Sermon

We have finally entered into the month of December and for many people this signifies the beginning of the Christmas Season. However, most Christians are already aware that we are in the season of Advent and there are some who have been in the Christmas spirit who have the Christmas decorations and preparations started from the minute that Halloween ended. Christmas is seen as one of, if not the biggest holiday of the year. Yet we should remember that Advent means celebrating the Coming of Christ, both his first coming and his future return to earth. At Christmas Christians celebrate with the entire world the first coming of Christ in the town of Bethlehem, while at the same time we anticipate his second coming which is described in the Book of Revelation, the time when he returns as the righteous judge of mankind to sit upon his white throne.

While the rest of the world is concerned with finding or getting the best gift possible for their loved ones. As Christians we should remember that we have already received the only perfect gift from our Lord God, his grace, and through it our faith and salvation. God has provided us with the only gift we ever need, our needs on this world may change, our wants will always be changing, but the gift of being reconciled with God will never change, once we have received his grace our salvation is secured, and be always able to turn to God to find peace in this world.

In the scripture today we see Isaiah describe the wonders of this gift that was given to God's faithful followers, the branch of Jesse, the birth of Christ Jesus.

The book of Isaiah is the story of God proclaiming his judgement upon the people of this world. In chapter 10, Isaiah proclaims of God's judgment upon the lands of Assyria and upon his own nation of Israel. Assyria was a great nation, which would one day destroy the nation of Israel, and for that God would punish them, his wrath would fall upon them, and they would no longer be a great nation. That was God's judgement for them, and he did carry it out, but what of the judgement that he had prophesied against Israel, they too would face God's judgement and be defeated at the hands of their enemies. However, that is not where the prophecies over the land of Israel end.

Here in the very beginning of Chapter 11 God makes a promise to his people. A promise that from the scattered remains of the once great nation of Israel that a Saviour would be born.

Isaiah 11:1

11 There shall come forth a shoot from the stump of Jesse, and a branch from his roots shall bear fruit.

The picture that is painted here is one of very humble beginnings. This is not the picture of a great warrior king, or a high priest. Instead, we are meant to picture a huge forest cut down, one where just the stumps remain, stumps which are not of any real use for the people, except maybe as firewood. This is what remains of the great nation of Israel, no more might cities, or peoples, just stumps, things of not much use anymore. Yet, Isaiah states in his prophecy that it is out of these very stumps of the nation that a shoot will come. A branch that shall come forth and bear fruit for the faithful of the One True Living God, our Lord Jesus Christ.

Isaiah 11:2

² And the Spirit of the LORD shall rest upon him, the Spirit of wisdom and understanding, the Spirit of counsel and might, the Spirit of knowledge and the fear of the LORD.

This shoot that starts off so small in the stumps of the nation, shall have the Spirit of the Lord. Isaiah then describes the Spirit of the Lord using three pairs of words which encompass its fullness. 'The Spirit of wisdom and understanding, the Spirit of counsel and might, the Spirit of knowledge and the fear of the Lord.' The spirit of wisdom and understanding would rest upon the branch of the stump of Jesse, give him the ability to both know and understand God's people as God knew them. The spirit of counsel and power would give Jesus Christ the ability to both know when and how to help the people of God, as well as give him the power to do those things he is called to do in obedience to God. The spirit of knowledge and fear of the Lord would also fall upon the shoot of Jesse, Christ would know of God's plan for his people, as well as all the details of his role within God's eternal plan of salvation.

Isaiah 11:3

³ And his delight shall be in the fear of the LORD. He shall not judge by what his eyes see, or decide disputes by what his ears hear, ⁴ but with righteousness he shall judge the poor, and decide with equity for the meek of the earth; and he shall strike the earth with the rod of his mouth, and with the breath of his lips he shall kill the wicked. ⁵ Righteousness shall be the belt of his waist, and faithfulness the belt of his loins.

This shoot from the stump of Jesse is going to be unlike anyone else who has walked the earth. He is not coming to the world and seeing it the same way as all others, he is not looking at justice the same way as the world looks at justice, not like you or I would look at justice. This Saviour that is coming to the people of God will not judge with the eyes and ears of man, he will not make his decisions based of the will of man. He is not going to consider what man thinks God ought to be, or what man thinks God ought to do, he is going to do what God has instructed, he is going to obey only God's will. The Saviour is not going to be swayed by the opinions of the world, or its religious leaders. Instead, this Saviour who will come from the stump of Jesse will come with the righteousness and justice of God.

We know that Jesus was often at odds with the Pharisees, the Sadducees, and the Scribes. The religious leaders of the time often were criticizing Jesus for not obeying the scriptures the way that they had interpreted them. They told him he could not heal on the Sabbath, he could not eat or associated with the poor, or the sick, or the outcast. The Religious leaders insisted that he needed to adhere to the scriptural law as man had interpreted it. The way they had read it so that it would fit their own lifestyles at the time. Jesus did none of this, he was often at odds with the popular religious leaders of the time, because he adhered to the scriptures. He was obedient to the scripture in all things, unlike man who had wandered away for their own profit or convenience. Jesus came with justice and righteousness, from his humble beginnings, a babe born in a manger in a town that no one cared about, the righteous branch of David would bring the mercy, love, peace, and grace of the One True Living God to the world.

That first Christmas, was foretold of in the Old Testament prophecies. The prophet Micah told us:

Micah 5:2

² But you, O Bethlehem Ephrathah, who are too little to be among the clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for me one who is to be ruler in Israel, whose coming forth is from of old,

from ancient days.

Jesus was born in a town of no significance, and even within that town, there was no room for his parents at the inn, so he was born in a manger. Away from the religious capital of Jerusalem where the people of God worshiped, away from the religious center of God's people. Yet this humble beginning did not make him any less, He was still the Son of God and had come to make peace between man and God, to reconcile them into a relationship of Father and son and daughter.

There is no denying that this infant who was born in the town of Bethlehem is the King and is the Son of God. Jesus is shoot of the stump of Jesse; the branch of David come to bring God's will to His people.

The remainder of the prophecy given here in Chapter 11 of Isaiah describes the peace that only the true Prince of Peace can bring into our lives. We need to remember that while the world knows a physical peace, the bible often speaks instead of a spiritual peace.

The scripture says that the wolf will lie down with the lamb, the leopard with the goat, the calf and the lion and the yearling, all led by a child. We all know that in the real world if a wolf and lamb were to be put in an enclosure together the minute that the wolf gets a little hungry it is all over for the lamb, and the same can be said for the goat and the calf, and perhaps even the child.

We need to ask ourselves how a child can have leadership over wild animals, we know that children have enough trouble keeping domesticated animals in line. What Isaiah is reminding us of is that though there cannot be this kind of physical peace between predator and prey here on earth, even though there can never really be perfect physical peace here on earth, God is able to provide spiritual peace for his People.

The cow will feed with the bear, their young will lie down together, and the lion will eat straw like the ox. This will not be physically happening; a lion is a carnivore and will not suddenly become an herbivore giving up meat for straw. God could make it occur physically if he chose to impose His divine will, but here it is a spiritual statement, God can make this happen in our hearts. People who are prone to violence, like gang members can be lead to live a peaceful life once they accept Jesus Christ and have a true faith.

One that is furthered by the idea of an infant playing near the hole of the cobra, even going so far as to place his hand inside their nest. Everyone knows that you do not play around snakes, if you get too close, put your hand too near, they will strike, and you are going to be bitten and possibly poisoned.

They shall not hurt or destroy in all my holy mountain; for the earth shall be full of the knowledge of the LORD as the waters cover the sea. God's holy people, his followers on

earth, who are part of his temple, his church, his mountain are going to be given peace. They will live in a place where the serpent, Satan and his evils cannot harm the children of God. This tells us that Satan may be able to cause us physical pain and suffering, much in the same manner that he did to Job in the Old Testament, however we can live with the knowledge that God reigns over him, and we can find peace in the knowledge that our eternal salvation is secured by the blood of Christ and the debt he paid to reconcile us to God on the cross.

Isaiah 11:10

¹⁰ In that day the root of Jesse, who shall stand as a signal for the peoples—of him shall the nations inquire, and his resting place shall be glorious.

Isaiah tells us that when Jesus comes the whole world will be changed. Even though he will have a humble beginning, born in a manger in Bethlehem, an event that should have gone unnoticed, Isaiah tells us it will be recognized. God had provided his son not just for the salvation of the people of Israel, but for all of his children of every tribe, nation, language, and people. All of us who were not born of the house of David, who were not part of the covenant of Abraham, are today children of Abraham by our faith.

God sent his son to live and to die upon the cross so that you and I might live forever. We did nothing to deserve this blessing, it comes as a gift of the grace of God. You and I are saved by the work of Jesus Christ upon the cross, because of his mercy, love, and grace and that brings us peace. We are reminded of this as reassured of this every time we have the sacrament of communion. That Jesus Christ paid for our eternal salvation, regardless of what is happening here in this planet, by the sacrifice that he made of his body and his blood, redeeming us to the Father and making us heirs and priests in God's kingdom. This is what the bread and the cup represent, that our Lord gave his very body and blood as a pledge and seal of His forgiveness of our sins.

And that should change our lives. That should change the way we think, the way we speak and the way we act in this world. While everyone else is rushing around trying to make the most of their short time on this planet we can rest assured of our eternal life. Instead of getting caught up in the emotions and stress of the season we can stay focused on the miraculous birth of our Saviour and in the assurance of his return. We can see that the greatest gift the world has ever received is Jesus Christ and the light that he shone into the darkness of this planet. We can become reflections of that light in this season. We can recognize that Jesus bought us with his blood, he redeemed us with God and because of that we can give up living selfishly for our own desires and instead live for others. We can learn to give up those sins of the world we take pleasure in and instead seek to bring the salt and light of Christ in this world, bringing the Prince of Peace into the lives of our neighbors and our enemies.

Advent is a season in which God tries to reach everyone through his grace, the same way he spoke to the nation of Israel through the prophets. This is God's perfect gift to the world. The shoot of Jesse, the Saviour who redeems us and brings us back to God. The one who gives us eternal life, a future filled with hope and peace, regardless of what is happening here, because of what Christ has done for us and the eternal life we have received. This we are called to remember during Advent and to carry in our hearts, that hope and peace, as we await his Second coming.

Let us pray,

Dear God,
protect us and keep us in your grace
that we may be that little flock,
which gladly receives Christ,
singing, "Hosanna! God be praised,"
that we receive him as our King,
and that we may be Christians.
We know why we are called Christians,
namely, after our King Christ,
since we are baptized in his name
and washed in his blood.
Help us remain in him.
Amen.
