Children's Lesson

<u>Sermon</u>

Christ is Risen!

This is the Easter message and one we will repeat each week until the ascension occurs. Christ rising after his crucifixion is important because it can give us assurance of his second coming, on that is prophesied of in the book of revelation, which is the book which we will be studying scripture from each week for the next six weeks.

This week we will begin with the greeting given to the seven churches. This simple bit of scripture reminds us of who Jesus is and what is to come in our future. This letter was penned to seven churches that existed in the world at the time in Asia Minor. There were a lot more than seven churches in existence at the time, but these churches are the ones that are used for a few reasons.

Firstly, they were large congregations who were composed of real people, in real places with real problem and real faith. The book of Revelation is a book that was intent to be read and understood, not just a book that we skip over because it is difficult to understand. The things that John presents to the reader in the book are real and meant to help them understand the second coming of Christ and the value of their faith.

Secondly, every church that has existed in the church throughout all of history are represented by the seven churches that are mentioned here in the beginning of the book of revelation. Each and every church contains bits and pieces of these seven churches, so while the book might not be addressed to our church directly, there are aspects of our church that exists in the seven churches, making this book addressed to each of us.

We can also understand that the seven churches utilized by John in the book of revelation were meant to represent every church throughout all of the past, present and future because of the usage of the number seven. Biblically the number seven represents 'perfection, completion, and fullness.'

Even in our world we see the number seven prominently. Seven is considered a lucky number, but did you also notice that there are seven colors in the rainbow, ROYGBIV, there are seven notes in the musical scale, there are seven days in the week.

Seven also shows up in the scriptures.

Seven also shows up many times in the book of revelation, in fact it shows up forty-nine times, seven times seven. There are seven feasts that the Jewish people are commanded to have in

the book of Leviticus: Passover, Unleavened Bread, First Fruits, Feast of Weeks, Feast of Trumpets, the Day of Atonement, and the Feast of Tabernacles. The seven sayings of Christ on the cross. Or how about Jericho where seven priests carried seven trumpets around the city for seven days and then on the seventh day, they marched around the city seven times.

In the book of revelation, the number seven appears forty-nine times, seven times seven. There are seven churches, seven spirits, seven stars, seven seals, seven horns, seven eyes, seven trumpets, seven angels, seven horns, seven plagues, seven crowns, seven kings, seven mountains. There are a whole lot of sevens, and they all are meant to represent everything that can happen, the number seven is the number of fullness, completion, and perfection.

So, we know that when the seven churches are mentioned here at the start, that the letter which follow is not just intended for those seven churches, but for ourselves and our church, as well as ever other Christian and every other church out there throughout all of time.

And what is it that John is meant to share with us all Christians and all churches through all of time, this is the Holy Catholic church that we speak of in the creeds. What is john to share with us 'Grace to you and peace.' Grace from God, the willingness of God to sacrifice his son upon the cross for our sins while we were still sinners. Grace that God will give to all of his believers without any requirement from them other than a willingness to receive his grace, and the peace that comes alone with that grace.

The peace we can have knowing that God is the one in control of the world and that regardless of what is happening in this world we can look forward to the day that we will return home to live with him forever in his kingdom. Grace and Peace are offered to the Holy Catholic Church to all of the saints who will exist in this world from its beginning until its end offered to us by our God.

It is given to us from the trinity, the God who is three in one. The word from appears three times, each time representing an aspect of our God, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. God is the source of all of the grace and the peace we will experience in our lives. This should remind us that John may have penned the book of Revelation, but it was inspired and written by our God. The whole bible is God's Word to his Holy Catholic Church. It carries his awesome power and his divine authority in every word.

This letter is from the one who is, who was and who is to come. The God who called himself 'I Am' in the book of Exodus. The Eternal God who exists in past, present and future. The never changing God. He is our source of Grace and Peace.

Then you have the 'seven spirits before his throne.' The fullness of the spirit of God. This is the completeness of the Spirit of God and shows us to how he can influence us in every aspect of his ministry in us and through us. We can receive grace and peace because of the completeness of the spirit. God is all we need because he is sufficient, he is complete. The book if Isaiah teaches us of the spirit:

Isaiah 11:2 ² And the Spirit of the LORD shall rest upon him, the Spirit of wisdom and understanding, the Spirit of counsel and might, the Spirit of knowledge and the fear of the LORD.

And the Son, he is also our source of grace and peace. These things come from our Lord Jesus Christ. The Father and The Holy Spirit are spoken of in symbolic language, but here we have the scripture speaking very plainly, very straightforward, Jesus is a source of grace and peace for the Holy Catholic Church, not just any piece, but a very physical and very real central piece, something we should all understand after Lent, good Friday, and Easter Sunday.

The book of Revelation is not going to let us be confused about who Jesus is or what He is about. Knowing who he is and believing what he is about is critical to getting everything else right in Christianity. If you do not know the truth about who Jesus is in the scriptures your whole basis for your faith will be wrong. So, the book of Revelation lays it out clearly, the three-fold person and work of Jesus Christ, our lord and saviour.

Jesus, the faithful witness. The one who became wholly human even though he was God so that he could reveal the truth of the father to the world. In the Old Testament it was Israel that was God's witness to the world, and now it is the church, both who fail many times over in their witness. Jesus is the only real witness of God here on Earth. Jesus was God in human flesh. He did not reflect God's teachings or try to obey God's teachings. He was God's teachings in the flesh and for that reason he is the one and only Faithfull Witness of who God is, God was, and God will be throughout all of eternity.

Jesus, the firstborn of the dead. He was not the first person raised from the dead. We see people raised from death in both the Old Testament and in the Gospels. Yet these people who were raised from the dead will eventually die again. But Jesus was different, after his crucifixion, his body was raised from the dead and he lived in that body and ascended into heaven in that body. He got up and stayed up, the rest died again.

Jesus's resurrection is the standard that all of us will eventually follow at the end of times when we are raised up into his kingdom. He is an example for all of us of what to expect, those of us who have placed our faith in him will get up from the grave forever and enjoy eternal life in his Kingdom.

Jesus, the ruler of kings on earth. He is indeed the King of Kings and the Lord of Lords. Jesus is in absolute control of the Earth. In the book of Revelation, we will see Satan send his king, the anti-Christ into the world and cause chaos, and destruction and evil. Yet even he will recognize his Master, Jesus Christ, when he returns. When Jesus returns, everyone will recognize him, every tyrant, every dictator, ever king, every CEO, Every CFO, every company owner, everyone will know that Jesus is the King of King, the Lord of Lords, the ultimate ruler off all of existence.

Jesus, the one who loved us. Jesus loved every one of us, every member of his church, every saint, and every sinner throughout all of time. Jesus loves all people in spite of everything we think, say, and do. His love is unceasing, unfailing, and unconditional. It is His love for all people that brought him to the world. It is His love that caused him to weep as he entered into the city of Jerusalem, it was his love that caused him to go to the cross willingly for our sins It is a love that will not fail anyone who turns to him.

Jesus, the one who washed away our sins with his blood. It was His love for us that caused His heart to burst, His blood to be shed for our sins. His blood that washes away the debt of our sins. His Blood that cleanses away our stains and makes us as white as snow. His love is so strong that he is the one who suffered and was crucified for our salvation, we did nothing to earn it, nothing to partake in it except bring our sin to him and repent from what we have done.

Jesus, the one who made us a kingdom and priests to his God and Father. Jesus refused to leave us in our state of sin, our state of separation from God. Instead, he came to earth to reconcile us with God, to restore our relationship and to bring us back into the kingdom of God. He washed away our sins, he paid our debts and has brough through who believe in him back into the family of God, where they are co-heirs with Christ in God's eternal kingdom. Through his sacrifice on the cross and his resurrection He has given us direct access to God, we no longer needed to go through the complications of sacrifice which were laid out in the books of the Old Testament, because he had become our lamb.

Jesus, the one to whom be glory and dominion forever and ever. This is the first of the doxologies, the words of praise given in the book of revelation. Jesus deserves our praise, he deserves our worship, we are called to glorify him. The more we know about God, about the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, the more we should desire to exalt them. The more we understand about the love that Jesus had for us and the sacrifice he made the more we should seek to give him praise, honor and glory.

Not only should we offer him honor. Praise and glory for what he has already done, but for what he is still going to do. When Jesus came the first time it was though a human birth, he was born of the Virgin Mary, and he died upon the cross for our redemption. When he returns it is not going to be in the same way, the book of Acts tells us

Acts 1:10-11

¹⁰ And while they were gazing into heaven as he went, behold, two men stood by them in white robes, ¹¹ and said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking into heaven? This Jesus, who was taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven."

He will return in the clouds, as we are told here in the book of revelation, in the body in which he ascended. He will return in all of his power and all of his glory. Jesus is coming back to fulfill the book of Revelation, to finish the plan that God has had since the creation that is written about in

the book of Genesis. He will defeat his enemies; He shall establish his kingdom and He will reign here on earth for one thousand years. He will be coming again.

Jesus will return and every eye will see him. When I was a kid, we heard the news of things happening on the other side of the world usually within a few hours of them happening if they were big enough events. Now we can get a video call from a three-year-old on the other side of the globe who wants to share a visual of the rock they found. The idea of every eye seeing Christ on his return was though impossible just 30 years ago, now with the invention of satellites technology and the internet it is possible for people to witness events as the take place in real time, all seeing it exactly as it unfolds without delay. When Jesus returns, we will see Him, all of us, the entire world will witness his return from the clouds and His presence, and His glory will be undeniable that day to all who lay eyes upon Him.

Everyone will see him and know of him, but not everyone will be joyous about his second coming. Jew and Gentile will wail on account of him. The Jews will weep because they will recognize that it was their fathers who rejected the divinity of Christ and placed God upon the crucifix. The gentiles will wail because they will understand that Jesus has come to cast judgement upon the world, He has come to judge both sin and sinner and their adherence to worldly ideas of legality and morality will not save them from the biblical understanding of the laws of God. When Jesus returns Judgment will come for all, the same way he offered salvation to all who come to him when he died upon the crucifix.

AMEN! This is the prayer that we offer consistently. Amen means 'so be it' or 'may it come to pass,' and all followers of Christ should be looking forward to His return. We have nothing to fear, and we should be looking forward to his return and Jesus setting the world right under his rulership for all of eternity.

Jesus, the Alpha, and the Omega, will return. He has been here since the beginning, and he will be here until the end. Yes, his second coming is the signal of the end of times, of the coming final judgement for this wicked and sinful world. However, it is also the signal of the end of all of the pain and suffering in this world. Everything that God begun in the book of Genesis will finish in the book of Revelation. He is the Alpha and the Omega, the begging and the end of the Greek alphabet, every word of the Greek language falls within those two boundaries. All the thoughts, ideas and possibility of mankind is contained within the boundaries of those two letters, the same way everything is bound in the power and authority of Jesus Christ. He is the Omniscient one, the one who is all-seeing and all-knowing one. He is the one who started it all in Genesis and set the universe on its present course and he is the one who will bring it to its proper conclusion. This is why we cannot do as many modern churches want and ignore the Old Testament. The book of Genesis and the Book of Genesis and the Book of Genesis and the store both critical to understanding the Bible, the world of God and his plan.

Jesus is the one which is, which was, and which is to come. He is God, Jesus is declaring his deity for all who read this book. Jesus is echoing the words of God in verse four, the all-knowing, all-present, all-powerful God. The one who transcends all space and all time. The one who created

it all in Genesis. He is the one who has authority over all of creation, and everything that is written in his book, whether we believe it or not, whether we obey it or not, is going to come true, because he is the one in control. Simply put, we need to obey the God of the bible, not the God we want because everything that God has planned is going to happen and his judgement will be based on his standards and not ours. So, if you are a faithful follower, do not worry, Jesus is in control always. But if you are not saved, if you are following your own form of Jesus, you need to be afraid, because you will be one of those who is wailing when he returns in his glory. The Bible tells us there is a heavenly kingdom for those who belief and a hell for those who are lost.

Jesus, who is the Almighty. He is the sovereign Lord over all things, over all of time, over all of the universe. He is the one who will bring everything to pass as he planned. He is going to do it, and no one will be able to prevent it from happening.

This is what all believers have to look forward to! The truth of the scriptures is undeniable. Every word of the scriptures is truth, and every bit of the scriptures will come to pass. Just as Jesus rose from the grave after his crucifixion, he will be coming again to fulfil the rest of the prophecies in the Bible. He will be coming to judge the living and the dead, to recreate the world into his Kingdom.

Amen! We should be celebrating this, looking forward to this, to the end of all of the evils of this world and to the grace and peace we will all have eternally in his kingdom. We should be praying for those people who have not yet for Christ, we should be sharing the truth of the scripture with anyone who is willing to listen, we should be living our lives by the scripture and not under the sway of the world and its corruption and selfish ways. We should live our lives living with the knowledge that we have been given this day to praise, honor and glorify our Loving God!
