<u>Luke 8:26-39</u>

Jesus Heals a Man with a Demon

²⁶ Then they sailed to the country of the Gerasenes, which is opposite Galilee. ²⁷ When Jesus had stepped out on land, there met him a man from the city who had demons. For a long time he had worn no clothes, and he had not lived in a house but among the tombs. ²⁸ When he saw Jesus, he cried out and fell down before him and said with a loud voice, "What have you to do with me, Jesus, Son of the Most High God? I beg you, do not torment me." ²⁹ For he had commanded the unclean spirit to come out of the man. (For many a time it had seized him. He was kept under guard and bound with chains and shackles, but he would break the bonds and be driven by the demon into the desert.) ³⁰ Jesus then asked him, "What is your name?" And he said, "Legion," for many demons had entered him. ³¹ And they begged him not to command them to depart into the abyss. ³² Now a large herd of pigs was feeding there on the hillside, and they begged him to let them enter these. So he gave them permission. ³³ Then the demons came out of the man and entered the pigs, and the herd rushed down the steep bank into the lake and drowned.

³⁴ When the herdsmen saw what had happened, they fled and told it in the city and in the country. ³⁵ Then people went out to see what had happened, and they came to

Jesus and found the man from whom the demons had gone, sitting at the feet of Jesus, clothed and in his right mind, and they were afraid. ³⁶ And those who had seen it told them how the demon-possessed man had been healed. ³⁷ Then all the people of the surrounding country of the Gerasenes asked him to depart from them, for they were seized with great fear. So he got into the boat and returned. ³⁸ The man from whom the demons had gone begged that he might be with him, but Jesus sent him away, saying, ³⁹ "Return to your home, and declare how much God has done for you." And he went away, proclaiming throughout the whole city how much Jesus had done for him.

Children's Lesson

<u>Sermon</u>

Welcome back to the book of Luke. Today we will be looking at a piece of scripture which deals with the world we live in today, just as much as it did the world in which Jesus and the disciples lived.

We are told at the beginning of this scripture that Jesus and the disciples got into a boat and crossed over from Galilee to Gerasene. Gerasene would not be a place that you would find many Jews, first it is a land of gentiles, secondly, they had a herd of pigs wandering the shoreline, pigs were dirty and considered unholy just their presence would cause the Jews discomfort. On top of this is the fact they land in a graveyard, Jews were strictly forbidden to interact with the dead, it made them ritually unclean and unable to enter into the presence of others and God.

Then, to make it even more clear this was not a place where you would find any faithful Jew the first person that they encounter in this land is a demon possessed man. Not just demon possessed but demon infested, a man with a legion of demons within him. A Roman legion could be anywhere between One thousand and forty men and six thousand men. This is the legion of demons that meets Jesus as he enters into the land of the gentiles.

The possessed man had an unnatural strength, he had been bound and broken free from the people of the region many times. He was at the mercy of the demons who would force him out into the desert or into the graveyard where he would strip down and wander among the tombs. The man was tormented by the legion of demons that were living within him.

What is interesting is not just how the man is healed but the story of the man himself.

The people of Gerasene simply tolerated the man, his lifestyle, and his actions. Of course, they knew that something as wrong with him, however, they do not seem to be overly concerned

about helping him. They knew he needed help, after all he is hurting himself and running around naked in a graveyard, not the signs of sanity in any culture.

The broken chains are evidence that at some point they had tried to help him, however, either because they felt the could not, or they just gave up trying this demon possessed man was now tolerated, as long as he stayed out in the graveyard, his nakedness and self-harm did not matter to the people of the region. They had reached a place of tolerance and complacency, as long as he did not cost them anything, time, or money, they were fine with him living his life.

The only times they tried to stop him was when he acted out in a way that they could not tolerate, and even then, they did so halfheartedly, if they had really wanted to help him, they would have or they would have condemned him to die for his crimes.

It is this man, left to his own devices, his own sinful nature, that recognizes Jesus for who he is 'Jesus, Son of the Most High God.' Not only does he recognize him, but he begs Jesus not to torment him. Why would he do such a thing? Why would a man who is possessed by demons beg not to be relieved of his demons?

The man had fallen prey to his demons, they fully possessed him and then they continued to grow in him, adding to their number over and over, his sins multiplying until finally the legion existed within his being. No one had tried to help him when he was first possessed, they had simply let him be, tolerated his demonic behaviors and before they could do anything he is infested with demonic power.

The people of Gerasene tolerated him. This is the world we are living in now, we have become Gerasene, a world where we tolerate demonic behavior, a place where we accept sinful behavior, as long as it does not cost us too much time or too much money. As a society we are perfectly fine letting people be whoever they want to be, which would be fine if there was no devil and there was no hell. However, we know the truth that there is a God, there is a hell and when we let people become fully given into a life of sin that they are lost for all of eternity and as Christians we cannot do that, in the same way that Jesus could not just let this demon possessed man suffer for all of eternity.

That is why Jesus commands the demons out of the man and into the herd of pigs. He gives the man the freedom from his sinful nature, even though the demons try to stop him. He does this because he loves the man, and He loves the people of the region of Gerasene. Jesus believes not in tolerance but in transformation. He transforms the man from a demon possessed man into a disciple of God.

Jesus does what all of the people of the region had been unwilling to do, he confronts the man. He commands that the demons that have possessed him release him and in a matter of minutes the power of the Lord is displayed as the man is set free of all of the demons and sinfulness that had possessed him. By tolerating the man's demons, the people of Gerasene had allowed more and more demons to come into this man as they took complete control of his being. By living with the live and let live attitude they had in fact condemned this man to suffering and eternal damnation. Jesus does just the opposite, he frees the man through his love, grace, and mercy.

This is the same challenge we have in the modern world; some people believe that we should just let people enjoy all of the pleasure of life that they want. We should let everyone see and practice anything that they wish, as long as it does not cost us too much time or money. After all we all have the gift of free will and freedom of choice. We should simply let people do what they wish because they know what is best for them.

This would be fine if we lived in a world without evil, without Satan and his influence. However, that is not the world we live in, instead we are called to be like Jesus, going out into the land and sharing the Good News of his Grace, mercy, love, and salvation both in our words and in our actions.

Satan, demons, and sin want to control every aspect of our lives. They seek to overwhelm us and keep us from enjoying the peace of heart, mind, and soul we find in God.

A preacher once said, 'Sin will take you father than you want to go, keep you longer than you want to stay and cost you more than you want to pay.'

As Thomas Watson said, 'Sin has the devil for its father, shame for its companion and death for its wages'

Jesus loved the possessed man in the graveyard, he loved the people of Gerasene. He wanted to bring salvation to all of them. Yet see how they reacted, when the people of the land heard that Jesus had healed this man, they come and see the man at the feet of Jesus, sane, clothed and learning, and instead of celebrating at his healing, instead of being thankful and grateful for the return of their countryman, they are fearful and ask Jesus to leave them.

This is another reality, there are people in this world who just do not wish to be saved. They can see someone brought out of the darkness of sin and into the light of God and they fear that, they are comfortable in their sins and do not wish to be changed. They want to continue in their pleasures seeking out the things of this world that grant them a fleeting escape.

Jesus came to bring them salvation from sin, from the false gods they had been serving, from Satan and his demons. But the people were content where they were, they did not want to change. They wanted to carry on in their world of tolerance, because if they tolerated someone else's sin, someone else would tolerate their sin. This is the world that Satan seeks to create, a world where he can create people enslaved to all forms of sins and addictions, a world win which he can create disparity, poverty, and division. Satan is at work doing his best to create division, to create marital discord, to cause fights in family and between friends. He is hard at work trying to find ways to legalize forms of human trafficking, promote racism, and violence and death. He wants to tempt people to steal, to lie, to commit sexually immoral acts and though all of this destroy their own lives and the lives of those who love them.

And while he is at work doing this, the majority of the world, including many churches have turned a blind eye in his direction. Happy to continue on in the status quo, not wanting to get involved with the suffering that they see going on in the world around them. They turn inward, focusing on the things in their direct world, at times even setting aside worship, bible study and fellowship, not realizing the danger of what they are doing.

Then before they know what happens they have become like one of the churches described in the book of Revelation. Like the church of Ephesus, a church that has lost its passion for Jesus, for His Word, for His worship and His witnessing. Like the Church of Thyatira who slowly allowed evil to overtake it. The church of Laodicea who had become lukewarm towards its God. Or even like the church of Sardis who thought that they were alive in their faith, but Jesus said were dead in their faith.

We should not be tolerant of the evils of this world, so how are we called to resist them?

We are called to resist the same way in which Jesus does here, by bringing a message of the mercy, the grace, and the love of Jesus Christ to those who are lost. We defeat it by bringing the truth of the Word of God to anyone who will listen, through our thoughts, our actions, and our words. We defeat Satan by staying true to God even when the world decides to kick us out the same way the Gerasene's asked Jesus to leave their lands.

Jesus left the possessed man in the land of Gerasene, he was a lone light in a world of darkness that acted as a missionary of God and the Good News of Salvation in Christ. This is the same world that many of us may live and work in, a world where we feel as if we are the lone Christian. As we leave today know that we are called to be like this man who Jesus Saved from his sins, we are all called to be the ones who go proclaiming through the land in words and deed about how much Jesus Christ has done for us.
