Sermon

The scripture we are studying today is called 'The Benedictus,' it is the song of prophecy sung by Zechariah, the father of John the Baptist. In it he saw what God was doing in the world was not random events in world history, but instead a divine plan which he was carrying out from the very beginning of time. Each event was not something new but a continuation of His plan for His people. God's plan was always to create a people with whom he could share Himself. We saw this in the story of creation in Adam and Eve, and we see it again in the story of God's relationship with Abraham. God comes to Abraham and does something that becomes the norm for God in establishing a relationship with someone, he establishes a covenant.

We often think of a covenant like a legal contract. A joint mutual agreement between two parties, however, the truth is that a covenant has a much deeper meaning than that of a modern-day contract. A covenant was a binding commitment between both parties making them both committed to each other and the terms of the covenant under the penalty of death. This binding covenant could not be broken, and it was often based upon the honorable character of the parties involved.

God covenant with his people is clearly defined in Jeremiah 31:33-34

<u>Jeremiah 31:33-34</u>

³³ For this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, declares the LORD: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts. And I will be their God, and they shall be my people. ³⁴ And no longer shall each one teach his neighbor and each his brother, saying, 'Know the LORD,' for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, declares the LORD. For I will forgive their iniquity, and I will remember their sin no more."

God promises that he will fulfill all of his covenant with the people of Israel and bring the Messiah into the world to redeem His people. The Messiah would bring God's people back to him and give them new hearts.

As we begin into the Christmas season, we should recognize that Christmas was the fulfillment of God's covenant with his people. He was coming to redeem his chosen people, to raise up the cup of salvation and fulfill his Holy covenant that he had made with Abraham.

Christmas teaches us that God's covenant with us is relational. We often think about God as God and us and us, two separated beings, with no real connection or relationship. However, God wants to be in a relationship with each of us, He wants to be with His people, so much so

that He was willing to send His son to earth to redeem each of us into our adoption as His children.

Psalm 103:13-14

As a father shows compassion to his children,
 so the LORD shows compassion to those who fear him.
 For he knows our frame;
 he remembers that we are dust.

God wants to be in relationship with us and as we grow closer to him, we want to be in relationship with him and with our brothers and sisters in Christ. Truthfully, many of us know that if our relationship with God was purely dependent upon us, we would never get to know him, because like Adam and Eve we often tend to run and hide from God when we sin against Him. We know we sin; we know we fail at keeping the things that we commit too, but God continuously calls out to us to 'come to Him' and be in relationship with him. Throughout the Old Testament we see God call out to His people over and over, every time they stray, because he is our God and He wants us to be His people.

God needs to do this because over and over God's people reject him and want to live their lives independent of a relationship with Him. As Jesus was entering into the city of Jerusalem he said.

Matthew 23:37

³⁷ "O Jerusalem, Jerusalem, the city that kills the prophets and stones those who are sent to it! How often would I have gathered your children together as a hen gathers her brood under her wings, and you were not willing!

Remember this is one of the aspects that sets apart God, from all of the other false gods that were worshiped at that time. The gods of the other peoples delighted in torments and dominating their people. They were willing to cause pain and suffering to their people on a whim, to cast them away unless the people were willing to sacrifice everything, they had to appease their false god. Yet, here is the God of Abraham, not demanding appeasement, but instead in constant pursuit of his people calling them back to the covenantal promise he had made with the patriarchs.

Our God is not content to just leave us in this world. He is constantly seeking us out. God did not just create the world and walk away, waiting to see what happens like a scientist in the lab, instead he is constantly interacting with his people, seeking a personal and direct relationship with each and everyone of His children.

This is what God is seeking for each and every one of you. He does not want a superficial connection. He does not want people who simply come to church on Sunday out of routine. He does not want people who teach Sunday school, sing in the choir, volunteer for different groups or anything else in the church because they feel a duty to do so. He wants people who have a

personal connection with Him and because of that personal connection with God they want to share their lives with others, helping them to find their own personal connection with God. When you have a personal relationship with God your whole viewpoint about the church begins to shift from something you feel you need to do, to something you look forward to being part of everyday. If you are missing that personal relationship with God, you are missing a fundamental part of the covenant that God has with his people.

Which brings us to another important thing for us to understand about the covenant we have with God that we can see through Christmas: God is faithful. This is something we all repeat easily, 'Trust in God,' we think we understand it and believe in it, until we actually need to, 'trust in God.' When it actually becomes something, we have to do, we often try to figure out everything on our own, look for simple ways out, seek the simplest solution for ourselves and we forget that we can just forget it all and hand it all over to God and trust in him to do what he intends when he intends to do it. We need to understand that even when we fail to trust in God, even when we are stressed, panicked, figuring out thigs on our own, trying to escape a difficult decision, God is still faithfully at work in our lives. 2 Timothy 2:11-13

2 Timothy 2:11-13

¹¹ The saying is trustworthy, for:
If we have died with him, we will also live with him;
¹² if we endure, we will also reign with him;
if we deny him, he also will deny us;
¹³ if we are faithless, he remains faithful—
for he cannot deny himself.

We see this in the Abrahamic covenant itself. Have you ever carefully read the account in Genesis 15 about the covenant agreement between Abram and God. It begins by following the common covenantal practices of the time. They gather animals, a goat, a heifer, a ram, a dove, and a pigeon, and cut them in half from head to tail. These haves are separated and spread out so that there is a path to walk between the two halves of each animal. In a covenantal agreement each party would walk the full length of the path between the two animals, one after the other, essentially agreeing that if either party were to break the covenant that they would be split in two the same way as the animals were. The animals' pieces were then gathered up and prepared in a covenant meal that they shared sealing the covenant as they made it part of themselves through the meal. Yet in Genesis 15, after the animals were gathered and split in two and laid out in the covenantal path, a deep sleep came over Abram, and it was God alone that walked the path of the covenant. It seems like God knew that Abraham and his descendants would never be able to keep the agreement of the covenant, he knew that they would constantly wander from God and give in to sin, so he created a way to have the covenant placed only upon himself. In Genesis 15:17 God walks the path alone in the form of a smoking pot and blazing torch, a unilateral covenant, in which even when Abraham and his descendants violated the terms of the covenant by failing to obey God, God would always uphold his side of the covenant. The book of psalms tells us this.

Psalm 105:8-10

8 He remembers his covenant forever,
the word that he commanded, for a thousand generations,
9 the covenant that he made with Abraham,
his sworn promise to Isaac,
10 which he confirmed to Jacob as a statute,
to Israel as an everlasting covenant,

Our relationship with God is based upon this covenantal relationship. We are reminded of our covenant with God every time that we participate in communion. It is the body of the broken Lamb of God, that we eat and his blood that was shed that we drink in communion. This should remind us that God has bound himself to us through his covenantal love. We have a faithful God, one who will never abandon us, and seeks to remind us of this constantly. Scripture also reminds us that we can always have hope because God is always faithful in his covenantal promises.

Hebrews 10:23

²³ Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who promised is faithful.

This hope that we have in Christ is one of the greatest blessings we can receive. This constant reminder of God's faithfulness, even when we cannot remain faithful is a blessing that we can turn to at even the most difficult points in our lives. Hope is vital in this world. Perhaps this is most clearly defined in what is known as the rule of threes in most survival training courses, 'You can survive 3 weeks without food; 3 days without water; 3 hours without shelter; 3 minutes without air, but not three seconds without hope.' Christians are constantly reminded of the hope that they have because of Communion, however, it is made clear to the whole world that they have hope at the time of Christmas, a time where we remember that we can survive difficulties in our lives with Gods help, but we ultimately will receive the ultimate reward because we have an almighty God who was willing to send his Son to be sacrificed upon the cross to pay the debt of our sins and by doing so reconcile all who believe in him to the covenantal relationship and adoption into his Kingdom.

The third thing that we need to be aware of is that God is always at work in the world. Zechariah knew this in his prophecy. He knew that God had been at work in the world since its very creation. There are many people in the world who believe that the world is cyclical, this is even an argument that is presented in the secular world, the saying that 'history repeats itself, because nobody listens.' Implies that the world is just constantly revolving, kind of like the movie Groundhog Day, ceaselessly repeating itself without purpose or reason. They believe we will just keep repeating the process until we get something right and then move on to the next challenge. We see this symbolized in eastern religions quite often as the snake or dragon that eats its own tail. The endless cycle of futility, never changing and never ending.

Yet we all know that this is not how the world works, their beliefs, faiths, and religions are based on pessimism and despair, a sense that they are the only ones who know reality. They do not recognize the changes that happen, they do not see the miracles, because they do not want to see them. They cannot have the hope of the world changing from the vicious cycle that they believe it is in.

However, Christians know that even if we cannot feel, see, or understand the changes that are taking place in the world around us that God is active, God is changing things in ways that we may never know. God is working out his plans in this world according to his schedule. The preacher of Ecclesiastes said this beautifully,

Ecclesiastes 3:11-15

⁹ What gain has the worker from his toil? ¹⁰ I have seen the business that God has given to the children of man to be busy with. ¹¹ He has made everything beautiful in its time. Also, he has put eternity into man's heart, yet so that he cannot find out what God has done from the beginning to the end. ¹² I perceived that there is nothing better for them than to be joyful and to do good as long as they live; ¹³ also that everyone should eat and drink and take pleasure in all his toil—this is God's gift to man.

¹⁴I perceived that whatever God does endures forever; nothing can be added to it, nor anything taken from it. God has done it, so that people fear before him. ¹⁵That which is, already has been; that which is to be, already has been; and God seeks what has been driven away.

God is at work. God is working out his ultimate plan for mankind that we will see come to fruition in the events of the Book of Revelation. There is a meaning to our lives, we all have an eternal life, which we hope to spend with our God in the eternal city of New Jerusalem. The world is not caught up in a vicious cycle, but instead was created and is sustained and governed over by a loving God, and we are all recipients of that Love. We are called to be his children and Christmas is a reminder of this for everyone in the world, Christians and non-Christians, a reminder for those of faith of the gifts they will receive and a reminder for those who have not come to faith that God has called out to them, even if they chose never to respond.

The Bible is filled with this message, full of Jesus calling people to him in repentance, calling for people to be watchful and attentive in their lives. Jesus did not come to the Israelites in the manner that they wanted or expected, he came as God intended and when he returns it will be the same, he will come at an hour that we do not expect and when the world is not ready. Jesus tells everyone in the scriptures that they are to always be ready because he will come like a thief in the night. The bible teaches us a few things, Jesus is going to return, Jesus is going to judge everyone for all of eternity, and we better be ready for that today, this very minute.

The truth is that many people do not recognize the realities of God in their lives. He is present in the lives of every human on this planet, but they prefer to believe in a God that does what they want when they want, so they create their own false idols. They all seek out a God who they can understand fully, maybe have some control over or at least agrees with all the things

they want in their lives. However, God does not do these things, God breaks out of the mold that mankind keeps trying to lock him within. God will make good on the promise of the covenant that he made with Abraham, and he will use any means necessary to ensure that He brings His people to Him, by any means at his disposal. He will work through the world to open people eyes to the Truth of his Word by any means, even means which we may consider wrong, because he is more concerned about our eternal soul than our mortal happiness.

No one was expecting Jesus in the first century. The thought of the Messiah being born was not in the minds of the Pharisees, the Sadducees, or the Scribes. It was not in the minds of the Jews or the Gentiles, yet the Lord had determined that this was the time according to His plan. The Lord announced his plans for the birth of his son to the virgin Mary, he assured her husband Joseph. On the night of His birth the skies opened, the angels sang, and a baby's cried was heard in a small manger in the town of Bethlehem. To anyone looking at the baby born in the manger from a perfectly worldly view it would seem like an insignificant event, but it was all part of God's plan, and it radically changed the world then and is still doing so today.

To the people of the world, Christmas is a season of songs, good feelings, presents, dinners, and kind words. Christmas is a season filled with warmth and emotion, but to Christians Christmas means much more than these simple things, it means recognizing God's plans in this world. Christmas should give all Christians hope because we see that God was faithful in fulfilling his covenantal promises to mankind, even when His people were not fulfilling them. Christmas means that we believe that the salvation of the world is in the hands of God and it is going according to his plan.

The same is true of Christ's second coming, we do not know when or how it will take place. However, we can be assured that it is coming. God's plan for salvation will take place, even in a world that continues to move further and further away from Him and His teachings. God's divine providence will be known when all of mankind stands before him in Judgement at the white throne.

So, Christmas is a season that should remind all Christians that regardless of what is happening in this world, regardless of the trials, tribulations, or troubles we find ourselves in, we can have hope. We can always have hope because Jesus is king and, we need to be faithful and ready at all times because his plan will be carried out under his sovereignty.

Father of our Lord God and Savior Jesus Christ,
your name is great,

Before you stand thousands of thousands and ten thousand times ten thousand, the hosts of holy angels and archangels.
