Children's Lesson

Sermon

Just a few weeks ago we were in the midst of lent. A season of reflection, of sacrifice and of sorrow. We felt all these emotions because it is clear to us throughout this whole season of lent that Jesus went to the cross for us, for me and for you. He suffered the humiliation, the beatings, the torture, and his painful death upon the cross for each of us. We are the ones who have received God's grace so that we may be forgiven of our sins. It is the reality of understanding the value of his sacrifice that weighs so heavy upon our hearts all throughout the season of lent.

However, Christ is Risen!

And it is that glorious moment that we need to focus on during the Easter season, after Easter Sunday and leading up to the Ascension. The is a fact, an absolute truth, that Jesus rose from the dead and then ascended into heaven to be seated at the right hand of his father.

It is easy for all of us to understand the importance of his death, the sacrifice he made for our sins, the atonement for our trespasses and transgressions. We have heard thousands upon thousands of sermons based upon these truths.

But how easy is it for us to understand the importance of him rising from the dead? We all understand that it fulfilled some of the prophecies foretold of the Messiah in the Old Testament and therefore him rising from the grave proved he was in fact the Messiah to the people of that time, and to all Christians throughout all time.

However, there is much more to the phrase Christ is Risen than it just being proof of him being the Messiah, of Him being God. In today's scripture from the book of Revelation we will see why we should be celebrating the truth of the fact that Christ is Risen every day of our lives. The book of Revelation is a book that is filled with visions and prophecy, as I have shared before it is the book that is most requested by congregations as a book they want to learn from, and probably the least read and least commonly preached from book in the bible. It is full of confusing imagery and language. It is the place where the idea of the apocalypse comes from. The idea of the end of times. The destruction of the world, the end of humanity, the final battle between good and evil. The irony is that it is not what the Greek word apocalypse actually means. In Greek $\dot{\alpha}\pi$ ok $\dot{\alpha}\lambda$ o ψ oc (apo-kal-yup-sees) has a very different meaning, it means "an unveiling or unfolding of things not previously known and which could not be known apart from the unveiling" or in simple language it means to reveal something that could only be seen after its is revealed, like unwrapping a gift.

This is what John calls a Revelation. And it is in chapter 5 of the book of Revelation we begin to see the importance of Jesus's death, resurrection, and ascension through John who is having this apocalyptic vision and is recording all he sees.

Revelation 5:1–4

5 Then I saw in the right hand of him who was seated on the throne a scroll written within and on the back, sealed with seven seals. ² And I saw a mighty angel proclaiming with a loud voice, "Who is worthy to open the scroll and break its seals?" ³ And no one in heaven or on earth or under the earth was able to open the scroll or to look into it, ⁴ and I began to weep loudly because no one was found worthy to open the scroll or to look into it.

In revelation 5:1-4 we see Him who sat on the throne is God, the father. In his hand is a scroll that is sealed with seven seals. An angel is shouting out, seeking for someone who can open the scroll, and John is weeping in despair because no one in heaven or upon the earth had come forward who could open this scroll. For many of us it might seem kind of silly for him to weep over not being able to read a scroll.

So, we need to ask ourselves why is it that John is weeping over this scroll? What is weighing on his heart so heavily that he weeps even though he is in the presence of God? The scroll must have some great significance, and if you had been alive at the time of Jesus walking the earth you would know that it does. A scroll that was sealed with a king's seal could only be opened by someone who had the matching seal. Therefore, this scroll in the hand of God that was sealed with seven seals needed to be opened by someone, or a group of people that had the matching seven seals. Most times scroll was sealed with a single seal, was meant to be opened by a single person and contained information that was important to that person or that Kingdom. A scroll that was sealed with seven seals was special, really special. In fact, it was really only used in the culture of the time when someone was writing their last will and testament. So, when their will was opened and read, everyone who was important, or included in the will, would have to be present and have their seal shown before the scroll could be opened and the will proclaimed for all to hear?

God is seated here and has his will in his right hand ready to be opened and read for the whole world and John is weeping because there is no one in the heavens or on earth or even under the earth who is capable of opening the scrolls seven seals and proclaiming the will of God for his people.

It is then that one of the elders says to him;

Revelation 5:5

⁵ And one of the elders said to me, "Weep no more; behold, the Lion of the tribe of Judah, the Root of David, has conquered, so that he can open the scroll and its seven seals."

You see this, this is an incredibly important fact around Jesus's Crucifixion and resurrection we often fail to recognize. Jesus's death has always been a part of God's design. Jesus's death allowed God to not only forgive us of our sins through his son's payment in blood for our sins, it also allowed God to have his Son be the one and only being capable of reading God's will and ensuring that it everything written in it will come to pass. The truth is that Jesus is the Lion of the tribe of Judah and the Root of David and through his resurrection he has triumphed over the devil, sin and death itself.

The prophecy of the The Lion of the Trible of Judah comes from the book of Genesis;

Genesis 49:9-10

⁹ Judah is a lion's cub; from the prey, my son, you have gone up. He stooped down; he crouched as a lion and as a lioness; who dares rouse him? ¹⁰ The scepter shall not depart from Judah, nor the ruler's staff from between his feet, until tribute comes to him; and to him shall be the obedience of the peoples. Remember when we spoke of Jesus riding into Jerusalem, people had so many different expectations of him as the Messiah. In the Old Testament the Jews were taught that the messiah would arise from the masses and lead them to salivation. Many believed that the messiah would be a great warrior who would conquer all the enemies of the Jews in glorious battles. He would be a Lion, a warrior king who would establish his kingdom for all time slaying all who stood against him, even when odds were against him, just as David had defeated Goliath.

The Idea of root of David comes from the book of Isaiah:

Isaiah 11:1-5

11 There shall come forth a shoot from the stump of Jesse, and a branch from his roots shall bear fruit.

² And the Spirit of the LORD shall rest upon him, the Spirit of wisdom and understanding, the Spirit of counsel and might, the Spirit of knowledge and the fear of the LORD.

³ And his delight shall be in the fear of the LORD. He shall not judge by what his eyes see, or decide disputes by what his ears hear,

⁴ but with righteousness he shall judge the poor, and decide with equity for the meek of the earth; and he shall strike the earth with the rod of his mouth, and with the breath of his lips he shall kill the wicked.

⁵ Righteousness shall be the belt of his waist, and faithfulness the belt of his loins.

This is another expectation that the Jews had of the Messiah. He would be a wise and righteous ruler who would be able to not only lead his people to military victories but to great successes economically and socially. He would re-establish bonds of trust and fellowship and deliver his people from their evil ways. He would slay those who remained wicked and did not repent their evil ways. This Messiah was not the warrior but a priest, one who leads his people through his righteousness and holiness.

The elder tells john that 'has conquered. Jesus has already won the battle against evil; he has paid the debt for sin and defeated death itself. All of it was predetermined, there is no need for us to concern ourselves with the outcome of the war because we know in the end - Jesus Wins!

So, the elder is explaining to John he does not need to weep because Jesus is the one who is capable of opening the scroll and it is seven seals and in the next few lines we learn of the reasons he is capable and begin to understand the importance of both his death for our sins and his resurrection for our eternal life.

Revelation 5:6–7

⁶ And between the throne and the four living creatures and among the elders I saw a Lamb standing, as though it had been slain, with seven horns and with seven eyes, which are the seven spirits of God sent out into all the earth. ⁷ And he went and took the scroll from the right hand of him who was seated on the throne.

The image of Jesus now changes to that of the lamb, the sacrificial lamb of the Passover which had been slain yet was here standing with them. Upon its head were seven horns, and it had seven eyes. Here again we see the importance of the number seven being played out in scripture, representing fullness, perfection, and completion. Here it speaks directly to the seven churches which appear earlier in Revelation, as well as the perfection of the lamb as a sacrifice. But it also alludes to the Old Testament in its symbolism. The horn is a common symbol of power in the Old Testament and appears first in Deuteronomy and then in many of the psalms. The seven eyes speak to God's perfect vision and his omniscience, his ability to know what is going on everywhere at once. This sacrificed and risen lamb of God is the only one who is capable of opening the scroll which contains the will of God. The One who understands fully and has been part of God's divine providence since the beginning in the book of Genesis, the One who is completely aware of each of the churches mentioned in the book of revelation and the Holy Catholic Church throughout all time, the One that knows everyone of the prophecies and how they will occur, the One who shares in His perfection with God.

This is where the beauty of Christs death upon the cross and his resurrection should be recognized by all of us, if he had not been slain, if he had not died and risen there would be no one capable of opening this scroll, no one who could open the will of God and ensure that it is carried out upon the Earth. This is why we must learn to rejoice more through the seasons of Lent and Easter. Jesus's death upon the cross was the providence of God, it was all part of His plan to pay the debt of out sins and reconcile us with him in his coming Kingdom.

Revelation 5:8-10

⁸ And when he had taken the scroll, the four living creatures and the twenty-four elders fell down before the Lamb, each holding a harp, and golden bowls full of incense, which are the prayers of the saints. ⁹ And they sang a new song, saying,

"Worthy are you to take the scroll and to open its seals, for you were slain, and by your blood you ransomed people for God from every tribe and language and people and nation, ¹⁰ and you have made them a kingdom and priests to our God, and they shall reign on the earth."

Those who were fortunate enough to be present when the lamb takes the scroll begin to worship him. 'You are worthy to take the scroll and open it seals, because you were slain" and this is the part I we all need to pay particular attention to 'and with your blood you purchased for God, persons from every tribe and language and people and nation. You have made them to be a kingdom and priests to serve our God and they will reign on earth.'

It was through his death on the crucifix, his blood that was shed, that Jesus was ordained to be capable of opening the scroll of God's will and paying the cost of our salvation. It is for these two reasons that all those who are present in Heaven worship Jesus, the lamb of God.

They sang a new song, a song designated specifically to celebrate this event. To celebrate that God's people would be saved, that they would reign over the earth in their kingdom and God's will upon the earth would be realized because the lamb was capable of opening the will of God.

However, it does not end there. It is not enough that just those within the heavens worship the lamb who was slain.

Revelation 5:11

Then I looked, and I heard around the throne and the living creatures and the elders the voice of many angels, numbering myriads of myriads and thousands of thousands,

Every being in heaven joins in on the celebration. Myriads of myriads, thousands upon thousands. In Greek when large numbers are multiplied like this it means they are referring to a number that is beyond comprehension or understanding. And it is every single member of this uncountable hoard that join their voices together in praise surrounding those who were already encircling Jesus Christ, the lamb which had been slain and had risen.

Revelation 5:12

12 saying with a loud voice,

"Worthy is the Lamb who was slain, to receive power and wealth and wisdom and might and honor and glory and blessing!"

Here we see the lamb worshiped as worship is meant to be. He receives the sevenfold adulation; God is worshiped for power, wealth, wisdom, and might; all attributes of great kings and for Honor and glory and blessing the attributes of a great spiritual leader; those of a priest. The multitudes of angels are gathered here in heaven around the throne of God and worshipping Jesus as both King and Priest. The Lion and the Lamb of God.

Revelation 5:13

¹³ And I heard every creature in heaven and on earth and under the earth and in the sea, and all that is in them, saying,

"To him who sits on the throne and to the Lamb be blessing and honor and glory and might forever and ever!"

Finally, we have all of creation joining in to praise and worship. All of creation understands the glory of what is about to occur. The Lord our God is about to have his will proclaimed for all to hear, we will all be made aware of God's plans for humanity. So, all of creation will gather together to rejoice in the lamb who was slain for it is his death, his blood, his sacrifice and his resurrection from the grave, his victory over death, which enabled Him to be the one and only being who is capable of opening the scroll and being witness to God's will.

This clearly shows us that all of creation is willed by God, made by God, ruled by God, and is meant to be praising and worshipping its God. The redundancy of John describing that' every creature in heaven, and on earth and under the earth and in the sea, and all that is in them,' shows us that every living thing, every living thing owes its worship to God.

And what do all of these living things do? Once again, they join voices in singing praise with the multitudes already gathered. They sing; 'be blessing and honor and glory and might forever and ever'

All of creation offers its praise to him who sits upon the throne and to the lamb. Equally, not as two separate entities but as one. Praising them with honor, glory, and might forever and ever.

Revelation 5:14

¹⁴ And the four living creatures said, "Amen!" and the elders fell down and worshiped.

This is the importance of the lamb who was slain and resurrected. The sacrifice of the Son of God and his blood that has paid the debt of our sin and his resurrection which enabled God's will to be open and proclaimed in the heavens.

The worship that is offered here in the book of Revelation to Jesus and to God the father is equal and is meant to be so. The four living creatures offer an 'Amen'. Declaring, 'So be it" further clarifying that all of creation is meant to worship and praise our God, we are meant to offer honor, and glory and might to our God for all eternity. The twenty-four elders once again fall down in worship as an example for all of creation. Worship of our God, worship of Jesus is meant to be a central part of our lives.

This is why the death of the Jesus was so much more than a sacrifice for our sins. His death and resurrection were critical in him becoming the Messiah of the Old Testament, The Lion of the tribe of Judah, the warrior who would lead God's people into becoming a great nation and at the same time; his being the lamb of God, the only one in all of creation being able to open the scrolls seven seals and proclaim God's will for all of the heavens to hear.

This book of Revelation shows us that Jesus is our God, and we are to worship him just as he was worshiped in the heavens. He is the slain lamb standing by the throne of God and meant to be adored, meant to be worshiped as both our King and our Priest. The one whom we owe our salvation to not just because of the atonement for our sins but for his ability to proclaim God's will and ensure that all of the prophecies will take place as they are prescribed in the book of Revelation. That evil will be defeated, and we will have eternal life in God's Kingdom.

This is the beauty of the book of Revelation. In all of its chaos contained within its visions and prophecies there is one truth that is clear; God is the only true path to eternal life. God is the only being worthy of our praise, God deserves our adoration and worship for all of eternity and it is our duty to do so.

So, my brothers and sisters, it is my hope and prayer that you see Jesus, our lord and Savior, did so much for each of us on that day he died upon the crucifix. His death was more than just atonement for our sinful nature, more that symbolic fulfillment of the prophecies of the Old Testament. Through his resurrection it was the continuation of God's will being proclaimed and God's providence being enacted here upon earth and throughout all of creation. And for this reason, we are called to worship the Son as we do the Father and the Holy Spirit; as One God for all of eternity.
