Scripture

Matthew 23:1-36

23 Then Jesus said to the crowds and to his disciples, ² "The scribes and the Pharisees sit on Moses' seat, ³ so do and observe whatever they tell you, but not the works they do. For they preach, but do not practice. ⁴ They tie up heavy burdens, hard to bear, and lay them on people's shoulders, but they themselves are not willing to move them with their finger. ⁵ They do all their deeds to be seen by others. For they make their phylacteries broad and their fringes long, ⁶ and they love the place of honor at feasts and the best seats in the synagogues ⁷ and greetings in the marketplaces and being called rabbi by others. ⁸ But you are not to be called rabbi, for you have one teacher, and you are all brothers. ⁹ And call no man your father on earth, for you have one Father, who is in heaven. ¹⁰ Neither be called instructors, for you have one instructor, the Christ. ¹¹ The greatest among you shall be your servant. ¹² Whoever exalts himself will be humbled, and whoever humbles himself will be exalted.

¹³ "But woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you shut the kingdom of heaven in people's faces. For you neither enter yourselves nor allow those who would enter to go in. ¹⁵ Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you travel across sea and land to make a single proselyte, and when he becomes a proselyte, you make him twice as much a child of hell as yourselves.

¹⁶ "Woe to you, blind guides, who say, 'If anyone swears by the temple, it is nothing, but if anyone swears by the gold of the temple, he is bound by his oath.' ¹⁷ You blind fools! For which is greater, the gold or the temple that has made the gold sacred? ¹⁸ And you say, 'If anyone swears by the altar, it is nothing, but if anyone swears by the gift that is on the altar, he is bound by his oath.' ¹⁹ You blind men! For which is greater, the gift or the altar that makes the gift sacred? ²⁰ So whoever swears by the altar swears by it and by everything on it. ²¹ And whoever swears by the temple swears by it and by him who dwells in it. ²² And whoever swears by heaven swears by the throne of God and by him who sits upon it.

²³ "Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you tithe mint and dill and cumin, and have neglected the weightier matters of the law: justice and mercy and faithfulness. These you ought to have done, without neglecting the others. ²⁴ You blind guides, straining out a gnat and swallowing a came!!

²⁵ "Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you clean the outside of the cup and the plate, but inside they are full of greed and self-indulgence. ²⁶ You blind Pharisee! First clean the inside of the cup and the plate, that the outside also may be clean.

²⁷ "Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you are like whitewashed tombs, which outwardly appear beautiful, but within are full of dead people's bones and all uncleanness. ²⁸ So you also outwardly appear righteous to others, but within you are full of hypocrisy and lawlessness.

²⁹ "Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you build the tombs of the prophets and decorate the monuments of the righteous, ³⁰ saying, 'If we had lived in the days of our fathers, we would not have taken part with them in shedding the blood of the prophets.' ³¹ Thus you witness against yourselves that you are sons of those who murdered the prophets. ³² Fill up, then, the measure of your fathers. ³³ You serpents, you brood of vipers, how are you to escape being sentenced to hell? ³⁴ Therefore I send you prophets and wise men and scribes, some of whom you will kill and crucify, and some you will flog in your synagogues and persecute from town to town, ³⁵ so that on you may come all the righteous blood shed on earth, from the blood of righteous Abel to the blood of Zechariah the son of Barachiah, whom you murdered between the sanctuary and the altar. ³⁶ Truly, I say to you, all these things will come upon this generation.

Sermon

For the past few weeks, we have seen Jesus in confrontation with the religious leaders of the time. From the time that the religious leaders confront Jesus's authority to speak and teach in the temple, Jesus has been instructing them on what it means to be a follower of God. Through the parable of the two sons, the parable of the tenants, the parable of the wedding feast, as well as the confrontations that the religious leaders brought to him about taxes, resurrection, and the greatest commandment, Jesus has constantly been telling all who will listen that there is a difference between claiming to be one of God's chosen and actually being one of God's people.

Yet even with all of this instruction, some through parables and some through teachings, the religious leaders still fail to recognize that they are in danger of not entering the kingdom of heaven. Even when Jesus has directly told them that they are no longer keeping the covenant that they have with God, even as he explained to them exactly the things that they would do in parables, they refused to recognize the road that they were walking upon, because of their own vanity, their own pride and their own sense of power and prestige.

So, in the Scripture we read today, Jesus speaks in perhaps the clearest possible way, he no longer uses parables or teachings. He comes out and directly speaks the truth about the religious leaders within the church who are not adhering to the teachings of God. In the Seven woes given to the Scribes and Pharisees, Jesus is no longer veiling the truth, he is speaking to them and to the people gathered to listen directly about the hypocrisy that exists in the lives of people who are religious but not saved.

Hypocrisy is one of the most common criticisms of the Christian community. Ask most non-Christians why they do not want to be Christians and you will hear 'there are too many hypocrites there'. Even Ghandhi, a practicing Hindi, who tried to attend a Christian service and was told he could not enter once said 'If it weren't for Christians, I'd be a Christian?'

Hypocrisy is one of the most powerful ways that the devil has to push people away from Christianity and push people away from God. So as Christians, how are we meant to keep hypocrisy from creeping into our life and our ways? The truth is that we are all hypocrites in some way and at some time. Not one of us can claim to live a perfect Christian life, we have all broken the ten commandments, we have all lied, stolen, idolized a sport, athlete, musician, game, celebrity, or had impure thoughts, and as a teenager we all dishonored our parents at least once.

So how do we as Christian begin to discover our hypocrisy and push it out of our life? In the woes to the religious leaders, Jesus points out how hypocrisy exists within Christians and how we can work at removing it with the help of the Holy Spirit.

In Jesus's day a hypocrite was a stage actor, they were someone who was playing a part pretending to be something or someone which they obviously were not. When the religious leaders heard all of the parables and teachings that Jesus had laid out upon them, they heard Jesus calling them hypocrites, they heard him condemning their faith which was not genuine. In all of the teachings we have looked at over the past few weeks, Jesus has told the religious leaders and those gathered listening that there is a significant difference between real faith and the false, hypocritical faith that many held.

The truth is that false, hypocritical faith is just as much a problem in our world today as it was when Jesus, the words we are looking at today. Many people merely pretend to have faith, they go to church each Sunday and put on a show for those gathered there. They are lured into hypocrisy by the world and all of the traps that are laid out to temp people away from true faith.

Jesus begins his woes by reminding those gathered that the religious leaders were to be respected because of the position that they had in teaching the Word of God. They were responsible for taking the Word of God seriously and sharing truthfully what that Word meant and what it called for in the lives of the people who came to them to learn. The religious leaders enjoyed this position because it gave them a sense of authority

due to their knowledge. Jesus tells those listening that they are to listen to the teachings of the religious leaders and obey the instruction that is given. However, he also tells them not to live their own lives like the religious leaders, a classic example of 'do what I say, and not what I do'. The problem with the religious teachers was that while the truthfully taught the Word of God, they did not apply that same Word in their lives.

The real problem lay in their sense of authority and superiority. They thought they just knew and understood what God wanted better than anyone else and that somehow allowed them to live by a different ruleset.

The religious leaders knew how they were called to live according to the Scriptures, and they expected all of the people to live by those rules, even if they could not, or did not want to live by them themselves. They were more than happy to tell everyone else how to be a faithful servant of God, they just did not want to live that way themselves, because it would mean giving up their own selfishness. 'Do as I say, not as I do'.

Hypocrites love to tell others what they are doing wrong in their lives and explain to others how they should be living. This is a problem that plagues the church, people pointing out the sins of others without looking at the sins that exist in their own lives first, this is why Jesus told us to take care of the log in our own eye before we worry about the speck in a brother's eye.

Christians can fall into a pattern of hypocrisy very easily, especially in the modern world where we are surrounded by a sin filled society that just seems to be moving further and further from God and his teachings. However, we need to check our hypocrisy, we need to remember that we should not be running around telling everyone to remove sin from their lives, unless we are actively removing sin from our own lives.

We need to be especially careful of this when it comes to things which are not clearly sinful. It is ok for people to dress the way that they want when they come to church, within reason, it is ok for someone to have an alcoholic drink with their dinner or out with friends, within reason. There are some things which are clearly sinful in the Scriptures, the ten commandments for example, and we can confidently tell someone that they should avoid that sin in their lives. However, for other aspects of life it is not quite as clear. Some people have been raised in churches that taught dancing, singing, or even going to a movie is sinful.

The key to understanding this is reminding ourselves that we are all servants of God.

Romans 14:1-4

As for the one who is weak in faith, welcome him, but not to quarrel over opinions. ² One person believes he may eat anything, while the weak person eats only vegetables. ³ Let not the one who eats despise the one who abstains, and let not the one who abstains pass judgment on the one who eats, for God has welcomed him. ⁴ Who are you to pass judgment on the servant of another? It is before his own master that he stands or falls. And he will be upheld, for the Lord is able to make him stand.

We should be focused on our own growth in faith and obedience. We should be supporting our brothers and sisters in Christ in their own journey of faith and obedience. And that means we need to be willing to confront them about the sin in their lives, but we also need to be truthful about the sin in our own lives. Not a single one of us is perfectly sinless, and we should never act like we are. We also need to remember in the eyes of God all sin is equal, even though man may define some sins as worse than others, God sees mass murder and a single white lie as sin.

This is incredibly humbling, because once we acknowledge our own sinfulness, we begin to get a better understanding of what Jesus did for each of us when he died upon the cross and shed his blood for our sins. And it is that knowledge of his grace and mercy that help us go out and show that same grace and mercy not only to our brother and sisters in Christ but also to the lost people in this world that are all around us each and every day.

The second problem that Jesus address with the religious leaders is their pride. They loved to be praised and held in high regard by others. They were people who always wanted to appear superior to those around them, this is why they wanted to walk in a manner that made it appear like they were floating, this is why they wore expensive robes, so that they would stand out from the rest.

It is fine for Christians to have nice things, you can have an expensive car, a big house, fancy designer clothing, but when you buy those things for the purpose of impressing others you have become a hypocrite. When you want to be seen as something you are not, when you value the opinions of the people in this world higher than your relationship with God and helping others you have become like the religious leaders of Jesus's day.

Jesus reminds those listening that we are not to be filled with pride, instead we are to be humble servants, of God and of our fellow human beings.

Matthew 23:11-12

¹¹ The greatest among you shall be your servant. ¹² Whoever exalts himself will be humbled, and whoever humbles himself will be exalted.

Next, he speaks of the desire of the religious leaders to place themselves above others in all things. The religious leaders would often criticize others who they felt were not as Holy as they were. They would intentionally seek out and speak about the faults of others, while ignoring their own faults.

They would focus on the sin of a person or group of people while overlooking the sin in their lives, as a way to pass over dealing with their own nature.

Once again humility is the answer to this problem.

Philippians 2:3

³ Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility count others more significant than yourselves.

We need to get off our own high horse, we need to stop trying so hard to lift ourselves up in the eyes of others by pushing the others down through criticism and gossip. We need to learn to see others as children of God worthy of our love, grace, and mercy regardless of the life and lifestyle that they live.

The modern world has mastered the ability to do the exact opposite of what Jesus asks of his people. We live in a world where we are told to glorify ourselves and the things we love while we fight against anything that goes against the life and lifestyle we want to enjoy. They twist words, change their meaning, create new language and new ideas all for the purposes of justifying the things we want and the pleasures we enjoy. They take the Scripture and interpret it in a completely new way, disregarding the teachings of the ones who walked with Christ and the earliest of the church fathers just because they want to find a way to not call what they do a sin.

The religious leaders in Jesus's time did the same things.

Mark 7 teaches us:

Mark 7:6-13

- ⁶ And he said to them, "Well did Isaiah prophesy of you hypocrites, as it is written,
- "'This people honors me with their lips, but their heart is far from me;
- ⁷ in vain do they worship me, teaching as doctrines the commandments of men.'
- ⁸ You leave the commandment of God and hold to the tradition of men."
- ⁹ And he said to them, "You have a fine way of rejecting the commandment of God in order to establish your tradition! ¹⁰ For Moses said, 'Honor your father and your mother'; and, 'Whoever reviles father or mother must surely die.'
- ¹¹ But you say, 'If a man tells his father or his mother, "Whatever you would have gained from me is Corban" ' (that is, given to God)— 12 then you no longer

permit him to do anything for his father or mother, ¹³ thus making void the word of God by your tradition that you have handed down. And many such things you do."

We live in a world that is filled with double standards. We tell others that they should not say, do or think something, yet we excuse ourselves for the exact same behavior. People will criticize someone for not attending church on a Sunday and then not see that same person at every bible study or fellowship event that is held within the church because they skip those events. People will say more people need to give to the church, or volunteer at the church, without doing so themselves.

Christians need to be wary of this behavior, we need to look at things that are promoted in this world as good and see if they are Biblical. Are they intended to bring people together, or do they instead push people further apart by bringing in worldly divisions. Christians need to be willing to call their own sin what it is SIN, they can not call it a quirk, idiosyncrasy, problem, or preference.

Christians need to be willing to come to God honestly, and confess their sins, their faults. The Bible tells us to confess our sins to one another, so that we can support one another in overcoming the things in life that pull us away from humbly serving God, our brothers and sisters and this world.

Then Jesus speaks about how we prioritize our lives. None of us really like when the topic of priorities comes up in the church, because every time it does, we all begin to realize just how far down our list of priorities God and Church actually are. I sat down with some other ministers in this community just a week ago and we all shared how congregations fluctuate in numbers week to week depending on what events are occurring around town, whether it's a sports season, or the playoffs are on.

The religious leaders of Jesus's day thought they had their priorities right. They had their own special seating in the synagogues up at the front. They believed that they followed God's laws perfectly because of all of the laws they had instituted in their lives. Instead, they skipped over the meaning of the Scripture, so that they could feel like they obeyed it. They did not see the bigger more important picture of loving their fellow human beings, because they were too busy debating who exactly was a neighbor.

In the Scripture we are given some wonderful direction in the book of Galatians

Galatians 5:22-23

²² But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, ²³ gentleness, self-control; against such things there is no law. ²⁴ And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. ²⁵ If we live by the Spirit, let us also keep in step with the

Spirit. ²⁶ Let us not become conceited, provoking one another, envying one another.

God will lead us through his Holy Spirit to the things he is calling for us to do in this world if we open ourselves up to his Word. The Holy Spirit will lead us to the things we are to prioritize as long as we are sensitive enough to follow His lead.

The biggest issue we have as Christians is that we tell everyone that we are placing God first in our lives, and then our lives do not match our words. We all know of people who come to church on a Sunday and nod along with the sermon, join in the fellowship and then go out that week and live a worldly sinful life. We all know of people who say amen to all of the good teachings and then break them that same day.

The problem is that the world is watching, and they see this type of behavior is too common within those who call themselves Christians. The message and the action do not match. They speak of grace, mercy and forgiveness and then cuss out the person that cut them off in traffic, or yell at the clerk at the checkout who is not going as fast as they would like.

The Fruit of the Spirit is the answer, we all need a heart that matches our words. The world tells us that you can dress up as anything you want in this world, you can choose to be called whatever you want, but the truth is that no matter how much I want my dog to be a cat, she is always going to be a dog.

The same is true for who we are and how we behave, unless there is a change in your heart, we will continue to behave in the way we always have, sin will dominate our heart until God changes our heart, until the Fruit of the Holy Spirit begins to work in our lives.

God changes who we are into who he calls for us to be. This is what baptism represents.

Ezekiel 36:25-27

²⁵ I will sprinkle clean water on you, and you shall be clean from all your uncleannesses, and from all your idols I will cleanse you. ²⁶ And I will give you a new heart, and a new spirit I will put within you. And I will remove the heart of stone from your flesh and give you a heart of flesh. ²⁷ And I will put my Spirit within you, and cause you to walk in my statutes and be careful to obey my rules.

God wants to change us so that the things we prioritize in our lives match the words we speak. He changes us right from the core of our being through the work of His Holy Spirit, giving us all of the Fruit of the Spirit so that we can serve him in his Kingdom.

Finally, Jesus speaks on the sins of the past. We live in a world that is constantly revising history, we live in a world that tries to apply the teachings, ideals, and situation of this world throughout all of history, we think if we were there, we would always do the right thing.

The Pharisees did this, they were more than willing to admit the sins of the past, even if they ignored their own sins in the present.

We see it all over the place in this world today, people who will happily point out the sin of others while presenting themselves as sinless. We see Christians who look at the Scripture and condemn the people who sacrificed their children to Moloch in the pagan world and then we see the same person out there talking about the problems of unwanted pregnancies and the financial, emotional, and bodily strain that it places on the woman who does not want a child. Claiming that no woman should be forced to carry an unwanted child to term.

But the truth of the Scripture is that abortion is murder.

Just like the Pharisees looking at the sins of the Israelites in the past and refusing to recognize that same sin in their own lives. Just like the people of this world who do not realize that the dominance of sin in our culture is no different than the way sin dominates the culture of the Babylonians, the Egyptians, the Greeks, the Romans, the French, the English, the Russians, and every other empire that has risen and fallen throughout mankind's history.

Most of us are willing to share the sins of our past, our wild pre-Christian days, however when it comes to sharing with others the sins that we are wrestling with on a day-to-day basis we are silent. We don't like to admit that we still sin.

Don't worry if this is you, because you stand with some of the greatest heroes of the Scripture. David wrestled with sin throughout his entire life, he was a liar, an adulterer, and a murderer. Yet in the end he realized what was required of him and he came to God and confessed his sinful ways and asked for God's forgiveness.

He repented and tried to change his ways and with the help of the Holy Spirit he became the man that God intended for him to be.

The same could be said of Paul in the New Testament. He was a murdered and persecutor of Christians, as self-described Jew of Jews. Yet when Jesus called him, he was radically changed and became a leader of the movement that establish the church for all of eternity. A man whose heart was forever changed by a God that showed him love, grace and mercy.

Christians can learn a lot from the woes given to the religious leaders about how we can live a life of faith that is not filled with hypocrisy, sure we will all have times we stumble, we will all have times we outright fail and are hypocrites, but the idea is that it should be something we are seeking to remove from our life and our faith.

We do this by holding one another accountable for our faith, accountable for our words and accountable for our behavior. This is why fellowship and friendship within the church is so important. This fellowship allows others to approach us when they have concerns, this fellowship allows church discipline to take place and a loving, caring environment for people to wrestle with the things that draw them away from God without fear of judgement or exclusion.

We do this by going back to Scripture when we face choices and instead of following the crowd or the culture, we make choices that reflect the Word of God. We do this by thinking about how the actions we take and the words we choose influence the world around us, we need to ask ourselves: Are we reflecting the ways of the world or are we acting as the Salt and Light of the Lord?

Paul teaches that the opposite of hypocrisy is sincerity, it is being pure and blameless.

Philippians 1:9-11

⁹ And it is my prayer that your love may abound more and more, with knowledge and all discernment, ¹⁰ so that you may approve what is excellent, and so be pure and blameless for the day of Christ, ¹¹ filled with the fruit of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ, to the glory and praise of God.

We need to be transparent; our words should be the same as our actions. We need to be genuine, speaking the truth to everyone we meet, about the things of this world and about the Word of God. Our love of neighbor cannot be just for show, it needs to come from our hearts. We need to be humble, to walk as servants of God in this world, not seeing ourselves as superior to others, but to see ourselves as the ones called to serve. We need to do as we say while we live out our lives as the Salt and Light of God's Word to those who are still lost and struggling in the darkness.

Lord God almighty,
you do not disregard
the cries of the poor,
and you do not despise
the longing of troubled hearts.
Look upon our prayers
which we bring to you
in our needs

and hear us graciously,
so that everything
that the devil

by your good counsel,
so that we may be undisturbed
by any affliction,
thank you in your congregation,
and praise you at all times;
through your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.
