Scripture

John 6:22-29

²² On the next day the crowd that remained on the other side of the sea saw that there had been only one boat there, and that Jesus had not entered the boat with his disciples, but that his disciples had gone away alone.

- ²³ Other boats from Tiberius came near the place where they had eaten the bread after the Lord had given thanks.
- ²⁴ So when the crowd saw that Jesus was not there, nor his disciples, they themselves got into the boats and went to Capernaum, seeking Jesus.
- ²⁵ When they found him on the other side of the sea, they said to him, "Rabbi, when did you come here?" ²⁶ Jesus answered them, "Truly, truly, I say to you, you are seeking me, not because you saw signs, but because you ate your fill of the loaves. ²⁷ Do not work for the food that perishes, but for the food that endures to eternal life, which the Son of Man will give to you. For on him God the Father has set his seal." ²⁸ Then they said to him, "What must we do, to be doing the works of God?" ²⁹ Jesus answered them, "This is the work of God, that you believe in him whom he has sent."

<u>Sermon</u>

Most of man's life is spent trying to fill his needs. It is true that we are all born with needs. We do not have everything we need to survive in this world. It takes time and effort to carry out and succeed in life, but the truth is that we have both physical and material needs as well as spiritual needs. Yet, we spend most of our time in this world chasing those physical needs things like food, a roof over our heads, and money to buy the things we need. However, we do spend some time seeking out those things that we need spiritually like love, peace, and joy. Then there are those who are fortunate enough to discover their need for God and they spend time seeking out him in this world.

The Scripture that we're looking at today in the book of John is only eight verses long but within these eight verses, there are four truths about the physical and spiritual needs of man.

This all takes place the day after Jesus has fed the 5000 and then gone up the mountain to get away from the crowds that were seeking to make him a king. He had sent his disciples to their boat, the only boat to cross the sea, Jesus had walked upon the water to get to the other side, calmly in the midst of a giant storm, and then suddenly they were safely in Capernaum.

John 6:22-25

22 On the next day the crowd that remained on the other side of the sea saw that there had been only one boat there, and that Jesus had not entered the boat with his disciples, but that his disciples had gone away alone. 23 Other boats from Tiberias came near the place where they had eaten the bread after the Lord had given thanks. 24 So when the crowd saw that Jesus was not there, nor his disciples, they themselves got into the boats and went to Capernaum, seeking Jesus.

25 When they found him on the other side of the sea, they said to him, "

This is the first truth, man has needs, he hungers for things. On the other side of the Sea of Galilee the crowd had been miraculously fed. There was a common belief in that day that when the Messiah came, he would feed them with mana from heaven in the same way that Moses had done in his day. In fact, the Jews of the time believed that the Messiah would give them even more than Moses had given, and that is exactly what Jesus had done when he fed them with fish and bread to their fill. This served to convince those who were gathered there that he was their Messiah and drove their desire to make Jesus their king.

So, the people acknowledged their need for a Messiah, their need for a savior was not an issue.

John 6:14-15

- ¹⁴ When the people saw the sign that he had done, they said, "This is indeed the Prophet who is to come into the world!"
- ¹⁵ Perceiving then that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, Jesus withdrew again to the mountain by himself.

After they had eaten their fill, they once again decide to listen to their new Messiah, that is when they notice his absence from among them. They knew that there had only been one boat along the shore and the disciples had taken it. So, they must have thought that he was simply somewhere else nearby or gone to seek some solitude and they set off in search of him.

They finally realize that he is not with them along that shoreline the next day, and the next lesson comes in the Scripture. Those who had been there along listening to the words of Jesus had been spiritually and physically. They had been filled, and when the hunger came again, physically and spiritually, they knew they needed to be filled again. They had a need, and they wanted that need met in their lives. They had heard Jesus say that he could meet their needs, and for that reason, their need, they looked for him, yet he was gone

And that is the second truth we discover in the Scriptures today. We all have needs, and those needs will go unmet unless we have a way to meet them. For physical needs like hunger, it is food, we eat, and the hunger is satisfied, for a time. Yet it is also true that all humans have a spiritual need that must be met in some way, so how are people to meet their spiritual needs, for Christians it is by doing what these people did, seeking out Jesus, wherever he may be to fulfill their needs.

So, they look for Jesus, hoping that he will once again fulfill their needs. They knew that other boats had arrived throughout the night, likely seeking refuge from the storm

which had occurred. So many of the people get on the boats and begin to search the shorelines for Jesus, eventually ending up in Capernaum.

The fact that the people had to go seek Jesus is an important point for all of us. Man has physical and spiritual needs. Man needs a Messiah, we all need a Saviour, and we all will be forced to admit that truth at some point in our lives, usually as death approaches. It is then that we begin to seek a way to fulfill our spiritual needs, some seek to find just enough comfort to trick themselves into living life the way that they wish, others try to force the spiritual needs into a corner of their life and just ignore it.

However, there is only One True Living God and one way into eternal life and that is Jesus Christ. So, to have spiritual needs truly met in a person's life, they must seek Jesus Christ out, personally. They need to be willing to search for him where they think he is, where they think he should be and even be willing to get in the boat and cross the sea, if that is what it takes to find him in their lives.

Most people in the modern world discover their spiritual need, but they are unwilling to seek Jesus, instead they make excuses for themselves. They ask themselves and others things like:

- If Jesus is really the Messiah, why does he so often seem absent or far away in my life, especially when I am experiencing troubles?
- If there is a God and Jesus really is his son, why is there so much pain and suffering in this world?
- Why doesn't God just fix it all and make all the bad, all the pain, all of the suffering and all of the evil go away?
- Why doesn't God just meet all my needs immediately?

The answer to many of these questions lies in the Scripture we are looking at today. As Christians we are called out to seek God in our lives at all times, especially as we navigate the daily challenges we face in this world.

The third truth we get in today's Scripture is that mankind's motive for seeking out the Messiah – in seeking a way to fulfil their needs in this world – is often corrupt.

What do I mean by that? Look at the reason why these people were seeking Jesus, they wanted their needs met again, the food he had provided them had left their system and they wanted a refill. And this is a tragic truth, that has been a fact in the lives of many throughout the ages and is still a tragic truth that exists in the world today.

People seek Jesus out in this world, not to praise him as our Lord and Saviour, not to serve him however we are called to in this world, but instead they seek Jesus because of what they think they can get out of him.

Man is primarily interested in having his own needs met. Man is primarily interested in himself, not in honoring Jesus as his Lord, not in humbly serving God in this world, not in acknowledging his sin, and repentance and turning away from his sinful ways. This is why there are so many people who call themselves Christians, in followers of Christ, yet they fail to read his Word, the Bible, they refuse to acknowledge the truths in the Scripture and instead seek to manipulate or ignore its teachings, because they are focused on their needs being met, their need to enjoy their sin and to trick themselves into believing they have salvation.

The thoughts of the crowd that sought out Jesus all along the shores and into Capernaum were focused not on humbly serving the Messiah, but on having their bellies filled once again, their needs fulfilled. Just like so many false Christians, they were focused on worldly needs and worldly things, on the flesh and fulfilling its desires.

This is not what God wants from us, instead we are meant to be interested in Jesus for who he is, the son of God, our Saviour. We should not be seeking what we can get out of him, but instead seeking what we can give up in service to him. We should love and serve God because of who he is not because of what we get out of the relationship. Christianity is not a tool to be used for personal gain, how I wish that message would echo from the pulpits of minsters all around the world.

The crowd should have recognized the miracle that had been performed among them, the feeding of more than 5000 people with just a couple small fishes and biscuits. They should have known it was only God, only the Messiah that could perform such a miracle and they should have fell upon their knees in praise, in worship, humbling themselves before him and giving themselves over in service to him.

They should have been asking what they could give, not what they could get.

Which is what Jesus reminds them.

John 6: 26-27

²⁷ Do not work for the food that perishes, but for the food that endures to eternal life, which the Son of Man will give to you. For on him God the Father has set his seal." ²⁸ Then they said to him, "What must we do, to be doing the works of God?" ²⁹ Jesus answered them, "This is the work of God, that you believe in him whom he has sent."

Jesus is making a point. Man, constantly seeks ou the things that spoil. Man seeks to feed himself physically and spiritually with the things of this world. How many people

seek to fill that empty spiritual void in their lives, with feelings of comfort, pleasure, plenty. How many seek to fill it by attaining power, wealth, fame chasing the things of this world that their flesh enjoys. This is why we have so many people addicted to things in this world, because they are chasing the things which spoil.

What is ironic is that we all know that this is foolish, even those who have attained great amounts of worldly power, wealth and fame. As death looms ahead they all know that the thing of this world does not matter, because eventually we will not be part of this world. Everyone dies, and no ones gets to determine the date and time, it could come early in our lives, or it could come after many long years, but it always comes.

And here is where we discover that even though the things of this world may give a temporary feeling of pleasure and being full, they are temporary. Eventually that emptiness returns and people are left incomplete, unfulfilled, hungry, dissatisfied, in need and they begin to chase more and more. When they are chasing worldly things, this usually leads to addiction, just look at the plague of addiction we have in the world today, everything from social media to porn and hardcore drugs, people are throwing their lives away chasing something that gives them a temporary feeling of peace.

Then as death comes close in their lives, they become depressed because they recognize the truth, their worldly pleasure was just that worldly, and will bring no comfort in the face of the end of their lives.

So, the third lesson we should take from the Scripture is that when we hunger and seek to fill those needs in our life it should be with the things that endure, not the things that spoil and perish.

Mans basic hunger is for life, a full life, an abundant life – a life that is complete, full of love, joy, peace and good things. Man seeks a life that last forever, that is why so many people seek so desperately to capture youth, and there is only one path to eternal life.

Jesus is the only way to eternal life; He is the only one who can give us things that do not perish. And in the final two versus of the Scripture we are looking at today Jesus tells us how we can find that eternal life.

We need to be willing to do the WORK of God. And what is that work, going to church every Sunday? Doing mission work? Teaching Sunday school?

The people who had found Jesus in Capernaum asked him what they need to do for eternal life. What works were important. Did you notice they used the plural, "What must we do, to be doing the works of God?". Ironically, here we are almost 2000 years later, and we are still asking this same question. What works must we do?

So many people are focused on what they need to do to get what they want out of God. So many people are convincing themselves that if they live Good and moral lives by worldly standards that they will receive salvation.

There are good people in this world, people who do lots of good work, for society, for those in need. They live good and moral lives, sometimes even by Biblical standards, so we convince ourselves that they must be acceptable to God. Afterall how could they be condemned; they are good people.

There are also bad people in this world. People who do mostly bad works, who are focused on themselves and will do whatever it takes to get ahead in this world. They live immoral and unethical lives, so we convince ourselves that these people surely must be condemned by God, there is no way that God would grant eternal life to one of those people.

Then there is the group of go-betweeners. People who sometimes do good, even do good most of the time, yet there are times when they fall to bad, give into evil, do the immoral. They live lives that are both just and unjust. They are constantly weighing out their lives, thinking if I can just do a few more good works God will accept me. These people often compare themselves to the world around themselves and think, compared to this person I am not a good person, but compared to all these others, I am surely good enough for God's acceptance. These are the ones that convince themselves its okay to change God's Word and pick and choose what I want to obey, because as long as I do most of it God will surely let me into his Kingdom and have eternal life.

Well, this is exactly how those gathered around the Messiah were thinking when they asked Jesus, "What must we do, to be doing the works of God?".

Salvation is not a negotiation. It is not based on how good or bad your life is based on any worldly standard or any act of works. It does not matter how good your life was, or how evil it was! It does not matter what the world thinks of a person, or what a person thinks of themselves.

Jesus' answer is singular. Believe. "This is the work of God, that you believe in him whom he has sent.". This is the one thing that is needed. Believe.

This goes much deeper than simply acknowledging that Jesus is God. Even Satan believes in God, the demons that Jesus casts out in the Scriptures all believed, all knew with 100% clarity that he was the Messiah, that he was the Son of God, yet not one of them will receive eternal salvation.

Believing means trusting in Him, entering into a personal relationship with him, seeking a life where we are not looking for what we get, but what we can give. It means that we do not focus on ourselves, but we focus on him, worshiping and praising him. It means

we examine our lives, acknowledge that we are sinners, and seek to repent and change the way we live, so we no longer hurt the one we love. It means we change for him, we do not change him for us, and that is a difficult thing to do, because it often means we need to give up some of those things we find pleasure in, but they are all going to spoil eventually and leave us unfulfilled, when we seek out the Lord, when we humbly serve him and let him fill us up, we know what it means to live life abundantly, full of love, joy and peace.

This is what Jesus tells them:

John 6:35

³⁵ Jesus said to them, "I am the bread of life; whoever comes to me shall not hunger, and whoever believes in me shall never thirst

He is the bread of life, and our life eternal comes though him alone. Today as we celebrate communion let us remember that the things of this world which we find satisfaction in will all perish. Let us focus on the things that gives us eternal life, Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior and let us go forth and humbly serve him in this world, not because of what we receive, but because of who he is as we act as the Salt and Light of God's Word to the people around us.

Let us pray,

You Know Our Needs before We Ask

Almighty God, you know our needs before we ask, and our ignorance in asking:
Set your servants free from all anxious thoughts about the future, give us contentment with your good gifts, and confirm our faith that as we seek your kingdom, you will not let us lack any good thing; through Jesus Christ our Lord.
