10 After this the Lord appointed seventy-two others and sent them on ahead of him, two by two, into every town and place where he himself was about to go. ² And he said to them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few. Therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest. ³ Go your way; behold, I am sending you out as lambs in the midst of wolves. ⁴ Carry no moneybag, no knapsack, no sandals, and greet no one on the road. ⁵ Whatever house you enter, first say, 'Peace be to this house!' ⁶ And if a son of peace is there, your peace will rest upon him. But if not, it will return to you. ⁷ And remain in the same house, eating and drinking what they provide, for the laborer deserves his wages. Do not go from house to house. ⁸ Whenever you enter a town and they receive you, eat what is set before you. ⁹ Heal the sick in it and say to them, 'The kingdom of God has come near to you.' ¹⁰ But whenever you enter a town and they do not receive you, go into its streets and say, ¹¹ 'Even the dust of your town that clings to our feet we wipe off against you. Nevertheless know this, that the kingdom of God has come near.' ¹² I tell you, it will be more bearable on that day for Sodom than for that town.

Woe to Unrepentant Cities

¹³ "Woe to you, Chorazin! Woe to you, Bethsaida! For if the mighty works done in you had been done in Tyre and Sidon, they would have repented long ago, sitting in sackcloth and ashes. ¹⁴ But it will be more bearable in the judgment for Tyre and Sidon than for you. ¹⁵ And you, Capernaum, will you be exalted to heaven? You shall be brought down to Hades.

Sermon

Last week we spoke of how we all have to choose the path in life we want to walk upon, the path of this world or the path of discipleship. Jesus explained to those people who all claimed that they wanted to be his followers the actual cost of being a disciple. The reality of thew Christian faith is that there are many people who come to churches all around the world regularly, but they are more like a religious church goer than a Christian, they never really begin to walk along the path to discipleship because they believe the cost of the loss of possessions, power, fame, friends, and all their other worldly possessions is too much to pay.

This is perhaps why when Jesus appoints the seventy-two to send ahead, he tells them that 'The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few.' True Christians are always in the minority in the world. In Jesus's day, even while he walked among the people preforming miracles and preaching his Father's word many refused to recognize him as the Messiah. Jesus is sending them his people out into a world that he knows they are heavily outnumbered in and for that reason he sends them out two by two so that they may find support, encouragement and hope with one another in a world that is highly likely going to reject them and the message that they are sharing.

This is the reason for the church and for fellowship between brothers and sister in Christ throughout all of Christian history, as we spoke about last week, those who walk the road to discipleship are going to be persecuted and suffer because the teachings of the scripture often do not align with the ways of this world. So, we need our brothers and sisters in Christ who walk the road with us to offer us the same support that the seventy-two had when they were sent out in pairs, support, encouragement, and hope.

But the fellowship of brothers and sisters was not the only thing that the seventy-two were sent out into the world with, they were also told of the importance of prayer. Jesus told these men he was sending out that they were to pray in their difficulties. They were to pray to the lord of the harvest; to God, that there would be more workers sent out and that the workers would find their ways through difficulties.

Then Jesus turns to the seventy-two and sends them as the workers into the fields to harvest.

Jesus told them to pray for workers and then immediately turned them into those workers. Then just as he did for the ones who wanted to be disciples, Jesus takes some time to explain the difficulties that they will face as workers for the Lord.

Luke 10:3

³ Go your way; behold, I am sending you out as lambs in the midst of wolves.

Jesus sends his believers out into a world where we are to be humble and meek, not exerting power, but displaying grace, mercy, and compassion. Yet this is not the ways of the world. They display these characteristics, but usually only as a way to further their own agendas, in fact they are more often the wolf in sheep's clothing. The world is filled with wolves, people who are looking for ways to take advantage of others, to get ahead financially, socially or in a position of power. Yet these are the fields in which Christians are sent to seek the harvest of the Lord.

Jesus tells us that even though the mission field is filled with wolves that the harvest there is great, and as Christians we are called to step out into it everyday in our lives as we walk upon the path to discipleship. We know this because he does not wait for the perfect time to send out the seventy-two, he sends them into the fields, among the wolves, and he tells them 'Carry no moneybag, no knapsack, no sandals, and greet no one on the road.' The task is so vital that he tells them, do not worry about getting ready and bringing the things you need, do not even stop to greet, and talk with people along the road. Go and preach of the coming of Christ to the people I send you too.

Just as it was in Jesus's time the harvest is still great in the world today. The issue of Jesus's day and the issue still today is not the harvest but the workers. Every farm hand knows that when its harvest time you get all the help you can, many hands make light work when it comes time to pull in the crops. Yet, when it comes to bringing people into the kingdom of heaven it seems like there just are not enough hands, like we looked at last week, many people can find a reason to not be involved in the harvest.

Yet, those who have chosen to become disciples of Christ must go out into the fields, they are called to participate in the harvest, to seek those in the darkness by shining the light of Jesus out into this world. The world we live in keeps getting darker and darker, and Christians need to take heart in the fact that the light of the true church will never go out because Jesus Christ sustains it. It will shine brightly until the second coming and while we serve Him here on earth, we are called to be the reflection of that light to the people that are caught in the dark but seek the light of Christ.

All disciples of Christ as they walk upon the path of their own faith are called to be workers in the field, participating in the harvest, sharing the knowledge of the coming of Jesus with the people they are sent to by Jesus.

This is a daunting task for many, but Jesus does not send them out, or us out, unprepared. In fact, he gives some very basic instructions to the seventy-two about how they are to share the word of His coming.

Luke 10:6

⁵ Whatever house you enter, first say, 'Peace be to this house!' ⁶ And if a son of peace is there, your peace will rest upon him. But if not, it will return to you.

Jesus tells them to bring their peace to the houses they enter and if they are not welcomed to not be concerned about it because their peace will return to them. When we share the truth of Christ it is not our job to convince them to become Christian, we just need to share the truth, and if they are not willing to listen, our peace will return to us, and we can carry on. If they are willing to listen then Jesus tells us that we should eat what is set before us, simply put enjoy fellowship. He also tells us to heal the sick, while there are few of us here that may be nurses, active or retired, there are not many of us that would be confident in healing the sick, however, this is not speaking strictly of the physically sick. What about the spiritually sick? I am confident that any disciple of Christ, regardless of how far along their path to discipleship they are capable of sharing the basics of the Gospel with the spiritually sick. Telling people about the grace, love and mercy of Christ and the fact that he did for their sins is something all Christians are capable of doing. Sharing that truth's about Jesus as lord and savior and the truth of the coming of the Kingdom of God is something we can all do with people, and when they do not want to receive our sharing of Gods truth it is ok for us to walk away, and when they want to learn more, we should be inviting them into fellowship.

In fact, Jesus goes a little further in speaking about how we should treat the ones who reject his truths.

Luke 10:10-12

¹⁰ But whenever you enter a town and they do not receive you, go into its streets and say, ¹¹ 'Even the dust of your town that clings to our feet we wipe off against you. Nevertheless know this, that the kingdom of God has come near.' ¹² I tell you, it will be more bearable on that day for Sodom than for that town.

Jesus tells the seventy-two that when a town or house rejects his peace that they are to wipe the dust of the town from their feet. Notice that he still instructs them to share the truth of the gospel and his coming, but then to also give the warning that when he returns, they will be judged, and that judgement will be worse than the judgement that was cast upon Sodom.

Jesus does not stop there with his judgements. He speaks of the towns of Chorazin, Bethsaida and Capernaum. Three of the cities in which his ministry had been active. Bethsaida was where he had fed the five thousand and Capernaum was called the Lord's own city in the gospel of Matthew, it was the city in which he performed many different miracles including the healing of the paralyzed man. Jesus knew the people of these cities, he knew their hearts and he knew that they rejected him, even though he had shown them over and over that he was God. So, he tells them plainly, if the pagan cities had seen his miracles they would have believed, and for that reason they are judged like the cities of Tyre and Sidon cities who were fiercely rebuked by the Lord in the Old Testament.

Capernaum however is further singled out. Capernaum was a special city, one in which Jesus was often and one ion which there was a large and beautiful synagogue to the Lord. This was a city that prided themselves on being a city of God. One that believed that they were the true followers. Yet Jesus tells them that they will not be exalted to heaven but instead brought down into hades, because of their lack of true faith. Jesus is yet again reminding Christians that it is only the true followers of Christ that are adopted into Gods family, on judgement day there will be many people who call themselves Christian, but follow their own concept of who Christ is and not the Christ of the bible to whom Jesus will say

Matthew 7:23

²³ And then will I declare to them, 'I never knew you; depart from me, you workers of lawlessness.'

It is clear in the Bible that there is a difference between the way that the seventy-two interact with those who receive the truth of the coming of Christ and those who reject that truth. Afterall, it is not the messengers faulty that the message was rejected. Verse 16 tells us that those who listened to the seventy-two have heard the word of God, and those who have rejected his word have rejected both the Son and the Father.

When the seventy-two return they are energized, they are filled with joy because they saw the work of the spirit in people, they were able to heal the spiritually sick, they were able to cast out demons that plagued people, they were able to share the coming of the King of Kings and even though it was rejected by many, it was received also by many. This should encourage us, we know that God's word will be rejected, but we also be heard by those who are seeking salvation. When we are rejected in sharing God's word it is not us they are rejecting, it is God and that should not stop us from sharing the truth of God's salvation with others, and when we share the truth of the Gospel with others and they accept it is not our persuasiveness that they have accepted it is Christ and it is through the work of the Holy Spirit that they have come to acknowledge God as Lord and Saviour and we should rejoice because we have found a new brother or sister in Christ and brought Glory to the name of God.

The last line of today's scripture drives this point home. We do not rejoice in the work that Christ has us doing here on earth, instead we rejoice in the fact that our name is recorded in the Book of Life, we are recorded as being citizens of the eternal Kingdom of heaven.

As disciples of Christ, we should wake up everyday rejoicing in the fact that our names are in his book. That we have been called to be his workers in this realm and given the opportunity to share his coming with others who may not have learned of who he really is yet in their lives. We should rejoice in the fact that we have faith in Christ. God has

given us his salvation by his grace, something we could never earn but have been freely given by him because of his love for us.

This is what should motivate us to share the Word of God with others. God has provided us with all we need to be his messengers, we do not need special, clothing, special books, special training, he has given us everything we need, his grace and faith in him. To share the truth of who Jesus is all we need is His word.

We do not have to search people out who need God in the world around us today. There are many people who are coming out of this pandemic, broken, lost, and suffering in so many ways. We do not have to look very far in our circle of friends, family, and colleagues to find people who are lost, who are filled with sadness and despair, who are slaves to sin as they try to find some way to make themselves feel whole, to find some reason for their existence. These are our fields, and we should be joyful workers in those fields bringing the truth of Christ to them. Bringing them the peace of mind that can only come through a relationship with God, which can only come through accepting him as Lord and Saviour, repenting of our sin and trying to live according to His Word. It is with joy that we should find new brothers and sisters in Christ and with joy that we sow the seeds of faith among even those who reject the word of God.
