<u>Scripture</u>

<u>John 7:1-13</u>

7 After this Jesus went about in Galilee. He would not go about in Judea, because the Jews were seeking to kill him. ² Now the Jews' Feast of Booths was at hand. ³ So his brothers said to him, "Leave here and go to Judea, that your disciples also may see the works you are doing. ⁴ For no one works in secret if he seeks to be known openly. If you do these things, show yourself to the world." ⁵ For not even his brothers believed in him. ⁶ Jesus said to them, "My time has not yet come, but your time is always here. ⁷ The world cannot hate you, but it hates me because I testify about it that its works are evil. ⁸ You go up to the feast. I am not going up to this feast, for my time has not yet fully come." ⁹ After saying this, he remained in Galilee.

<u>Sermon</u>

Last week we finished up chapter 6 of the book of John. We studied the feeding of the five thousand, and then the sermon that Jesus gave in the synagogue in the city of Capernaum.

Throughout his sermon to the people and religious leaders gathered to listen Jesus repeated that he was the bread of Life, and that to have a spiritual life in this world we need to eat of his flesh and drink of his blood.

And even though the crowd knew that he was speaking in a metaphor, in one that they could easily understand some chose to misunderstand him and twist his words. Many chose to walk away from what Jesus asked for them to do, because they wanted to continue on in the ways of this world.

Finally, speaking to the twelve disciples, Jesus asked them what they planned to do, to walk away or stay. And Peter spoke for the twelve, affirming that they believed that Jesus Christ was indeed the son of God, and the one and only way to eternal life.

The whole message of the chapter can be summed up simply. You need a personal relationship of Love and Trust with God for your salvation. You need to follow Jesus because of who he is, not because of his miracles, his fame, his goodness, but because of the sacrifice he made upon the cross to pay for your sins. And when you have this personal relationship built on love and trust, you will begin to obey God's Word, not because of religious reasons like the religious leaders of the day did and got wrong, but because of your desire to please your Savior.

Which makes chapter seven an interesting continuation of this message.

It begins with Jesus still in Galilee, not wanting to go to Judea, the region to the South, because the religious leaders whom he has harshly corrected about their wrong interpretation and application of the Scriptures a few times now have decided that their best way to get rid of this rabbi who refuses to give into the religious order of the world is not to just force him to convert to their ways or be silent, but to kill him instead.

Jesus was staying in galilee not because of fear for his life, but because he knew the time of his death was still to come according to the father's plan.

However, it was the Feast of the Tabernacles. The Feast of Tabernacles takes place sometime in September or October according to our modern calendar. It was a harvest festival that was meant to remind the people of God how God had taken care of them after they had escaped from Egypt and were on the way to the promised land.

The Israelites had spent forty years travelling from Egypt to the promised land, and that meant that they had spent forty years living in tents. So, to commemorate this time of living in tents and relying on God for everything, the people of Israel and some Jews still today, during the Feast of Tabernacles will build themselves temporary shelters out of a frame of wood and palm branches, and camp out. They do it to remember that time in the wilderness, and God's faithfulness to them in their journey.

That is the setting for today's Scripture.

John 7:3-5

³ So his brothers said to him, "Leave here and go to Judea, that your disciples also may see the works you are doing. ⁴ For no one works in secret if he seeks to be known openly. If you do these things, show yourself to the world." ⁵ For not even his brothers believed in him.

Let's start with verse three, it is one that we do not spend enough time thinking about. Jesus had brothers, more precisely half-brothers and half-sisters. Jesus is the one and only son of God, but not the one and only child of Mary and Joseph.

We forget this because all of our focus is on Jesus Christ, but he did indeed have an earthly family which he spent the first 30 years of his life with, and they did not just disappear when he began his work as the Son of God in this world.

Jesus had brothers and sisters; he had all of the same family experiences that many of us have had. Who here has an older sibling? Could you imagine if your older sibling was Jesus? Your parents constantly comparing you to Jesus, who actually was perfect, who always was obedient, who never sinned.

So, when we read about the difficulties that existed between Jesus and his sibling's like in the Scripture today, we should not be surprised. He made their lives difficult with his Holiness.

His brothers tell him to go to Judea, go there and prove who he was in Jerusalem. They were basically saying to him, sure you are the big fish in this little pond on Galilee. Go and try to do the same thing in Judea, in Jerusalem, where the people are more worldly and less impressed by the things that they see and hear.

Remember the people of Judea, looked down on the people of Galilee, and most of Jesus's ministry took place in Galilee, and this allowed the religious leaders of Jerusalem to claim that it was all rumor, all hearsay and that Jesus was not the true Messiah. They believed that if the Messiah came, he would come to the most important city of the Jews and prove himself there in front of them.

His brothers were essentially saying, 'If you really are so great, if you really are the Messiah, go and prove it to the world.'

His brothers did not even understand what Jesus had come to do in this world. They believed that he was here for fame and notoriety. To be a king, not a sacrifice. In their minds, Jesus's ministry was about fame and power.

His brothers like many of the people who had just walked away from him believed that his Glory was in his miraculous works and good deeds. They did not know of or understand what he was about to do on the cross.

This is true of all of the miracles described in the Bible. If the miracle was all that mattered Jesus could have done them from heaven. If Jesus being famous and powerful, if healing, if feeding, if walking on water or calming storms, was the point of his ministry, he would have walked with angels and glowed in the dark. However, the point of his ministry was a sacrifice for us, human flesh and blood to pay for human sins, all of the signs and miracles that he performed on the way to that sacrifice were to disciple his followers so that they could teach future generations about the importance of that sacrifice.

Jesus is the only way for people to get into right relationship with God. Jesus sacrificed himself on the cross, flesh and blood, and he told us that it is only by consuming his flesh and his blood, by accepting his sacrifice that was freely given into our self that we can have that personal relationship of love and trust with God.

Notice in verse five tells us that even his brothers did not believe in him. Sure, we can understand the multitudes walking away because they cannot accept what Jesus has told them, but his brothers knew him, knew of his sinless and obedient nature and even they did not believe in him. It is not until after his death and resurrection that his brothers believe in him.

This verse alone speaks to the truthfulness and integrity of the Bible. If it was written as a madeup story, you would have his brothers and sisters, all of those close to him his strongest supporters. However, it was not that way, they were not supportive.

So, when we find no support sharing the message of the Gospel in this world we should not be surprised. Jesus himself did not have the support of those who were supposed to be closest to him. So, when we are tested in our faith in the home, in our families and in our communities we should not be surprised. We need to be like Jesus and continue living a Godly life even when those around us do not support us.

Look at how Jesus responds to his brothers:

John 7:6-9

⁶ Jesus said to them, "My time has not yet come, but your time is always here. ⁷ The world cannot hate you, but it hates me because I testify about it that its works are evil. ⁸ You go up to the feast. I am not going up to this feast, for my time has not yet fully come." ⁹ After saying this, he remained in Galilee.

Jesus told his brothers that they have no understanding of the will and the timing of God, so anytime seems to be the right time to them. However, he must obey the will and the timing of the Father, that he has a task to do, and its timing is critical.

Jesus obeyed his Father in all things, knowing that the timing of things was an important expression of God's will. There will be many times in our lives as Christians that we will need to be patient and wait for God's timing, and that is no easy task, it requires patience and perseverance. It requires humbling ourselves, and understanding that his will means that things are done on his timeline.

It means that sometimes we have to let what seems to be a worldly opportunity pass by us, and it can also mean that at some times we need to push ahead with things even though the world resists us. It means prayerfully approaching the things of this world with God first in our minds and the idea of living in obedience and building disciples at the forefront of our choices. It is prayerfully trying to live our lives by both the will of God and the timing of God.

Jesus was waiting for his appointed time. So, he tells his brother's, '**The world cannot hate you**, but it hates me because I testify about it that its works are evil.'

He is telling them you go along with the world, so it likes you. I stand up against the world and point out its wicked and evil ways, so it hates me.

He is saying you go with the cultural current and because of that your life is easy. People of God a dead fish can float along with the cultural current of this world. It takes life and strength and perseverance to swim against the current of this evil culture.

This is why Jesus does not go to Jerusalem with the crowds and instead as we see in verse ten goes up alone.

John 7:10-12

¹⁰ But after his brothers had gone up to the feast, then he also went up, not publicly but in private. ¹¹ The Jews were looking for him at the feast, and saying, "Where is he?" ¹² And there was much muttering about him among the people. While some said, "He is a good man," others said, "No, he is leading the people astray." ¹³ Yet for fear of the Jews no one spoke openly of him.

This is the setting for next weeks' sermon. Jesus did go to the Feast of Tabernacles as was required for all Jewish men of age. Jesus did not go with the crowds or caravans to Jerusalem, but he went instead in secret.

And when he got there, he heard people complain about him. People were wondering where he was, people were wondering why he wasn't there performing miracles, feeding people, healing the blind and invalid, doing good works in their minds. People who were looking to be entertained by him.

He also heard the contradictory opinions of the people of Jerusalem, some believing that he was good and others believing he was a deceiver of the people. Jesus divided people during his ministry, the same is still true today. Anyone who learns of Jesus takes one side or the other, no one remains neutral about Jesus Christ. Christianity is the most attacked religion in the world.

There are no movies, shows or music that mocks Buddhism, Hinduism or Islam. Yet there are constant attacks in popular culture against Christianity.

If a Christian is called an infidel by a Muslim, it does not offend us because we do not believe in their religion. However, if a Christian calls someone a sinner, even if they do not believe in God, it offends them, because they have chosen to be against God.

So, the people in Jerusalem believed that Jesus was either good or a deceiver. If we jump down to verse twenty that we will look at next week, we will see this.

John 7:20 ²⁰ The crowd answered, "You have a demon! Who is seeking to kill you?"

So, to the people of Jerusalem, Jesus was good, a deceiver or crazy. And all three had it wrong.

Just look at what Jesus said about himself, about being the son of God, about the sacrifice he would make, that he would raise himself from the dead, about the need to consume his flesh and drink his blood, about him be the one and only way to eternal life and that he will be the one to judge the whole world. And that is just a small sample of what he has said so far in the Book of John.

Everyone must choose what to do with the claims that Jesus made.

The first is that he lied about those things, and that would make him a liar, which makes it impossible for him to be a good man like so many people in this world want to believe, showing that they have it all wrong. People that claim Jesus was a good and moral teacher, are just looking for an easy way out of calling him Lord.

The second choice is that Jesus lied about all of these things but did not know he was wrong. He believed it, but it was fantasy, he was crazy. He believed he was God and walked around the world claiming that.

The third choice is that Jesus is the son of God, and he is right about all of those things he claimed, and for that reason we are called to place all of our love and trust in him and focus on him alone in our lives. He deserves our worship and praise.

So, is Jesus a liar a lunatic or Lord? That is your choice after you read the Scripture.

Here two thousand years later, the man who has had more impact on human history than any other living being. Still makes those same claims and people still need to make those same choices.

Is Jesus a liar, a lunatic or is he your Lord?

In mere Christianity C.S. Lewis said it this way.

You must make your choice. Either this man was, and is, the Son of God, or else a madman or something worse. You can shut him up for a fool, you can spit at him and kill him as a demon or you can fall at his feet and call him Lord and God, but let us not come with any patronizing nonsense about his being a great human teacher. He has not left that open to us. He did not intend to.

So those who were in Jerusalem calling him a good man also had it wrong.

John 7:13 ¹³ Yet for fear of the Jews no one spoke openly of him.

And even as they talked about him, they did so in secret. The religious leaders of Jerusalem wanted to squash all rumors and talk about who he was and what he did. They wanted to push him out of the minds of the people.

This still happens today, people are encouraged to think about anything but Jesus, they are encouraged to think about the things of this world, about denominations, about papal elections, about political events, about religious ceremony and tradition, about social justice, about anything but the sacrifice that Jesus Christ made upon the cross for your sins.

About anything that keeps Jesus at arm's length instead of in a loving and trusting personal relationship with you.

The Bible wants you to think about Jesus, let his flesh and blood be the focus of your thoughts, consume it each and every day in all that you do. Abide in him so that he will abide in you in all that you think, all that you say, all that you do. Jesus should be the cornerstone of your life and the most important relationship you have.

So, what will you choose? Is Jesus a liar, is he a lunatic or is he the Lord of your life?

If he is the Lord of your life, you are duty bound to come to him humbly, to surrender your life to him at the foot of the cross where he bought you with his flesh and blood and to enter that personal relationship with him and you walk as the Salt and Light of God's Word in this dark and broken world.
