Scripture

John 3:22-36

²² After this Jesus and his disciples went into the Judean countryside, and he remained there with them and was baptizing. ²³ John also was baptizing at Aenon near Salim, because water was plentiful there, and people were coming and being baptized ²⁴ (for John had not yet been put in prison).

²⁵ Now a discussion arose between some of John's disciples and a Jew over purification. ²⁶ And they came to John and said to him, "Rabbi, he who was with you across the Jordan, to whom you bore witness—look, he is baptizing, and all are going to him." ²⁷ John answered, "A person cannot receive even one thing unless it is given him from heaven. ²⁸ You yourselves bear me witness, that I said, 'I am not the Christ, but I have been sent before him.' ²⁹ The one who has the bride is the bridegroom. The friend of the bridegroom, who stands and hears him, rejoices greatly at the bridegroom's voice. Therefore this joy of mine is now complete. ³⁰ He must increase, but I must decrease."

<u>Sermon</u>

In the Scripture we are looking at today, Jesus has left the temple after his cleansing and moved to the Judean countryside.

I think we all need to take note of something here, again it is something that is emphasized when we read and study the Scriptures in context.

<u>John 3:22</u>

²² After this Jesus and his disciples went into the Judean countryside, and he remained there with them and was baptizing.

What was Jesus doing while he was in the Judean countryside?

Jesus was baptizing, Jesus who had just cleansed the temple, Jesus who had changed water into wine as a symbol of conversion, who had cleansed the temple as a sign of cleansing and who had spoken to Nicodemus about the need for rebirth and change of character through the spirit and water, was now doing exactly that for those who committed themselves to him.

We see here that Jesus is baptizing in the same manner as John the Baptist, with the same message as John the Baptist, "Repent, for the Kingdom of God is at hand'

After this as Jesus moves forth in his ministry his message is the same, 'Repent for the kingdom of God is here.'

For Christians a clear expression of our repentance of our desire to change from the sinners we are into the faithful followers of Jesus Christ, we are baptized. So, it makes sense to see Jesus baptizing here in the region of Judea, alongside John the Baptist who had continued his work of baptizing people even after he had baptized the Messiah himself.

Jesus baptizing others in the very beginning of his ministry, especially following John 3:16, only serves to emphasize the importance of repentance in our walk with God. And the fact that Jesus did it alongside John, serves to show its importance in our public expression of our faith.

What is interesting is what happens as these two men do their ministry alongside one another on the shores of the Jordan river.

John 3:25-26

²⁵ Now a discussion arose between some of John's disciples and a Jew over purification. ²⁶ And they came to John and said to him, "Rabbi, he who was with you across the Jordan, to whom you bore witness—look, he is baptizing, and all are going to him."

It seems that some of John the Baptist's disciples got into a debate with some of the local Jewish leaders. We are not given the details of the dispute, however we learn that they are very concerned, because Jesus is across the river from John baptizing, and it seems that everyone is going to Jesus for their baptism instead of coming to John.

This was their concern, that Jesus was doing better than them.

John 3:27-30

²⁷ John answered, "A person cannot receive even one thing unless it is given him from heaven. ²⁸ You yourselves bear me witness, that I said, 'I am not the Christ, but I have been sent before him.' ²⁹ The one who has the bride is the bridegroom. The friend of the bridegroom, who stands and hears him, rejoices greatly at the bridegroom's voice. Therefore this joy of mine is now complete. ³⁰ He must increase, but I must decrease."

When his disciples come to him in their concern, John responds with grace and understanding. John explains to them why the fact that Jesus's ministry seems to be doing so much better than his is not a concern to him.

John is speaking very clearly; however, it is in a very Hebraic manner.

He begins by saying that a man can receive nothing unless it is given to him from heaven.

Johns' primary response to his disciples is stop worrying, everything that I have in my life, everything I have in my ministry is not of my doing, it is a gift from God above. So, if Jesus of Nazareth is drawing larger crowds in his ministry of baptism, then that is God's gift as well. Essentially, John is telling them to stop worrying, God is in control.

What a great reminder to his disciples, and what a great reminder to us, God is always in control. What a great reminder that we should be ready and willing to receive the tasks that God gives us to do in this life with a sense of humility and do them to the best of our ability, because they are a gift from God himself.

This is a great reminder for those of us who are called to do the work of sharing the Gospel. Whether we see a great success or not, we should be doing that task to the best of our ability. Whether we have 100 people, 10 people or even a single person come to hear the Word of God we need to continue on sharing the message of the Gospel.

So, when you go out and try to share the Lord with others do not be discouraged, if even one person who listens to you it is a gift from God. Do not be discouraged, be invigorated, that God has chosen to put you to use for his purpose.

That is what John the Baptist was teaching his disciples, whatever your ministry is, whether its hundreds of people or a single person it is a Gift from God, so do it to the best of your ability to glorify his name.

John then tells them, 'I am not the Christ, but I have been sent before him.' John reminds his disciples that he knows his position in the Kingdom of heaven. Jesus is the Messiah, and I am his servant, I know my place in God's plan.

John is reminding his disciples and all of us that we all have a place to serve in God's plan.

There is this weird concept in Christianity that often comes up in denominations and churches. It says that if you really want to serve and please God you should be a Pastor, or a Missionary, or an Elder, or a Bible study teacher, or a Sunday School teacher.

This is not true at all, If you really want to serve and please God find out what call he has given you. Do what God wants you to do, maybe God just wants you to be a hard worker, who loves his family, supports his church and prays for his community and serves God in whatever ways he calls you in the community and the church.

If you do that you will hear, 'Well done good and faithful servant.', on the Day of Judgement.

If you really want to please God, be converted, changed and committed to him, then find your place in his plan, discover the things he has not called you to do, so you can find the things you are called to do, and serve him humbly and faithfully.

John knew what he was not called to be and what he was called to be, and he was fully committed to the task for which God had called him.

John then reminds his disciples that he is the 'friend of the bridegroom.' He is the Best man at the wedding. He is speaking plainly, saying I am not supposed to be the focal point of this ministry. The best man should not outshine the groom at the wedding.

The job of John is to be the best man at the wedding, and that makes Jesus the groom. And once again this points to Jesus Christ as divine. Throughout the entire Old Testament God is the Husband of the nation of Israel. So, when John the Baptist makes this reference to himself as the best man and Jesus as the groom, he is saying Jesus is God to his disciples.

This is the message that the Gospel of John repeats over and over, Jesus is God. Jesus is God.

So, John is happy that Jesus is getting more attention in his ministry, it is how it should be, the groom should be drawing more attention than the best man.

John lost his congregation to Jesus, and he was happy about it, because he humbly accepted his role in God's kingdom and God's plan.

Finally, John states, 'He must increase, but I must decrease.'

I need to get smaller; I need to be less important in my life and he needs to get more focus.

There needs to be less of me and more of Jesus.

This should be the motto of every church, every denomination and every servant of the Lord.

There needs to be less of me and more of Jesus.

This should be the focus of our public ministry as a church and as individuals, Jesus first, our church second. If someone chooses to follow Jesus, truly be converted, changed and committed to Christ because of the work we do, and then they choose to go to a different church we should celebrate that. Jesus first, that is our primary goal to build the Kingdom of Heaven here on earth.

John the Baptist was not concerned about the shrinking of his ministry, because it was for the purpose of God. He knew his ministry was a gift of God and he knew that God would continue to use him as he intended to serve his kingdom.

As long as people are leading people to Jesus, as long as people are sharing the Gospel truthfully, they are our partners in this world, and we need to celebrate with them and help them in any way in which we can to build God's kingdom.

When you understand what John means by, '**He must increase, but I must decrease.**' Then you will begin to truly serve the Lord your God and do his bidding here on Earth.

John did not give up when Jesus's ministry outgrew his, when people left to go follow Jesus directly. He kept doing what God called him to do to the best of his ability, serving God in the way he had been called.

John the Baptist, served the way he was called and even as his ministry shrunk his influence was maintained. God used John the Baptist for his plan and more than 20 years after this event in a city almost 2000 km away, there were disciples of John the Baptist baptizing people and telling them to 'Repent, for the Kingdom of God is at hand.'

John put his focus on God and left everything in God's hands. He became less so Jesus could become more, and his fame and influence came from the Lord, evidence of his faith and the glorification of God through his life.

'He must increase, but I must decrease.' Let me tell you who he is and why He must increase, and I must decrease

<u>John 3:31-36</u>

³¹ He who comes from above is above all. He who is of the earth belongs to the earth and speaks in an earthly way. He who comes from heaven is above all. ³² He bears witness to what he has seen and heard, yet no one receives his testimony. ³³ Whoever receives his testimony sets his seal to this, that God is true. ³⁴ For he whom God has sent utters the words of God, for he gives the Spirit without measure. ³⁵ The Father loves the Son and has given all things into his hand. ³⁶ Whoever believes in the Son has eternal life; whoever does not obey the Son shall not see life, but the wrath of God remains on him.

Jesus came from heaven, he is above all, and we must listen to him. That is why it is fine by me if I decrease so that he increases, he is God.

Notice that in verse 32, John tells us that people will reject his testimony. He is speaking with some hyperbole here, there were some who accepted his testimony, it is estimated that when Jesus ascended into heaven after his death and resurrection, he had roughly 120 disciples.

Thousands upon thousands had heard him preach, seen his miracles and been in his presence, yet they had not been converted, changed and committed, that group was only roughly 120 people.

Even though John the Baptist attested to the fact that Jesus was God, even though people witnessed the Trinity at his baptism, even though people saw people healed, demons cast out, raise from the dead, and Christ himself was resurrected, people still only believed in Jesus Christ in name, they were not willing to convert, change and be committed to him as their Lord and Saviour.

So, John once again speaks plainly. He starts with a beautiful message; Jesus speaks the Word of God. Jesus is God and he walks among us, he is fully God, and his Word is filled with the Holy Spirit. Jesus is the one we should all be following, 'He must increase, so I can decrease'

So, he who believes in the Son has everlasting life. Jesus is God and man, and he is different, you need to be converted, changed and committed to him. You need to let the Holy Spirit cleanse the sin from your life, even the sin you love so much, so that you can have eternal life in his presence.

Because for those who do not, there is something else.

'whoever does not obey the Son shall not see life, but the wrath of God remains on him.'

John reminds us that because Jesus is God, he was sent from Heaven to die on our behalf and if you reject that free gift of God, to pursue your own worldly pleasures, then you miss out on eternal life and instead pay the heavy price of rejecting him, the wrath of God.

A Bible commentator by the name of Merril Tenny said this about God's wrath.

'the word does not mean a sudden gust of passion or a burst of temper rather it is the settled displeasure of God against sin it is the divine allergy to moral evil the reaction of righteousness to unrighteousness'

You cannot tell Jesus that 'I want the gift of eternal life, but I reject you. I reject your authority in my life'. Eternal life and submission of self to Jesus Christ come together. The Scripture and the teachings within it are not a choose your own adventure book, you accept it all in your life, or the free gift of Eternal Life is not something to which you can lay claim.

John chapter three reminds us that we must be born again, that Jesus Christ died for our sins, that He must increase in our life and that we must decrease.

That we need to be converted, changed and committed to our Lord and Saviour as we walk as the Salt and Light of his Word in this fallen world.
