use, what baits worked. He knew everything he needed to know about the fish and yet here he was that morning cleaning out empty nets with his crew.

This is how church is for many of us. We come to church week after week, month after month; we sing, we pray, we listen, we learn, we testify, and we go home. We get up and do it again every week almost out of habit. We are busy and we feel like we are doing good, but something is missing. Just like the fishermen were busy, doing a good thing while they were cleaning the nets, we are missing the fish.

This is how evangelism is for many of us, the fishing of men, or even our own families. We think we have all of the knowledge we need; we believe we know the place the men are at, we believer we have all of the tools. We know what to do, we have seen others use a bait that works and when we try it, we get nothing, not a single fish and we are like those men sitting on the beach that day, frustrated and irritated, tired, and maybe questioning our career choice.

Yet this day that Jesus joined them something changed. He tells them to 'put out into the deep and let down your nets.'

Jesus knew the boat was in good shape, that it was maintained and looked after by the fishermen on the shore, so he orders them to take it out into the deep. Jesus knew the boat was seaworthy the same way the church is seaworthy. There is nothing wrong with the church, the children of God. Despite all of the problems the church has, despite the many false churches around the world, the real churches, the biblical churches, are fine and operating according to God's word. While the waters may be rough, some of the crew exhausted and perhaps a little seas sick, some of the sailors are frustrated and feeling let down from no catches. The truth is that the church of God's children is strong, and all of the problems it is facing need to be fixed internally by falling back onto the bible and scripture and not seeking out the ways of the world.

Why did Jesus tell them to set out into the deep? If you want to catch fish, you need to go to where the fish are swimming. In the heat of the day the fish definitely were not swimming in the shallows and from the frustrated and exhausted looks of the crew he knew that the fish were not in the boats. That left one place for the fish to be, out in the cool deep waters.

How true is this of the church? When we evangelize, when we fish for men why are we doing it in the boat? Why are we fishing so close to our shores? The fish are out there in the deep waters not huddled up against the walls of the church.

Mark 16:15

 15 And he said to them, "Go into all the world and proclaim the gospel to the whole creation.

They operative word being 'Go.' If we want to be fishers of men, we need to be going out into the world. This means talking to people in places where we are, not just at church or just people we meet through Christian brothers and sisters. We need to be willing to go out into the deep waters of the world if we want to be able to cast our nets and catch fish for the lord. We can stay in the church and pray for God to saves souls, but until we go out to where the fish are and start casting our nets, very few souls will be saved.

The second thing we need to recognize is that they needed to let the nets down into the deep. The crew could have made the perfect net, kept it in pristine condition and hauled it in their boat over the entire sea of Galilee and never caught a fish. They could have bought the best nets available, studied at the greatest fishing schools in the world on how to cast and draw in

their nets and still never caught a fish. They might have gone and talked with every other fisherman along the shore about fishing, discussed how each one casts their nets differently All of this busy work would do absolutely no good until they were willing to let down the net, to let it down into the deeps to where the fish actually were.

How is this like the church today. Many seem to believe that as long as you have the right bible translation, the right kind of preacher, the right music, the right stage, the right slides, the right lighting, the right clothes, say the right things and do not offend anyone in the world, the fish will magically show up and jump into the boat. Imagine if real life fishermen worked under this premise, they bought all the best fishing equipment, got the best-looking boat they could get, trained everyone on technique and practiced the skills and then sat and waited for the fish to come to the boat. It does not work! No matter how much we talk about witnessing to people, no matter how well developed our services are and how many programs we run, no one will magically appear in the congregation. It takes some action on our part, we need to be willing to do as Jesus instructed to go out into the deep and cast our nets!

Just like on that day that Jesus appeared to Simon and his crew, Jesus knows where the fish are swimming. He is trying to send us out to where they are, and he is telling us to fish. And just like Simon's crew if we listen to him and cast out into the deep and drop down our nets, He will fill the nets. All of our plans, all of our programs, all of our efforts are useless unless they are designed and directed by God. When they are focused on Christ and they follow his will and we stop expecting people to come to us and instead head out ourselves into the deeper water to cast our nets, then God will fill them for His Glory.

We know that this is the truth, yet how many of us are just like Simon was in this instance?

Peters first reaction is not to obey, but to question.

Luke 4:5

⁵ And Simon answered, "Master, we toiled all night and took nothing! But at your word I will let down the nets."

The had been at it all night. Every fisherman knew the best time to catch fish was at night, because they would come up out of the deeps and be easier to catch. Furthermore, they had worked hard, toiled which means 'to labor with wearisome effort.' Over and over all night long Simon and his crew had cast their nets over the side of the boat and hauled them back into the boats in hope of a catch. All night long they had toiled and caught not even a single fish! Imagine how exhausted and frustrated they felt, all that hard work and nothing to show for it, they probably just wanted to finish cleaning up and go home, get some sleep, and forget the nights work.

Does this sound like the church at times? We look at the programs we have tried in the past and we forget them thinking, we tried that, it did not work, even though we knew how to do it,

so let us not try that again. Or we always try things the same way, thinking that it is our will that will make things succeed. Not giving opportunity or thought to God's will. Maybe we do not support someone else's efforts because we think these things, because like those fishermen we are tired and just want to go home and rest and forget the unsuccessful night we have had fishing.

When we are doing things outside of God's command, we may not see success even if all of the other things are in place. Those fishermen knew everything they needed to know, they had all the right equipment, they knew the correct place to go, and they failed, because they were missing the most important part, God's command.

In spite of his exhaustion, feeling defeated, frustrated, and filled with doubt, Simon chose to obey Jesus's command. He chose to listen and obey, without the promise of anything. He did not know there would be a miracle, from his response he expected nothing but another failure. Yet he gathered the crew and set out into the depths for another cast of the nets.

Luke 4:6-7

⁶ And when they had done this, they enclosed a large number of fish, and their nets were breaking. ⁷ They signaled to their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both the boats, so that they began to sink.

If they had not obeyed Jesus, they would have missed out on the miracle. They caught so many fish the nets were at the point of failure, almost ready to burst. So many fish that they had two boats full to the point of sinking. They were fishing in the wrong place, at the wrong time of day and they still experienced a great success. This is a statistical impossibility, it cannot be true, it makes no sense, yet here they were with the proof lining the holds of two boats. God can do amazing things even when we doubt. Simon doubted they would catch anything, and God ensured they had a huge catch. Even if we doubt the success of something we should go along and participate, because God can make anything a success and we might miss out on the miracle if we place our trust in our doubt instead of God's Glory.

This is evangelism, casting our nets into the deep even if we doubt our success. When we get involved in the community this coming year, 'when we launch out into the depths and cast our nets into the deep.' I am confident that some people will recall something similar that was tried in the past and was not successful. Some may doubt at the possibility of that form of evangelism working, however, I am hoping there will be a few people like Simon who say, 'We tried, and it did not work then, but you know what let us give it another shot.' And maybe, just maybe, we will get top experience a miracle of the Lord as we see his hand at work.

The world is full of people seeking God's word. This pandemic has created a world in which people are seeking the meaning of their lives, people are questioning their faith and people are looking for answers. Churches have been swallowed up in financial holes and pastors have

given up in exhaustion leaving believers wandering in the wilderness looking for bible believing churches to attend.

If we want God to fill out nets to fill these pews, we need to be willing to go out into the depths, into the places outside these walls and cast our nets. We need to be willing to go out and cast the nets where He calls for us to, even if we think it might fail or might see little success. We need to trust in him, that is the secret to success.

Luke 5:9-11

⁹ For he and all who were with him were astonished at the catch of fish that they had taken, ¹⁰ and so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. And Jesus said to Simon, "Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching men." ¹¹ And when they had brought their boats to land, they left everything and followed him.

The were astonished! When they recognize the impossibility of what had just occurred, they realized the deity of Christ. They had just taken part in a miracle; they were amazed by his power and the began to glorify him.

Jesus has the power to do the impossible. He can amaze everyone of us with the things he can do. He can fill this church to capacity and beyond if He chooses too. However, we need to be willing to go out to the depth and cast the nets. We need to be willing to support anyone with any idea. When we see God at work in our church, our home, and our communities we are filled with excitement. It is easy to get on board when there is success, but the ones who are most fulfilled were the ones who cast out into the depths even in their exhaustion, they are reinvigorated by the miracles they witnessed.

Ask yourself are you willing to fulfill the great commission, to bring his name to everyone you meet. Everywhere you go, with everyone you meet, in everything you do, Glorify His name. Talk to people about Christ, about faith and invite them to church, invite them to Bible studies! Even when you have tried in the past without success do not give up, keep heading out into the depth and casting out the net, you never know when they will come back full, and you will experience that same sense of amazement that Simons crew did that day. Cast you nets every day and let the Lord be at work in your heart, he will fill you with Joy and you will Glorify him in everything you do.

Jesus told them that day that they would become fishers of men. They trusted in Christ, they pulled their boats ashore, put away their nets and became followers of Christ. These simple fishermen, common workers, not nobles, not educated men, not teacher and preachers, simple fishermen are the reason you and I are here today. Common everyday workers were the start of the Church. Think about it, its often easy to forget when we read the Bible that Simon was a fisherman, Simon-Peter the man who in Acts on the day of Pentecost stood and proclaimed the Word of God to the masses, he cast out his net into the depths and 3000 souls were saved.

That fisherman proclaimed the word of God, and it was heard, and then someone else proclaimed it and it was heard, and that has been happening over and over throughout the centuries until finally you and I heard the word of God proclaimed and we became believers. For some of us it might have been a pastor, but for others it could have been a parent or a friend.

This is how our faith has been passed down for the last 2000 years. Common people casing the net of the gospel far and wide, new believers taking up the nets and casting it out, new believers coming to the faith and then casting out through witnessing, testimony, and the way the live. Each generation of Christians passes the nets to the next and reminds them that they are to go out into the deep and cast down their nets, bringing Christ to the world.

Today this church is our vessel, it is our boat. Jesus is telling us to launch out into the deep, out into the community that surrounds us, out into our workplaces, the places we have hobbies, the places we play sports, the places where we eat and drink and let down our nets. Bring the Gospel with us everywhere we go and share it with everyone we meet. Invite them all to come to church, whether they are believers or not. Cast the nets into the deep and trust in Christ. Are you willing to do that? Are we willing to fulfill the great commission and do that? If we, are we might just get to experience the miracle when we obey God and go out into the depths and cast out our nets?

From the moment we are saved, until the moment we are taken home to heaven we are to be casting out our Gospel nets. We are all fishers of men. We are all like Simon and his crew, we will have moments of frustration and failure, but they will be far outweighed by the successes that Christ will bring our way.
