Cuba: Call for Increasing Humanitarian Aid and Development Assistance

Canadian churches, trade unions and other non-governmental organizations are working together to encourage the Government of Canada to increase aid to Cuba in this time of exceptional need and ensure humanitarian aid and development assistance is not restricted by U.S. sanctions and other measures.

Cubans describe their living conditions as the worst they have experienced before the 1959 revolution. Cuba is still suffering an economic slump provoked by the COVID-19 pandemic. The effects of the downturn are magnified by the decades-long imposition of sanctions (sometimes referred to as the "embargo" or the "blockade") by the United States. Between 2007 and 2022, Cuba has dropped 30 places in the Human Development Index (from 53 in 2007 to 83 in 2022). In 2024, UNICEF placed Cuba—for the first time—as a country where a third of the country's children are living in poverty. This year, also for the first time, Cuba requested support from the

World Food Program for powdered milk for children under seven. Read more about the call on our <u>Social Action Hub</u> and sign the <u>petition here</u>.

While the General Assembly Office takes the lead in hosting this event, they are well supported by other national office staff, including Tim Purvis (Associate Secretary, Ministry and Church Vocations) and Pablo Sun Kim (Intercultural Liaison), who will be available to talk about their work and hear from the clerks. Others will drop by for a presentation or two. As consultation chaplain, the Rev. Dr. Jean Morris, a former Moderator of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, will lead the clerks in daily worship and be available for pastoral care.

Aside from the COVID disruption, this yearly consultation has taken place for decades. Please remember your clerks in prayer.

New CJP Resource: Journeys to the Well – An Ecumenical Devotional Towards Anti-Racism

The Commission on Justice and Peace (CJP), an ecumenical body within the Canadian Council of Churches, has released a devotional resource entitled *Journeys to the Well – An Ecumenical Devotional Towards Anti-Racism*. This devotional addresses racism as a central issue for the church. The contributors, mostly Black, Indigenous, and People of Colour, are from diverse denominations, ages, and locations across Canada. They were invited to reflect on self-selected scriptures and their personal experiences, and a minimal editing approach was taken to centre the authors' authentic voices. The devotional aims to connect faith with anti-racism action, encouraging readers to engage with scripture and prayer as a foundation for working towards racial justice. It is intended for flexible use, allowing readers to engage with the reflections in whatever way resonates with them.
