<u>Sermon</u>

Love is perhaps the most misused and misunderstood word in the Human vocabulary.

Love has been given many different meanings and definitions over time.

In poetry, Love has been called 'a rose'. Love has been called 'many splendid things.'

The Beatles told the world that 'All you need is love.'

There are so many things in this world that we proclaim our love too. People say that they love a particular food, or drink. People say they love this restaurant or that shop or brand. Plenty of people will say that they love their favorite musician, artist, actor, or sports team. People even proclaim their love for themselves.

However, what does the Bible say about love? It is true that the Bible does say that God is love.

1 John 4: 7-12

⁷ Beloved, let us love one another, for love is from God, and whoever loves has been born of God and knows God. ⁸ Anyone who does not love does not know God, because God is love.
⁹ In this the love of God was made manifest among us, that God sent his only Son into the world, so that we might live through him. ¹⁰ In this is love, not that we have loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the propitiation for our sins. ¹¹ Beloved, if God so

loved us, we also ought to love one another. ¹² No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God abides in us and his love is perfected in us.

Duke Ellington summed this Scripture up when he said, 'God is a three-letter word for love and Love is a four-letter word for God.'

The world took it one step further and now says that Love is Love.

So how are we meant to understand the statement that God is love as Christians? To begin with we need to know that while we only have one word for love, biblical Greek has a few different worlds for love, and they have different meanings.

PHILEO (Brotherly Love) – This is the love that is shared between friends who are as close as or at times maybe even closer than brothers.

STORGE (Parental Love) – This is the love that parents have for their children, and it often goes so deep that they carry that love regardless of the actions of their children.

AGAPE (God's Unconditional Love) – This is the love that God has for all of mankind, and it is distinct from all of the other loves, it is in no way connected to the behavior of the person being loved. It is a pure love from a loving God.

It is important for us to understand this. The Bible talks about love in ways that we would struggle to understand in a world that says all love is the same, because it is not.

Today's Scripture does a lot to help us to understand the difference between the love of God and worldly definitions of love, it is a continuation of the Scripture we studied last week, where Jesus told the disciples repeatedly to 'Abide in me' and to 'bear fruit.' That fruit is the testimony of the skill of the vinedresser and the life-giving nutrients of the vine, and when we are fully abiding in Christ, we will bear fruit in abundance in our lives.

The fruit itself can only come from someone who is abiding in Christ and in that connection with the Lord and the life we live because of that connection that will attract others to Christ.

John 15:9-111

⁹ As the Father has loved me, so have I loved you. Abide in my love. ¹⁰ If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love. ¹¹ These things I have spoken to you, that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be full.

In the Scripture today Jesus defines love by stating, '⁹ As the Father has loved me, so have I loved you. Abide in my love.' We can only vaguely understand the love that exists within the trinity, although Augustine, an early church father, defines them as love itself.

Even the most functional and loving of families in this world would be a very poor reflection of the love that exists within the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Yet Jesus says that His love for His disciples is equal to the love that is shared between himself and the Father.

Jesus is perfect, he lived a perfectly sinless life, I can assure you that each and every one of us falls short of being perfect. So why would the Son love us to the same degree that the Father loves the Son?

Think about it for a moment, Jesus loves everyone of his people as much as the Father loves him, even though we fail him in almost every aspect of our lives. As he tells the disciples how much he loves them on the walk to the garden, he knows that Peter is about to deny him, and that the other 10 loyal disciples will abandon him and seek their own preservation after his crucifixion. This is the love of God, AGAPE love, a love that sees past all of the flaws and mistakes in our life, all of the sin and turning away that we do from God and loves us, as He helps us walk closer to him, to repent and turn towards God in our lives. It is God's AGAPE, unconditional love, of us in our sinful nature that results in us changing the way we live to better reflect his love, that we abide in him.

The world's understanding of Love has an issue with this definition. The world's definition of love is usually defined as unconditional love that makes any demands on the beloved abusive. The world believes that we have autonomy, and that no one should make a demand upon you or ask you to change, as long as your behavior is consistent with the current worldview.

Parents in the modern world encourage their children to go out and discover the world, to make their own choices, experience anything that they want, and they call this 'unconditional love'. This is not anything like the, abide in me, unconditional love that Jesus is defining here. Parents are told to let their children be 'freethinkers' but there is no freedom in the world, only slavery to sin.

The truth is that the unconditional love that the world speaks of and offers, is not the same as the unconditional love of God. In fact, the love that the world promotes so readily is not love at all, as it ultimately leads to destruction. STORGE love, parental love without God in it leads to destruction.

In the Old Testament there is the story of Eli who as a priest in the house of the Lord is an example of worldly unconditional love. Eli's sons would eat the sacrificed foods without permission, they were sexually immoral with the servants at the door of the tabernacle itself. Eli did not correct their behavior, he would mildly rebuke them, but never punish and correct them and thus their behavior continued. Finally, God spoke to Eli through another man of God, who told him that God was about to punish his family and gave him the reason for that punishment – Eli honored his family more than he honored God. Eli was filled with STORGE but lacked AGAPE in his love for his sons. Merely loving one's children and giving into them and

their every demand without training and discipling them, is in effect saying that they are more important than God in our lives and in theirs.

The love that Jesus is speaking about makes a claim on the beloved, it is a reciprocal love. Jesus loves his disciples, and he expects them to 'Abide in him' and to love him in return. The same way that a parent displays their love for their children by caring for them and the children demonstrate their love for their parents by willingly obeying them.

Jesus is a wonderful example of God's AGAPE love and STORGE that love between parents and children. He sets the example by willingly obeying the Father. When he asks us to, 'abide in him' he is not asking us to do anything that he himself is not willing to do, he is not asking us to do something that he does not practice himself in his relationship with the Father. He says that the Father is greater in authority than himself, to whom he submits to His love. He demonstrates to us in his walk on earth what living obediently and joyfully in the Love of God really means, as he loves his disciples and all who come to him regardless of their nature. So, he tells his disciples, 'abide in me', live like I have lived, keep the commandments of the Father, and obey the commands that I have given you. Obedience is proof of the disciples love of Christ.

Jesus tells his disciples that the end result of loving him, abiding in him, and obeying him is abundant joy. This is the exact opposite of what the world believes about Christianity, it believes that religion leads to boredom and rigidness, being a stick in the mud. Yet they do not see the freedom that we obtain by living lives that are not enslaved to sin and the pursuit of sin. Obedience to the world is grudging servant hood at best. We obey the world with the expectation of being rewarded with something worldly in the end, like a paycheck. The world just pushes us to pursue the next level of sin as soon as we can. The world cannot see the joy in Christian life because they are still slaves to the pursuit of worldly things, the Christian finds their joy in obedience and service to the Lord.

<u>John 15:12-13</u>

¹² "This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. ¹³ Greater love has no one than this, that someone lay down his life for his friends.

In verse 12 Jesus begins to further define what it means to '**love one another as I have loved you.**' The disciples are to set aside all of their differences and unite in love. If you remember the story of the Last Supper in the book of Luke, you will recall that there was a debate at the table about who was the greatest among them, and this is what lead to Jesus reminding them that they are called to be servants to others and not lord over people like others in the world. He even washed their feet as an example of that servanthood. If Jesus who was the greatest was willing to bend a knee and serve the least of them, then we are to follow in his example. And as easy as it sounds, learning to submit ourselves to someone else in true humility and service is a lot harder to do than to say. Submitting ourselves to others in humility and service is almost as difficult as keeping the Ten Commandments on a daily basis.

Jesus says that true love, is laying down one's life for brothers and sisters. Once again Jesus is about to give us the ultimate example of this when he goes to the cross for the salvation of all who believe in him, all who abide in him.

John 3:16 ¹⁶ "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life.

The son of God demonstrated His love of the Father and his love of his people by his selfless sacrifice for our sin on the cross so that we could have eternal life. This type of sacrificial self-giving love is expected of Jesus's disciples, of those who abide in him. This means us too. All of the disciples with the exception of John died violent deaths at the hands of people who persecuted them for their faith, and their sharing of that faith with others. This is the obedient love that Jesus asks of us, pick up your cross, lay down your life for God, the same way that Jesus did. Almost every one of the disciples could have avoided execution if they publicly denounce Jesus and embraced the Roman Emperor as their God, yet every one of them chose death.

This form of AGAPE and PHILEO love was evident in the early church. People in the early church suffered much persecution. Christians were often captured and tortured so that they would reveal the locations of other Christians that could be captured and tortured. However, instead of betraying their brothers and sisters they would endure the torture, they would endure endless agony and horrible deaths because of their love for one another.

Many people cringe at this thought because we fear it could happen to us as well. In many parts of the world today, there are Christians suffering because of their faith while people in North America believe that their faith bring them wealth and happiness. Many Churches and people teach that Christianity will give you everything you want, yet Jesus warns us of exactly the opposite being true.

John 15:18-23

¹⁸ "If the world hates you, know that it has hated me before it hated you. ¹⁹ If you were of the world, the world would love you as its own; but because you are not of the world, but I chose you out of the world, therefore the world hates you.
²⁰ Remember the word that I said to you: 'A servant is not greater than his master.' If they persecuted me, they will also persecute you. If they kept my word, they will also keep yours. ²¹ But all these things they will do to you on account of my name, because they do not know him who sent me. ²² If I had not come and spoken to them, they would not have been guilty of sin, but now they have no excuse for their sin.
²³ Whoever hates me hates my Father also.

Why do so many people think we will be 'raptured' and escape all of the troubles of this world? Christians in Egypt, Iran, Iraq, North Korea, India, and many other places are suffering, in the same ways that Christians suffered 2000 years ago! Are they not entitled to the same blessings that North American Christians are? Did they get raptured away from their persecution and suffering? Why do so many North American Christian think that we are immune to the persecution and suffering of our faith? We are freed from the wrath of God because of our faith, but because of our faith we are going to suffer the wrath of man. If we are keeping God's Word, truly abiding in him, then there should be some difficulties in our life caused by our faith.

If you want to know what PHILEO love looks like with AGAPE just look to Judas. Even though Judas was one of the twelve and walked, ate, and experienced God every day, he had his own personal and hidden agenda that none of the other disciples were aware of. His mind was on money, worldly sin, and worldly pleasure. In the end he decided to betray Jesus to the Jewish authorities for a mere three months wages. Yes, he had a good relationship with Jesus and the disciples while he walked with them, but he did not love them with the AGAPE love of God, or he could never have done what he chose to do.

John 15: 14-17

¹⁴ You are my friends if you do what I command you. ¹⁵ No longer do I call you servants, for the servant does not know what his master is doing; but I have called you friends, for all that I have heard from my Father I have made known to you. ¹⁶ You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you that you should go and bear fruit and that your fruit should abide, so that whatever you ask the Father in my name, he may give it to you. ¹⁷ These things I command you, so that you will love one another.

It is here that Jesus tells them that they are his friends. Servants do the things they do out of fear of the master, friends do things for one another out of love for one another. They are friends because Jesus has now revealed to them all that the Father had sent for him to reveal. The disciples now know the truth, and it is the truth that sets them free of the grasp of the world and their sinful nature. Part of willing and loving obedience is knowing the reasons behind the things we do, instead of just blindly obeying the commands of the master. Yet there are still demands, expectations, that are placed on being a friend of Jesus and Jesus expects them to keep them if they are to remain his friends, because to be a friend of God is a great privilege and blessing in our lives.

The disciples are reminded of the basis for this friendship. Jesus emphatically tells them that THEY did not chose him, instead it was He who chose them and appointed them to produce fruit. This is a reminder that we are to set aside all worldly pride in service of the Lord, we are to bow down before the grace of God. There is no place for Self-love in the Kingdom of God.

Once again this goes against the world. The world sees the highest personal good in selfactualization and self-esteem. The goal of the world is to be the ultimate narcissist. Just look around at the millions of unique genders, pronouns, and sexualities that are being invented daily. Narcissism is running rampant in our culture. Ironically, prisons are filled with people who score very highly on the self-actualizational and self-esteem tests Hollywood, the music industry, social media, sports and even churches are filled with narcissists. And our world celebrates and idolizes these people.

Jesus is telling us something different. We need to be focused on abiding in him, filling our lives with Christ-actualization and Christ-esteem. Paul put it this way in his epistle to the Colossians.

Colossians 1: 24-29

²⁴ Now I rejoice in my sufferings for your sake, and in my flesh I am filling up what is lacking in Christ's afflictions for the sake of his body, that is, the church, ²⁵ of which I became a minister according to the stewardship from God that was given to me for you, to make the word of God fully known, ²⁶ the mystery hidden for ages and generations but now revealed to his saints. ²⁷ To them God chose to make known how great among the Gentiles are the riches of the glory of this mystery, which is Christ in you, the hope of glory. ²⁸ Him we proclaim, warning everyone and teaching everyone with all wisdom, that we may present everyone mature in Christ. ²⁹ For this I toil, struggling with all his energy that he powerfully works within me.

Humbly serving Christ is the way to true joy and happiness. And if we are to find human dignity, we can find it in the Lord who called us friend, in spite of our own behavior and sins. Jesus calls the disciples friends, even though he knows that they are all about to horribly fail him in all that he has taught them, the same way he calls us friends, even though we fail him so often.

The Bible teaches us we need to set aside our human pride.

2 Corinthians 10: 17-18

Let the one who boasts, boast in the Lord." ¹⁸ For it is not the one who commends himself who is approved, but the one whom the Lord commends.

When we let our own pride get in the way it acts as a wedge that divides us from the world and from other believers. We begin to compare ourselves to others, and it leads to tension. In the same regard we need to recognize that we are called friends of Jesus, and that makes us worthy to serve him. This is another Christian Conundrum, the battle between our pride and our unworthiness, perhaps this is why every character in the Bible expect for Jesus is shown as being flawed, it is our very nature. Only God is perfect, and the proper thing for us to do is to remember that we stand by Grace and neither boast in ourselves nor despise ourselves.

Finally, Jesus tells the disciples that because of their relationship with him, they can make requests of him and be assured of an answer. Another reminder of the importance of prayer in the life of a faithful Christian. But it is also a reminder that our prayer needs to come from a proper understanding of what it means to abide in Christ. It means trusting and obeying his

commands in a world that teaches us the opposite, it means focusing on Christ ahead of our own worldly passions and desires, it means loving one another in this world the same way that Christ loves us. It means bringing the truth of God's Word and the real meaning of unconditional love to the world. However, people need to see that the church is abiding in Christ before they can abide in him themselves.

Let us Pray,

Perfect Love

Grant me, even me, my dearest Lord, to know you, and love you, and rejoice in you. And, if I cannot do these perfectly in this life, let me at least advance to higher degrees every day, until I can come to do them in perfection. Let the knowledge of you increase in me here, that it may be full hereafter. Let the love of you grow every day more and more here, that it may be perfect hereafter; that my joy may be full in you. I know, O God, that you are a God of truth, O make good your gracious promises to me, that my joy may be full; to your honor and glory, with the Father and the Holy Spirit you live and reign, one God, now and forever. Amen.

Give us faith in our praying and love in our serving, knowing that by your power all may find a new balance in living and a new victory in adversity. We pray for all unhappy lives, those who are bitter and resentful, feeling life has given them a raw deal, those who are sensitive to criticism and quick to take offense, those who desire their own way, whatever the inconvenience or cost to others. May your judgment and mercy be for their healing. We pray for those who are lonely, who are shy and self-conscious, who find it hard to make friends; those who are nervous and timid, who ever feel themselves strangers in a world they can scarcely understand. May your presence inspire confidence and ensure companionship. We pray for those who live with bitter regrets, for loving relationships brought to ruin, for opportunities freely given and woefully abused, for the bitterness of defeat or betrayal at another's hand, or for failure in personal integrity. May your grace give new hope to find victory in the very scene of failure. We pray for all in illness and pain, weary of the day and fearful of the night. Grant healing, if it be your will, and at all times through faith the gift of your indwelling peace. Bless the company of Christ's folk, the church in every land. Make her eager in worship, fearless in proclamation of the gospel, and passionate for caring. Bless our country. Bless our leaders. Bless our children and grant us peace within our borders. Grant us as a nation to be found effective in establishing peace throughout the world. Bless us, each one, in the communion of the saints, and keep us ever mindful of the great cloud of witnesses that, following in their steps, as they did in the steps of the Master, we may with them at the last receive the fulfillment promised to your people.

We pray this in the name of Jesus Christ, who lives and rules with you and the Holy Spirit as the One True God, now and Forever. **Amen.**
